Because he knew that for envy they had delivered Jesus he gave them the choice between Burabbas and Jesus. After several unsuccessful efforts to escape responsibility the expediency of letting the people choose between Burabbas and Jesus was resorted to. Pilate no doubt thought they would choose Jesus rather than the notorious Barabbas.

(2) A message from Pilate's wife (v. 19). She warned him against having anything to do in the condemnation






