Judge L. G. Mathews, County peared before the highway commission in the interest of Highway No. 7, which passes through the county from east to west, out by way of Goldsboro.

County Granted \$215,000 Aid. The \$90,000 aid granted on Highway No. 7, coupled with fprevious grants, makes a total

of \$215,000 that Coleman county will have received through the State Highway Commission upon recommendation of County

The State Highway depart ment is of the opinion that at least \$300,000 will be available for Coleman county in 1921 This will greatly aid in the construction of Highway No. 23 from Santa Anna to the Waldrip Bridge on the Colorado river and Highway No. 7 from 2.2 miles northwest of Coleman to Golds-Valera and Talpa. With the exception of the Valera district not been voted to complete the highway to the Taylor and Runnels county line.

Engineering Cost Less Than Three Per Cent of Aid.

County Judge Mathews states that the entire engineering work of the county will, in the end, have cost less than three per cent of the State and Federal aid that has been alloted to Coleman county, not taking into consideration its relative value in connection with the expenditure of the more than one million dollars that have been voted for road construction in the various precincts of the county.

All roads will soon be survey ed and construction work can begin at once after the road bonds impatient at the apparent delay Ramsuer for a few days. in construction should bear in mind that the surveys have to be made before construction work can begin and before the county can receive State and Federal aid.—Democrat-Voice.



In accordance with the modified quarantine proclamation issued by the governor of this state and becoming law June 27, 1920, you are hereby officially notified that your city is considered within the prescribed area and subject to the general rules and regulations promulgated by the Texas State Health Department, viz:

A complete rat extermination campaign must be inaugurated at once in each incorporated town and city within the said prescribed quarantine area.
