of Runnels County during 1929. Most of these mules were taken in by local agencies of tractors. Others were sold direct to shippers by the farmers. A number of horses were also shipped. The mule and horse population in Runnels County is decreasing rapidly.

Tractors are taking the place of mules and horses onthe Runnels County farms. There are over 1,000 tractors in use in the county today. whereas four years ago the number was less than 100. When tractors were first sold to the farmers here it was the rule for them to retain at least one span of horses or mules with which odd jobs about the farm were done. But since tractors have come into more general use, many farmers have disnensed with work stock entirely, doing all their farm work with tractors. Many farmers own two or more tractors, and with them cultivate much more land than they could handle formerly.

Most of the mules shipped out of Runnels County went. to the Fort Worth market. From there they found buyers from Arkansas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabania and Georgia and East Texas, where farms are smaller and where tractors are not so well adapted for farm purposes.







Know British Weakness.

Several things dictated Washing-ton's subsequent taliltary course. First was his own physical and moral courage. That was his best military equipment. It was un-besitating and unfaltering. Second probably, was his experience with British regular troops. He had seen them lose their discipline under terror. It was not a proper indictment of Braddock's regulars that they could not fight the French and Indians as the Virginia ritiemen could fight them. The disaster was that they would not obey orders. The third was his distrust of min-ute men, militia, and of amilscip-Ined riflemen.

It is true that men of that type won the principal American successes, as at Orisknoy, Bennington, Saratoga, King's Mountain, and Cowpens, but it was Washington's army which kept the pressure on the British points of concentration. It was Washington's distinctive characteristic that he would attack. That quality was developed in him as if he had the experience, the genius, and the resources of any one of the great generals of history. He had two plans to throw the British out of Boston.
