## Santa Anna Meet Well Attended and Program of Intense Interest

In the track meet held here Santa Anna won a total of 148 points with Coleman second with a total of 90.

Santa Anna won both doubles and singles in tennis with Coleman, Reuben Howington and Jerry Simpson winning by 6-1, 6-3 scores in each set. Reuben then defeated his man in the singles.

In the track events Joe Bailey Cheaney beat out Coleman by several yards in the hundred yard and two twenty yard dashes. He also out distanced Coleman by several feet in the broad jump. Tom McClellan in a very pretty race out distanced Bresnahan of Coleman in the mile race. Reed Gassit easily won the four forty from Coleman. In the final event, the relay race Santa Anna came in ahead of Coleman with flying colors. In the basket ball game Santa Anna in a very fast game defeated Talpa and then overwhipped Coleman 11 to 5. There was no team anywhere near as strong as our girls basketball team. They easily defeated Glen Cove and Talpa thus like the boys winning the championship of Coleman County in basketball.

In the other contests Santa Anna won first place in spelling, in essay writing, in extemporaneous speaking, and debate. Nettie Turner and Thomas McClellan by a vast array of argument a id ringing speeches overwhelmed the weakly presented points of their Coleman opponents, on the question of the Government ownership and operation of the railroads. By an oversight intentional or otherwise on the part of one of the judges the decision was announced in favor of their opponents.

Despite a raging sandstorm the meet here was a great success and Santa Anna will have a large number of her winning contestants to go to Austin to the State meet May 14, 15 and 16th.

The track meet at Santa Anna Saturday was a decided success in every particular. Several students from Brownwood were in attendance and a most enjoyable time is

reported. The following are some of the results:

Tennis: Santa Anna versus Coleman—Simpson and Howington for Santa Anna, Miller and Kennedy for Coleman. Two sets Santa Anna, 6-1, 6-3. This was doubles. For singles the result was: Santa Anna, three sets, 6-1, 2-6, 6-3; Howington for Santa Anna and Miller for Coleman.

Girls' basket ball was as follows: Rockwood versus Glencove, 12 to 13 in favor of Glencove. Santa Anna versus Talpa, 34 to 6 in favor of Santa Anna.

Boys' basket ball: Coleman vs. Rockwood, 10 to 4 in favor of Rockwood. In Santa Anna versus Talpa, the result was 23 to 6 in favor of Santa Anna.

Two hundred and twenty low hurdle—Miller of Coleman.

Santa Anna won the meet.

The judges were Sid Wells, "Dutch" Woodward and J. Claude Miller, all of Brownwood. Clyde King, R. W. Marton, Lane Walker, Guy Allen and Sam Culbirth were present from Brownwood, in addition to those mentioned. Guy Allen was official starter of the meet.—Brownwood Bulletin.

## TRUSTEES OF SCHOOLS UNANIMOUS CHOICE OF VOTERS FOR RE-ELECTION

The arduous task of tabulating city school trustee election has finally been completed and the result was declared this morning. The votes cast in last Saturday's Messrs. J. R. Looney, F. S. Abney and D. F. Johnson were re-elected members of the Board for another two-year term, the vote being unanimous for these three candidates.

A total of twenty votes were cast in the election. In ward one there were six votes, in ward two seven votes and in ward three seven votes. No one showed up at the fourth ward booth to help the one election judge count his vote, so it was not cast. The election judges in each of the other three wards performed their duty nobly, casting almost half the total number of ballots in the entire election.

Encouraged by this emphatic endorsement which has been given their administration of the affairs of the city schools, the three trustees who were re-elected in Saturday's election have gladly resumed their responsibilities. The election demonstrated one thing beyond a shadow of a doubt, in the opinion of most of those who have commented upon it and that is that there is no politics in the management of the Brownwood Independent School District affairs.—Brownwood Bulletin.

Santa Anna school election was not a failure by any means. E. E. Polk and R. C. Gay and Edgar Manning were elected. The total vote cast was thirty-six. Santa Anna may not be quite as large as Brownwood, but they sent one over them on the voting power of the school election.

## Texas Best Oil Refinery Sure to Make Good; Other Good News

The following article leads us to believe that the refinery business is the coming branch of the oil industry. The Texas Best Oil Refining Company, which is expecting some of its material to arrive in the next few days, has the promise of a great future ahead of it. With the present number of pumping wells and the expectation of a gusher coming from one of the deep test wells, which are going down, leaves the impression with us, that Santa Anna has something good ahead of her.

You all know that gasoline has increased in the price to 30 cents per gallon, the highest price in history of gasoline selling in this city. Crude oil is now selling at \$3.50 per barrel at the pipe lines, and from \$4 to \$4.25 per barrel at other deliveries. Although more oil is now being produced and more of it is being refined into gasoline than ever before, the increased use of automobiles, trucks, and other gasoline power engines and vehicles, renders it difficult for refineries to make the supply of gasoline equal to the demand. No decrease in gasoline consumption is to be expected on account of the higher price. The gasoline cost is the smallest part of the cost of an automobile. This is an age of high prices, superfluous money and unbelievable extravagances. American gasoline is selling in England for 60c a gallon, and the English are howling for American cars in which to burn more of it up.

Materials On Way. The general manager of the

Texas Best Company was in the News office this week and informed us that in spite of the fact that eighty per cent of oil supplies (refinery and drilling) are beyond promise of reasonably near delivery, and in spite of the refinery company's engineer and the general manager himself having both been seriously ill with the influenza, that more than fifty per cent (one-half) of the materials required under their contract with the Santa Anna Chamber of Commerce has been ordered and is either rolling or immediate delivery to railroads promised.

Nothing is now being left undone to continue and sustain the confidence of the local citizens in this company and in fulfilling their every promise to the public.

### More Information.

The News is informed by telegram that the drillers of the Texas Best Company's well on the famous La Lomita mound at Mission, Texas, have found paying oil at a very shallow depth. Here is part of the telegram: "Report from La Lomita by Superintendent Lee. Pay well at 400 feet. Setting casing at once and will try sands." If this sand proves what the drillers believe the company has an immediate market at its wells for the oil as the great pumping stations for irrigating the Rio Grande valley truck farms use oil for fuel and one of these plants adjoins the 400 acre lease of the company on which this well is being drilled.

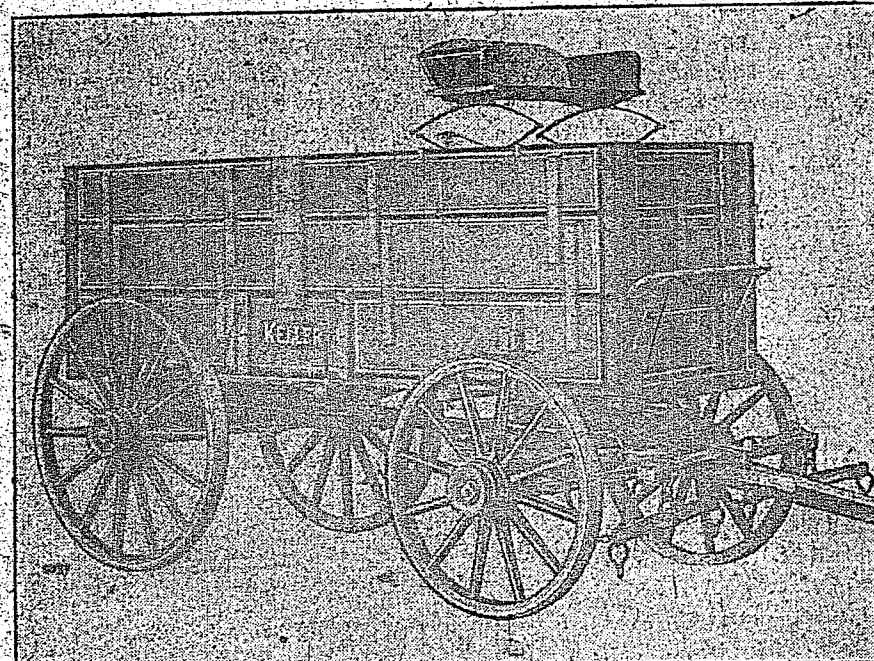

**BANGS TO VOTE ON  
\$50,000 ROAD BOND  
THIS COMING MAY**

The Bangs precinct will hold an election on May 8, to decide whether or not the citizens of that precinct will tax themselves to float a bond issue of \$50,000 for building good roads.

The Brown County Commissioners Court met in extra session last Wednesday and fixed the date of the road bond election in the Bangs precinct for May 8th. The court had previously cre-

ated the Bangs road district No. 3, defining the area wherein special taxes for road purposes may be levied in the event the bond issue is carried.

The Bangs road district No. 3, covers an area of 12 to 14 miles square, with the town of Bangs in the center of the district, thus the good roads now planned for that district includes all the main roads leading out of Bangs. In the event the bond issue is voted—of which there is little doubt, as the people of the Bangs community are very much in earnest as to better roads—the \$50,000 voted to be

used in building roads will be augmented by a substantial sum from the funds of the State Highway Commission, the combined amount of the bond issue and the fund from the State will likely assure a fund of \$80,000 to \$90,000 to spend on the roads. Brownwood Semi-Weekly News.

## COLEMAN COUNTY GETS OVER MILLION DOLLARS FOR ROAD BUILDING

With Angelo spending nearly a million dollars for good roads, and with Coleman county just having voted over one million dollars for roads, Runnels county is going to be a bad place in the road in west Texas. The money spent on car upkeep which would be greatly reduced if we had good roads, would take care of the cost of road bond issues many times over.

Read the following from the Coleman Democrat and see what that county is doing:

Three road precincts in Coleman county have voted \$1,100,000 road bonds and preliminary road building and surveys are now under way in some of the precincts.

Precinct one, which includes the town of Coleman and the northeastern portion of the county, voted \$500,000 road bonds; Precinct two, which includes Santa Anna and the southeast portion of the county, voted \$500,000 road bonds; Road District one, which includes Valera and the southwestern portion of the county, voted \$100,000 road bonds.

Federal and State aid is pledged the county in its road building program and it is safe

to say that Coleman county will have hundreds of miles of hard surfaced cardinal roads before the building program is finished.

Asked concerning the future road building program in Coleman county, Judge L. G. Matthews says:

"The time has come in Coleman county when dirt roads, especially the cardinal roads, will not stand up under the increased traffic—they are worn out faster than they can be constructed and maintained. We must build our roads according to our resources, and the demands of the traffic. Unless we build hard-surfaced cardinal roads the farmers cannot market their products of the farm to an advantage and millions of dollars will be wasted annually, as was the case in 1919-1920.

"Road bonds recently voted in Coleman county, with Federal and State aid which we hope to get, will enable us to build some of the finest roads in Texas. 'Rome was not built in a day,' neither can the roads of Coleman county be built in a few weeks or months. We have more than a million dollars to be expended on our roads and two years may be required to complete the present program of road building."—Ballinger Ledger.
