LCRA Answers Charges Made About Floods

Floods in south Texas continue to do damage to homes and farm lands and regardless of the cause of this greatest flood in years in that section, the Lower Colorado River Authority has received quite a lot of criticism from farmers and home owners who have demanded an investigation of the practices of the LCRA to determine if the Buchanan Dams and other dams in that vicinity made the flood more destructive.

Answering charges that the flood might have been caused by the dams, the following article has been sent to daily and weekly papers from the Lower Colorado River Authority to explain their activities.

"WHEREAS, the daily press has reported the proceedings of meetings held at various points on the lower Colorado River, which indicate that citizens and property owners residing in the valley of the lower river contend that Buchanan Dam either contributed to, or failed to alleviate the present disastrous flood on the Colorado River;

From the information furnished the Board of Directors of the Lower Colorado River Authority it appears that such claims are groundless. The flood was of unprecedented proportions, as is evidenced by the terrific volume of water which wrought destruction at Brady, San Saba, Bend and other points above the Buchanan Dam, and which could not possibly have been affected by the Buchanan Dam. The huge volume of water coming into Buchanan Dam reservoir from the San Saba River was greatly increased by additional floods from the Concho River and other points upstream from Buchanan Dam, and was further greatly increased by a great volume of flood water coming into the river from the Llano River and its tributaries, downstream from Buchanan Dam.

According to figures submitted to the Board, the present flood was one of the greatest of record, and it was not unreasonable to expect that points downstream would suffer even greater damage than that occasioned to Brady, San Saba and contiguous territory upstream. Under the conditions outlined, the fact that the flood at Austin and below was not of as great intensity as the floods of 1935 and 1936 makes it obvious that the Buchanan Dam and the partially completed

Band Stand, 1000 New Seats Erected For Rodeo; Fire Dept. Buys Flags

Chutes and pens, 1000 new seats on the east side of the rodeo arena and a band stand on the west side are being erected this week and are nearing completion in preparation for the Santa Anna Annual Rodeo to be held August 25, 26 and 27. The addition of these seats will accommodate the large crowds expected when Earl Sellers of Del Rio again takes charge of Santa Anna's biggest civic entertainment.

Pens and chutes were built and completely paid for last year out of proceeds of the rodeo. The new seats and band stand which are now being erected will be left permanently for the use of the high school.

Over 55 merchants agreed this week to lease decorations and flags from the Santa Anna fire department this year instead of leasing these flags from an out of town firm. The fire department has already bought and received decorations for these firms and has four extra sets of decorations for any other firm that wishes some. The department will lease the flags at practically the same price as the merchants paid last year and in two years the flags will be paid for. Then the lease price will be greatly reduced and the flags will be on hand in Santa Anna throughout the entire year for any occasion.

Decorations will be placed on the streets and stores the week of August 22.

Santa Anna Schools Will Open Sept. 5

Santa Anna Public Schools will open on September 5 according to the announcement made by Supt. J. C. Scarborough after the meeting of the Board of Education Tuesday night.

No action was taken on the resignation of Thomas F. Wallis, band director here for the past two years, who tendered his resignation last week.

Janitors of the schools, Joe Spencer and E. K. Blewett, have been working for some time getting the buildings and equipment in readiness for school opening. Desks at the Ward schools have been sanded off with a new sanding machine purchased and desks have been restained and varnished.

At the high school the desks that needed repairs have also been sanded and refinished.

The biggest transfer list in the history of the Santa Anna schools will be given to the Santa Anna high school this year, according to Supt. J. C. Scarborough, who stated that Whon and Shield will send their high school students here for the coming year.

A Thorough Investigation

It is to be hoped that the proposed legislative investigation of the Colorado River flood, below Buchanan Dam, will thoroughly go into a situation which in future years could continue to be tragedy instead of a blessing.

At the same time, perhaps, it will be seen that dams farther up the streams are the real need to hold back flood waters. Dams in the San Angelo sections, for instance, properly handled, could hold back flood waters, making it unnecessary for one or two dams in the central part of the state to be depended upon to control floods.

To those whose property has been damaged in South Texas, an answer is due. If the flood was a man-made one, due to improper handling of Buchanan Dam, steps must be taken to

pleted Marshall Ford Dam, to some extent at least, alleviated this unprecedented flood.
It should be further borne in mind that the Authority and its Engineers, acting in conjunction with Engineers of the Reclamation Bureau, have always contended that it is necessary to complete Marshall Ford Dam to its ultimate height in order to realize satisfactory control of flood waters.
Nevertheless, the Board of Directors feel that they occupy official positions of public trust and that it is their responsibility and duty to hear and thoroughly weigh and consider any facts presented by any interested citizen for the purposes:
1. Of determining whether and to what extent the flood in the lower Colorado River was affected by the Authority's dams.
2. Whether said dams and the appliances connected therewith were properly operated, or whether there was negligence in their operation, and if so, who was guilty of such negligence.
3. To determine whether any improvement can be made in the manner and method of operation of such dams and appliances.
4. To determine what additional dams or other works should be constructed in order to realize a full degree of flood control on the Colorado River.
The Board cannot agree that its reservoirs should be emptied after each flood and its appliances operated for flood control alone, because:
1. The Conservation Amendment to the Constitution of

Texas and the Act passed thereunder creating the Authority, and under which it acts, places the conservation of water as of equal importance with flood control. This is necessarily so because our climate, with prolonged periods of droughty years, makes it imperative that impounded flood waters be conserved for beneficial uses, including municipal and industrial water supply, irrigation and the development of power.
2. The Authority assumed the responsibility of operating its project in such manner as to produce revenues sufficient to liquidate its indebtedness, and revenues can be derived only by putting impounded flood waters to beneficial uses, instead of letting them flow unhampered and unrestrained into the Gulf.
3. The Board of Directors feel that they owe an obligation to the people to see that the cheap power which may be generated from stored flood waters is made available to the people of Texas without the intervention of private profit, and that the Authority should not be driven from this field of public service. The privately owned power companies have diligently sought from the beginning to prevent the Authority from generating power, and particularly from distributing power except through the facilities of existing utilities.
The Directors believe that when the Authority's present program is completed, and with the completion of such additional facilities as the experience of the present flood may indicate to be necessary, it will be enabled to carry out its great program of not only controlling the flood waters of the Colorado River but of conserving such waters for beneficial use as needed; and the Board desires the cooperation of all patriotic citizens and welcomes the advice of all informed citizens and officials to this end.
THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Directors of Lower Colorado River Authority, that the Board welcomes an investigation by any Engineer or body of Engineers, who are qualified and unbiased, to determine all of the facts and questions above set out or which may be raised by any interested citizen; to thoroughly investigate all complaints and determine whether blame should be placed on any agency or individual, and if so, to what extent.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board appeals only to the reason and good judgment of the citizens of Texas, and asks their cooperation in carrying out its program of making the Lower Colorado River Authority an instrumentality of service and benefit to the people.
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that copies of these resolutions be furnished to State and Federal officials having jurisdiction
