PIPPIN-BURKE SHOWING FINE GRADE OF OIL

The Pippin well on the Burke has caused much excitement this week. When they hit the gray lime, like the Ranger big pay stuff. A fine showing of oil was had, after going about three feet into the formation. The well was shut down and preparations are being made to take care of the production, when they drill in. This well promises to be a good one and the oil men have their eyes on this well.

WELL NEAR SANTA ANNA TESTS 240 BARRELS A DAY

The Santa Anna Oil and Gas Association Kingsberry No. 1 was tested but today and shows 240 barrels production per twenty-four hours. The Texas Best Oil and Refining Company has purchased the Root & Ramsey holdings on the Schirmacher tract, which includes the gas well from where Coleman city gets its gas supply, and will also use the production from this field to operate its refinery when completed. —Dain's News.

GARNER BROS., WELL MAKES 240 BARRELS DAY

Garner Bros., well on the Kingsberry No. 1 was given a thorough test last Saturday to determine the actual value of the well and it showed 240 barrels production per 24 hours. This well extends the Santa Anna field 2 1-2 miles further south. The oil was hit at the depth of 1380 feet. A few months ago this well was given up as a dry hole. But the Garner Brothers were not satisfied, believing that there was oil under their valuable lease. So about a month ago W. F. Garner, who owns a nice furniture and undertaking business in Plainview decided to come back and fight it on down for a deep test. After clearing the well of a tool or two, the drill was started down. It seems that his luck came to him, after drilling a short distance, the driller hit the spot and the liquid gold was at hand. The well is good for 240 barrels.

Mr. Garner left this week for Fort Worth to contract for tankage for his fine well.

Mr. Kingsberry has been offered a neat fortune for his royalty. But Mr. Kingsberry is also of the staying kind. The wells look better than \$900 a month for Mr. Kingsberry, after it goes in on the Texas Best Oil Refinery pipe line.

Major Ottley, the famous geologist, from Mareetta, Okla., was here this week and made a location on the Henderson lease, where Mr. Garner will begin rigging up real soon. Santa Anna is fast becoming a sure enough oil town.

Many oil men and lease hunters are coming in every day.

7,800 BARRELS SANTA ANNA OIL SINCE DEC. 15

The readers of the News and others interested in the oil development of Coleman county and especially the Santa Anna field, will be glad to learn that 7800 barrels of oil was shipped from Santa Anna since December 15th, 1919. This information is based on the number of cars shipped and there is seven more cars on the track to be loaded this week. Of course this is not very much oil to boast, but it is more than some of our neighboring towns have shipped, who claim to be on the oil map.

OKLAHOMA GIN, OWNED BY FARMERS, SHOWS GOOD PROFIT

Ada, Okla., April 22.—The Pontotoc Custom Gin Company, a company of farmers who financed their own ginning, made a profit this season that makes many of the big companies feel insignificant. The paid in capital stock is \$23,000, and the dividends this year, amounted to \$18,400.00 or eighty per cent. The company was organized in 1914 and has made money every year since. The profits this year, however, exceeded those of any previous season.

The officers of the company are: I. R. Gilmore, R. Best, J. E. Parker, and J. W. Balthrop, all farmers and cotton producers. The directors consist of officers and J. D. Chandler, L. D. Brandon and W. H. Brumley. The latter three are also farmers and cotton raisers.—Star-Telegram.

Something like eight thousand dollars worth of rings and diamonds were stolen from the Armstrong Jewelry Store in Brownwood about five o'clock Saturday afternoon. The Brownwood Bulletin says:

A complete list of all the stolen rings has been prepared and will be given the jewelers of the state as well as the police in the various cities. The list includes the following:

One solitaire diamond, weighing 1.43 carats; one solitaire diamonds, weighing 1.42 carats; one solitaire diamond weight .66 carat; three smaller solitaires weighing less than half a carat; six solitaire diamonds, in fancy settings; two assembled solitaires; one diamond ring in man's setting, containing three stones; one platinum and diamond dinner ring containing three large stones and several smaller ones; one platinum dinner ring with five large diamonds and several smaller ones; two coral cameos with small diamonds one onyx ring with small diamond, six pearl rings, one pearl and ruby rings, six ruby rings in fancy mountings, three genuine aqua marines, one large square opal ring, three blue sapphires in fancy mountings, two black and white cameos, two shell cameos in fancy mountings; two coral cameos in plain mountings, four pink cameos with small diamonds.

The Armstrong Jewelry company sustained a considerable loss four years ago when, early Sunday morning, some one smashed the show window of the establishment and made way with several watches and other articles which had been left in window overnight.

**WHAT ARE YOU
GOING TO DO**

With schools closing lack of efficient teaching is becoming more evident in Hays, Foard and Runnels Counties, according to the Texas State Teachers' Association. One-eighth of the Liberty county schools are without teachers, six teachers are needed to make out Foard County's quota, a like number in Hays County.

The County Superintendent of Hays County writes, "I have no hope of any increase in pay for next year over that now paid. Teachers are not planning to improve their efficiency or build up their schools as they should. The salaries are so low they are inducements to leave rather than remain in the profession." Conditions are reported better in Runnels County, though the work in that county is twenty-five per cent below normal.

"When parents of these and other counties realize their children are being taught by less efficient teachers, in fact by other children who have barely passed the easiest examination given by the state, they will make adequate provision for their schools," said G. O. Clough, chairman of the Association's Committee. "While there are other than financial features of our school problem, it must be met first. All the others can be solved if efficient money is provided and spent conscientiously and wisely in conduct of the schools of Texas."
