A baler, 2 joints of casing, a string of tools and 2 swedges were lost in the hole, and the well has been on the pump every since, making a good record. Wednesday the men were pulling the sucker rod for repairs. When all of a sudden it started to flowing.

It is thought by some oil experts, that the shot in the Pope No. 5, being so close to this well and Fuller No. 1, has caused them to flow also. It is the general impression of some, that if these wells were cleaned and shot, they will go into the gusher class. Keep one eye on Santa Anna, the newest, real oil field of Texas.

GLADYS BELLE'S POPE NO. 5 SHOT TUESDAY; SCORES OF VISITORS RUSHING IN; BIG DEVELOPEMENT ON

Rapid development of the Gladys Belle properties 3 1-2 miles north east of Santa Anna is now being made, and the interest over the state is now greater than ever before as a consequence of the bringing in of the Pope well a few days ago. A 60 quart shot was given this well Tuesday, with a dandy flow before the well bridged and shut it off. It is expected that as soon as the hole can be cleaned out the production, already about 250 barrels daily, will be increased to a neat figure. The Pippin well on the Burke is making a good showing and will be shot in a few days.

There are more than a dozen wells on the pump, in the field. Agents of a number of oil companies and refineries, have been in our city and the field for several days endeavoring to secure the production of the Santa Anna field at a fancy price with a good premium.

Santa Anna has had hundreds of visitors during the past week or ten days as a result of the Pope well. The hotels, rooming houses and homes are crowded.

Visitors are coming from everywhere to see the new wells and leases are going up.

Two Story Office Building For T. B. O. R. Company.

The Texas Best Oil Refining Company have just completed a fine two story office building out on their splendid refinery site. The office equipment has been installed and they are going right on with the office work, after the breakup and move from Houston. Mr. Johnson has been busy this week with a gang of men, teams and scrapers grading up the lawn, driveways and grounds about the new office building. They are expecting some material to arrive any day.

PUMPING WELL DECIDES TO FLOW OTHER OIL NEWS OF IMPOTANCE.

Fuller No. 1 must have decided the pump was to slow to put its name before the public. On last Sunday morning the pumpers gave the alarm that Fuller No. 1 was flowing over the casing. Many of the oil men hastened to the scene and found the liquid gold flowing out of the casing. This well has been on the pump for the past six months. It has always been considered a good well, but now the company have more respect for the well, and have made a new location just 600 feet north of Fuller No. 1 on the R. F. Campbell lease. This work is being done by the Gladys Belle Oil Company.

There is several drilling contracts being let, but none of them are far enough along for publication.

ORDINANCE NO. 61.

An ordinance requiring persons, firms and corporations subdividing lots, block or any lands within or adjoining the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna and filing maps thereof in the office of the County Clerk of the county for the purpose of selling lots, block or lands by ref-

erence thereto to file a copy of such map with the clerk of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, declaring an emergency and providing penalties.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, Texas:

Article 1. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be the duty of any person, firm or corporation subdividing any lot, block or lands within or adjoining the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, for the purpose of making an addition therein or thereto or selling such lots, blocks or lands by reference to such map as recorded shall at the time such map is filed in the office of the county clerk of Coleman county, Texas, or within a reasonable time thereafter file with the clerk of the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna a true copy of said map as recorded in the office of county clerk.

Article 2. Any person, agent or employe of a firm or corporation failing to comply with the provisions of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof be fined in any sum not exceeding twenty-five dollars.

Article 3. The Commissioner of Streets and any overseer appointed to work the streets shall in no instance work streets, avenues and alleys or spend any money of the City of Santa Anna, upon streets, avenues and alleys of additions or subdivisions hereafter made within and to the City of Santa Anna till a copy of the map of such additions and subdivisions is filed with the clerk of the Board of Commissioners as hereinbefore provided.

Article 4. The fact that there is no ordinance providing for the City to secure copies of additions and subdivisions, creates an emergency and demands that all rules requiring ordinance to be read and referred to a committee and reported at a subsequent meeting be suspended and same is accordingly done and this ordinance put upon its passage.

Passed by a unanimous vote of the Board of Commissioners at a regular meeting thereof held on the 4th day of May, A. D. 1920.

ORDINANCE NO. 60.

An ordinance prohibiting the dropping, throwing and leaving paper, rags, cloth, cotton, excelsior, straw, hay, manure, boxes, barrels, refuse, debris and all other decaying matter and materials on the streets, avenues, sidewalks and alleys of the City of Santa Anna and prohibiting the dropping, throwing and collecting of any and all of said named materials or permitting said materials to collect on any and all of the lots, blocks and premises of the City of Santa Anna and remain there decaying and rotting; regulating the burning of such materials; providing penalties and declaring an emergency and other purposes.

Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, Texas:

Article 1. That all waste paper, rags, cloth, cotton, excelsior, straw, hay, manure, boxes, barrels, refuse, debris and other decaying matter and materials lying and remaining on the streets, avenues, sidewalks, alleys, lots, blocks and premises of the City of Santa Anna shall be and are hereby declared to be unsightly, dangerous, fire hazards, and a menace to the public health.

On and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to drop and throw and leave any of the above named materials on the streets, avenues, sidewalks and alleys of the City of Santa Anna. And it shall likewise be unlawful to drop, throw and collect or permit any or all of such materials to collect on any lot, block or premises and there remain decaying and rotting.

Article 2. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to burn any of the materials or substances referred to and named in Article 1 hereof on the streets and avenues of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, within the fire limits of said city.

Article 3. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to burn any of the materials mentioned in this ordinance or any other combustible matter openly, but

all such materials must be placed in wire baskets, iron or steel containers, furnaces or otherwise confined to prevent blowing or scattering; provided that outside the fire limits such matter may be burned by persons above 15 years of age keeping personal watch over such burning till the fires are wholly extinguished.

Article 4. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to burn any of the materials and substances herein named or other materials on blocks 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, 29, 30 and 31 on any day after 12 o'clock noon, of the town proper of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, on any day after 12 o'clock noon.

Article 5. Any person found guilty of violating any of the foregoing provisions, articles and parts of articles, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not exceeding Ten Dollars.

Article 6. The fact that there is no ordinance in force in Santa Anna prohibiting throwing waste paper and other combustible substances on the streets and further prohibiting the collection of decaying matter on premises and regulating the burning of same creates an emergency and demands that all rules requiring an ordinance to be read and referred to a committee and to be reported at a subsequent meeting be suspended and same is accordingly done and this ordinance put upon its passage.

Passed by a unanimous vote of the Board of City Commissioners at regular meeting held on the 4th day of May, A. D. 1920.

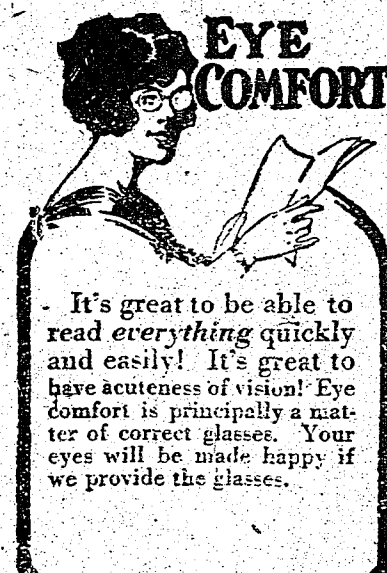

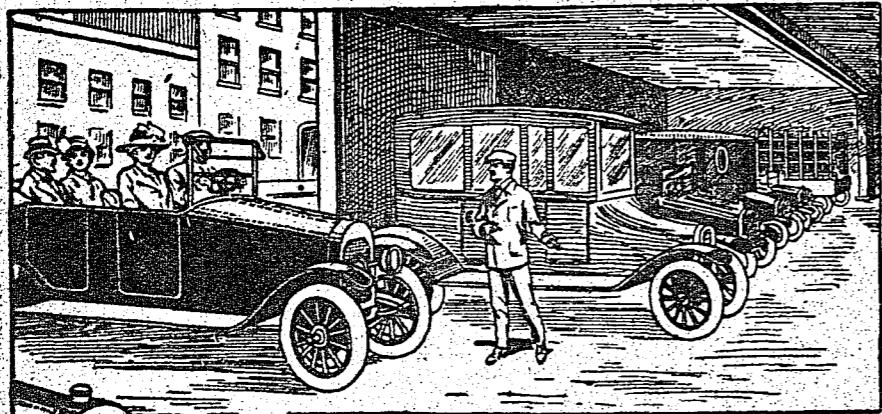

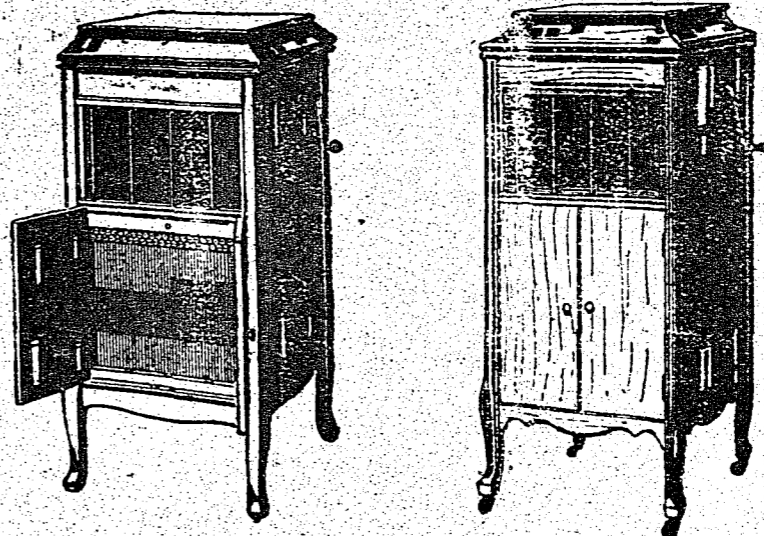

ORDINANCE NO. 59.

An ordinance regulating traffic and travel on and along the streets and alleys, avenues and highways within the City of Santa Anna, Texas, establishing rules of the road, prescribing conditions upon which said streets, alleys, avenues and highways in said City of Santa Anna may be used by vehicles and regulating the use of the fire hose, fire truck, hose cart and other fire apparatus, defining the term vehicle and providing for penalties, repealing ordinances and declaring an emergency.

Be it ordained by the Board of City Commissioners of the City of Santa Anna, Texas:

Article 1. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for the owner, driver or operator of an automobile, motor vehicle or machine to run, drive or operate the same on, along or over any of the following named streets at a greater rate of speed than 15 miles an hour, to-wit: Wallis Avenue between the center of First and Third streets and second street between where an extension of the alley through Blocks No. 25 and 26 crosses said Second street, and the center of the main line of the Gulf, Colorado and Santa Fe Railroad across said Second Street.

Article 2. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for the owner, driver or operator of an automobile, motor vehicle or machine to run, drive or operate the same on and along or over any other streets, alleys, avenues or highways than those described in Article 1 hereof within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, at a greater rate of speed than 18 miles per hour; provided that in turning the corner in any street or alley the rate of speed shall not be greater than 10 miles per hour.

Article 3. The designation of the speed limit herein shall not constitute a license for the person or operator of a person in charge of a motor vehicle being driven or operated in the City of Santa Anna, Texas, to drive the same at the speed limits allowed herein regardless of property or person; but the same shall at all times be driven and operated with the consideration of Safety First and at a speed no greater than is reasonable and proper, having regard for the traffic and use of public streets, avenues and highways by others or so as to endanger life, limb or property of any person thereon; and the careless operation of such motor vehicle at a speed greater than is proper and safe at any given point or place shall constitute an offense even though the speed limits designated herein be not exceeded.

Article 4. That hereafter it shall be unlawful for any person under 15 years of age to run, drive or operate an automobile or other motor vehicle on or along or over any of the streets, alleys, avenues or highways or the City of Santa Anna unless some person of more than 15 years of age experienced in the operation of and in control of such vehicle is sufficiently near such driver or operator to easily place his or her hand upon the steering wheel and assume control of such motor vehicle and the person in control thereof in the absence of the owner and the person driving or operating shall each be deemed guilty in case of violation of this article.

Article 5. Section 1. All automobiles and other vehicles except when passing another and going in the same direction shall

keep to the right and as near to the right curb as possible.

Sec. 2. A vehicle meeting another vehicle shall pass to the right. A vehicle overtaking another shall pass to the left and not pull over or turn back to the right until so far ahead as not to interfere with the progress of the vehicle passed.

Sec. 3. A vehicle turning into another street or avenue to the right shall turn the corner as near the right hand curb as practicable. A vehicle turning into another street or avenue to the left shall turn around the intersection of the center lines of the two streets.

Sec. 4. No vehicle shall turn around in any street between the intersection of two other streets but shall go on to the intersection before turning or attempting to turn and observe the rules in turning as hereinbefore set out; provided that if said vehicle is standing still or parked it may turn to the left and proceed to the intersection of another street and turn or continue as desired.

Sec. 5. Hereafter it shall be unlawful to park or leave standing any automobile, motor vehicle or other vehicle and including animals on Wallis Avenue between First and Third streets and Second street between where an extension of the alleys thru Blocks 25 and 26 crosses said Second Street and where the north line of North Railroad street crosses said Second street unless such automobile, motor vehicle or other vehicle or animal is parked or left standing in the center of said Wallis Avenue or Second Street and squarely across same. On all other streets and alleys vehicles shall be parked or left standing with the right hand side of such vehicle toward the curb but not otherwise. No vehicle may remain standing on the parts of Wallis Avenue and Second Street described above although attended by some person for a longer period than 15 minutes at any one place.

Sec. 6. In starting any vehicle standing or parked in the center of Wallis Avenue and Second Street as described in Section 5 above, such vehicle shall in no instance be run backward but shall be run forward and turned to the left and run to the point of destination or to the intersection of the next street before turning and proceeding.

Sec. 7. No vehicle shall emerge from any alley, stable, garage, or other building abutting on a side walk at a pace faster than a walk.

Sec. 8. Before backing any vehicle ample warning shall be given by visible or audible signal and while backing careful watch shall be kept to avoid injuring those behind; provided that this section shall not authorize backing any vehicle when parked in the center of Wallis Avenue and Second streets as described in section 5.

Sec. 9. Vehicles must not be parked nor stop in such way as to interfere with the passage of pedestrians and always avoiding projection of horse or vehicle within five feet of crossing.

Article 6. It shall hereafter be unlawful for the owner, operator or driver of any motor vehicle to make any unnecessary noise disturbing any sick person with horns, bells or devices known as "muffler cut-out" within the corporate limits of the city of Santa Anna, provided that the devices known as the muffler cut-out shall not be used at all within the closely built up part of said city.

Article 7. Sec. 1. When signaled to do so by the driver of any horse or

other animal, the driver or operator of any motor vehicle shall stop the same, and if requested to do so he shall stop the engine to same till danger has passed.

Sec. 2. In case of injury to person or property due to the operation of any motor vehicle, the driver or operator thereof shall stop and, at the request of the person injured or of any person present he shall give his or her name and address and that of the owner of the vehicle.

Sec. 3. All drivers and operators of any vehicle shall stop upon signal of any peace officer of the city of Santa Anna which signal shall be given by raising the right hand.

Sec. 4. Drivers of vehicles on the approach of any fire engine, hose cart or other fire apparatus shall immediately draw their vehicles as near as practicable to the right hand curb, parallel thereto and come to a standstill.

Sec. 5. Funeral processions on their way to a funeral shall have the right-of-way over other vehicles and the latter are forbidden to drive through such procession.

Article 8. Sec. 1. That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person not a member of the Fire Company to catch hold of, climb onto, ride on or with or do anything to retard any fire engine, fire truck, hose cart or other fire apparatus however propelled or carried while proceeding to a fire or supposed fire in response to the fire alarm or otherwise unless invited to do so by the Fire Chief or by the officer or fireman in charge in the absence of his superior.

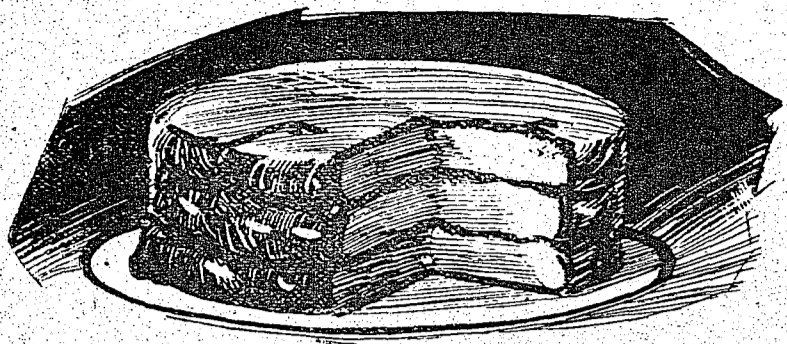
Sec. 2. While going to a fire or supposed fire, during the time the fire is being extinguished, while replacing the hose or other apparatus and while returning with a fire engine, fire truck, hose cart, or other fire apparatus however carried, the Fire Chief, or in his absence, the officer or fireman in charge shall have actual control of such engine, truck, hose cart or other apparatus and the premises thereof including the premises and location of any fire or supposed fire and any person by his presence or by molesting or interfering with or holding to or moving the hose, hose cart, truck or engine or other fire apparatus without the direct instruction of the Fire Chief or in his absence the officer or fireman in charge shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and punished as prescribed herein.

And for the purpose of enforcing this ordinance the Chief of the Fire Department and in his absence the officer or fireman in charge is hereby appointed and confirmed as special policeman to serve from the inception of any fire or the sounding of any fire alarm till such fire is extinguished and the fire apparatus is returned to its place.

Sec. 3. After the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful to drive any vehicle or animal upon or across the fire hose or other fire apparatus or to trample or walk upon same.

Article 9. The word "vehicle" as contained herein shall be construed to mean wagon, buggy, carriage, truck, push carts, bicycles, tricycles, motorcycles, all motor propelled vehicles, led horses, equestrians, pedestrians and everything including gasoline and electric cars on wheels or runners. The word "driver" shall include rider or driver of horses and operators of all motor and electric propelled vehicles and street cars.

Article 10. Sections herein pre-

scribing speed limits shall not apply to any fire engine, fire truck, hose cart or vehicles carrying fire apparatus operated by the Fire Chief or in his absence the officer or fireman in charge in the discharge of his duties or person under his direction proceeding to a fire or purported fire nor to any peace officer in the discharge of his duties.

Article 11. Any person who shall violate any of the foregoing articles, sections, or parts of articles and sections of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof he shall be fined in any sum not exceeding one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.

Article 12. The fact that there is no traffic ordinance in effect within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna and regulating the use and abuse of the fire apparatus creates an emergency demanding that all rules requiring ordinances to be read over and referred to a committee be suspended and that this ordinance be placed upon its passage and same is accordingly done.
