Best Location In The Southwest for Factory

With the highest grade silica sand in the state, an abundance of cheap gas, plenty of water and limestone we believe Santa Anna offers the best location in the southwest for a glass factory. We have several good factory sites within one-half mile of railroad.

Two stratum of this sand, each about forty feet in thickness, with about fifteen feet of clay and brick shale between them, lies the length and width of both the east and west mountains, and covering some two hundred acres of land.

There are millions of tons of very high test glass sand in these Santa Anna Mountains.

This sand is two hundred feet above the railway track. Sand can be moved by gravity from the pits through various manufacturing establishments and storage houses to cars. We have taken over 1000 cars of sand out of this pit.

Besides the sand and fuel there is the pine forests of East Texas close at hand and a large distributing territory covering the south part of the United States, Old Mexico and South America, with tidewater for export trade nearer than most any glass making section in the United States.

Since 1917 we have been supplying the Wichita Falls Window Glass Company, and Ball Bros., fruit jar factory of Wichita Falls, Texas, also the Texarkana Window Glass factory with silica sand, and it has given uniform satisfaction. A factory here at the pit could get fuel, sand and lime or limestone at half what the above mentioned factories are paying.

The top of the Santa Anna Mountains is covered with a

stratum of fine Lime Stone from fourteen to thirty feet in thickness.

This stone is suitable for all purposes for which limestone may be used. Lime made from this stone is of the highest quality. A good cement stone; a good building stone. Used in large quantities for tombstone bases. Easy to work, cheaply handled by gravity. About 40 feet of good cement clay and shale under the limestone.

A fine quality sand-lime brick may be made from this sand and lime.

Soft water in inexhaustible quantities, carrying some sodium, can be obtained near at two hundred and fifty and three hundred and fifty-five feet.

The city has a large lake near the foot of the east mountain. The water is pumped to a reservoir on the Mountain and comes into the city mains with a pressure of ninety-five pounds to the square inch.

A splendid bed of fire Brick shale near the southwest corner of the city limits, covering several acres and twenty feet in thickness, is near the surface, can be cheaply worked by stripping, makes a very high quality brick either by the stiff mud or dry press process.

The transcontinental line of the Santa Fe passes through Santa Anna, east and west, making an excellent outlet for shipping sand, lime and glass, anywhere between New Orleans and San Francisco. Practically all of this territory is without glass making facilities and other glass factories are so far away that a factory at this point would enjoy a virtual monopoly of the trade in this territory.

GARNER BROTHERS FROM PLAINVIEW BEGIN WORK

Mr. Garner from Plainview, has returned to Santa Anna to begin work at once on the holdings of the company. All the tools have been located and will be placed on the lease in the next ten days, where they will put down a deep test well. They expect to bring in a gusher when this is completed.

COLEMAN COUNTY OIL REPORTS LOOK GOOD

The Jim Ned Oil Company, operating on the Dibrell ranch, has concluded a deal with the Garner Oil Company of Garner, Iowa. The contracting parties agree to carry on the drilling of the present well to a depth of 3,500 feet if necessary, or drill a new well to said depth on a fifty-fifty basis. They further acquire a forty-acre tract, offsetting the present well, on a basis of one-fourth royalty and a 200-acre tract on a royalty basis. It is the purpose of the company to drill a series of wells on the tract if production justifies.

The Jim Ned Company has had a series of mishaps in the drilling of its well. The well had a very fine show of oil at about 2,600 feet and gushed periodically over the derrick. The derrick was burned and the tools, together with the bailer, were lost in the hole. For the last six months it has had a fishing job and has been unsuccessful in clearing the hole.

The Gladys Belle Oil Company is moving a standard oil rig on the J. T. Pope tract, Santa Anna field, for the purpose of making a deep test. It has four producers on the Pope around 1,550 feet.

What Shall We Do With Our Schools ?

The Trustees of the Santa Anna Public School report that unless something is done to raise an additional \$1,500 required to run the school nine months they may be forced to close the school for lack of funds. This would be a calamity of dire consequence to this town and community. We would not only lose all our fourteen units of affiliation credits thus preventing our graduates from entering college without examinations but every child in school would fail to be promoted to the next grade until some time next session when he made up the work missed.

What are the people of Santa Anna Independent School District going to do about this? Are we going to sit idly by and permit our school to suffer and our children deprived of an affiliated school and of their promotions? No. We simply can not afford it. There is only one way out. We must raise the funds by public subscription.

We are not the only school this year in financial difficulties. Schools all over the state are having to meet this problem. They are solving it. Why can't we? Bangs raised recently \$1,500 for her school by public subscription; Ballinger raised \$2,500; Cameron, \$20,000 and Palestine, \$5,000. Santa Anna can surely do as well as Bangs. We are paying our teachers small salaries and the reason we have this shortage is because an indebtedness has been carried over since 1914 and ultimately because we are bound down like a hide bound animal with a fifty cent tax limit beyond which we are prohibited by law from going, and in the

third place because it costs nearly twice as much to run any kind of a concern now than it did four years ago and a school is no exception.

Hence, The Mothers Club with twenty-five members present voted unanimously at last Friday's meeting to put on a drive to raise the funds to wipe out this debt and permit our children the privilege of a nine months school. We decided to put on an advertising campaign next week in order to thoroughly familiarize the patrons of the district with the needs of the school and to follow this up the next week with a thorough canvass of the district to secure the amount of \$1,500 needed.

Let us have a nine months school term by cancelling the indebtedness so the school can go forward next term and be able to secure a strong faculty to instruct our children. We can do it if every patron will contribute liberally to this great cause. Are you a friend of our school, of our children? If you are you will help us. We are going to give every boy, girl, man and woman in the district a chance to contribute.

Santa Anna has always gone over the top in her great undertakings and contributed liberally and thus we can not fail our school, the greatest institution in our midst in this time of its need. Won't you help?

Circulating Petitions at Bangs for Bond Election

Bangs citizens are at present circulating petitions throughout that precinct pertaining to an immediate road building program for the western section of the county.

As soon as the petitions have been sufficiently signed they will be presented at a special session of the County Commissioners Court next week, and that body, in response to the request contained in the petition, will order an election to decide whether or not the tax payers of the Bangs precinct will issue road bonds for the building of good roads.

The Commissioner's Court at its session this week, authorized the formation of Brown County Road District No. 3, in the Bangs precinct, and in the event the road bonds are voted, the property owners living in that precinct will be subject to special taxes to provide payment for the bonds.

Bangs citizens are very much in earnest as to good roads and there is no doubt that a bond issue in a substantial sum will be voted.—Brownwood Semi-Weekly News.

FIND MUCH OIL IN EGYPT

Output of New Field at Hungada is Reported to Be Satisfactory and on Increase.

The prospects of a good supply of oil fuel for Egypt are very promising. At the beginning of the war the Anglo-Egyptian oil fields was the only one of the various companies formed to search for oil in Egypt that remained in operation, and down to 1914 the only finds of importance had been in Gensah, where none of the gushers that had been struck had given anything like a permanent yield. But the new field discovered in 1914 at Hungada has been proved to be of singularly regular formation and its yield has steadily increased, until, according to recent reports, it now stands at over 15,000 tons of crude oil a month, says the United States consular reports. Meanwhile the Suez refinery has been enlarged, and there is every reason to hope that as much oil will shortly be available for internal consumption as can be dealt with by the company's existing facilities. It is stated that, in consequence, most of the public utilities companies in Egypt have now converted their plants to burn petroleum residue.

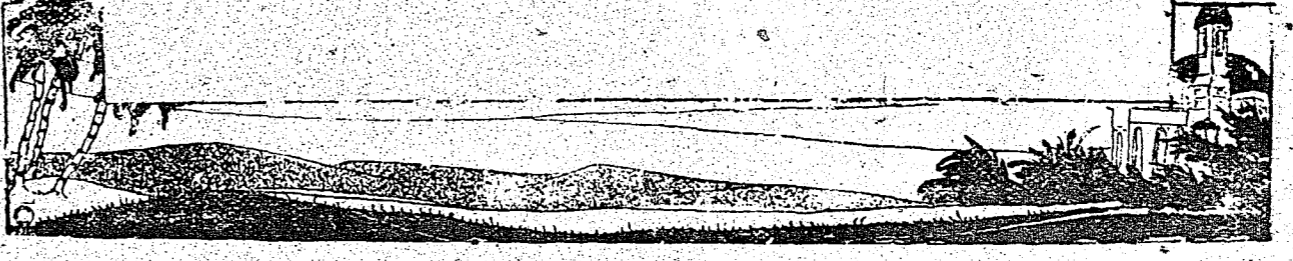

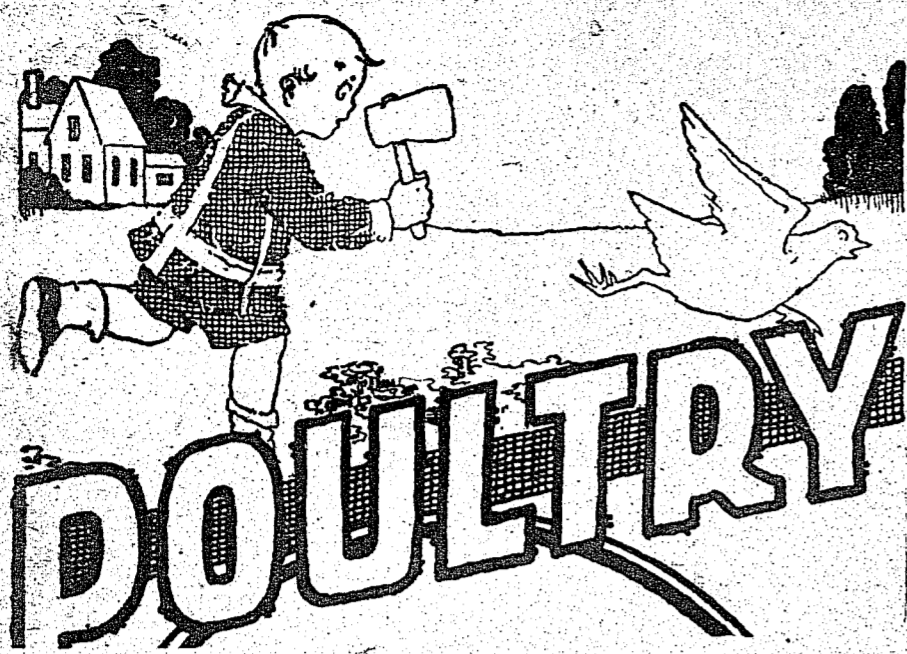

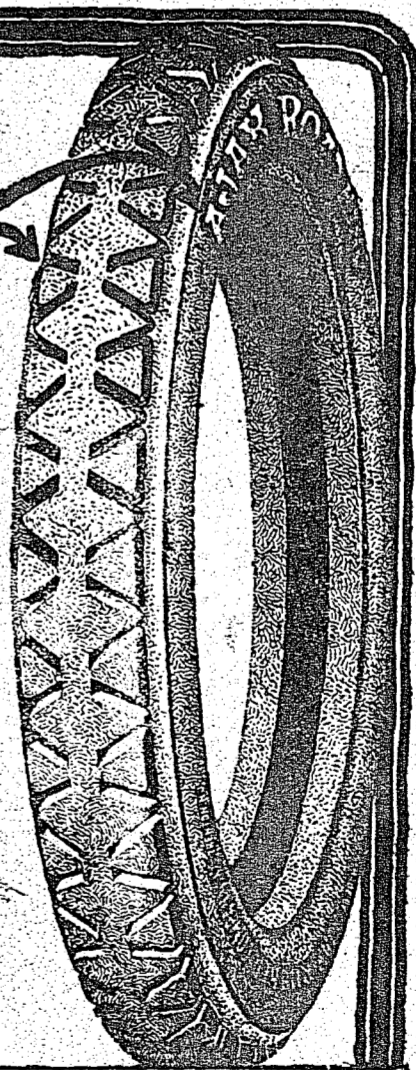

Tax Collector E. K. Thomson's records show 3,223 poll tax receipts issued for the year 1919, of which 121 were exemption receipts issued to persons who became 21 years of age during the year 1919.

The total includes more than 450 women, but does not include discharged soldiers who were not required to pay poll tax, nor persons over sixty years of age. It is conservatively estimated that the voting strength of the county is approximately 3500.

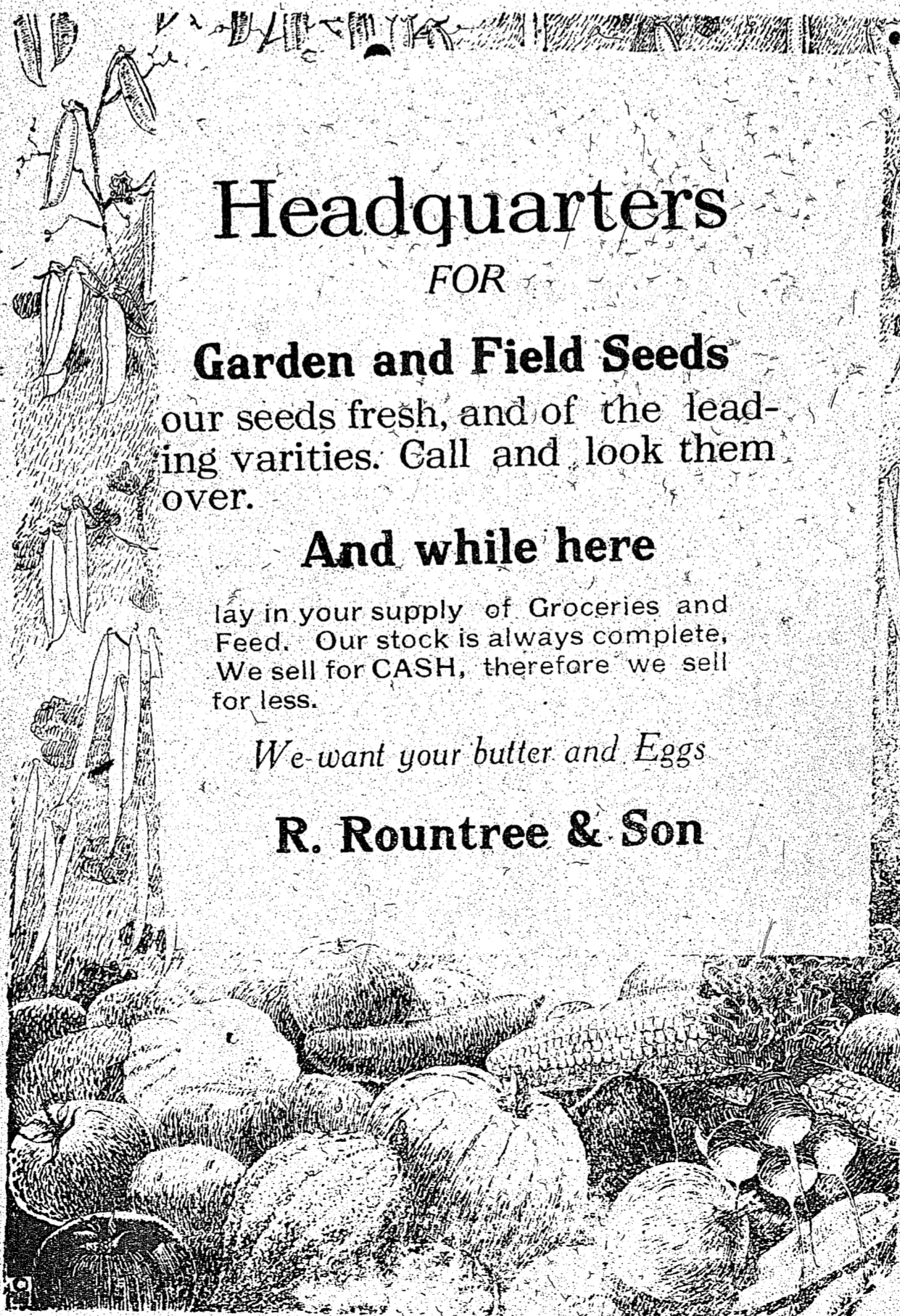

GET ON FEET AGAIN.

BAPTISTS ENLARGE WORK

Mission Secretary Will Recommend
How Evangelistic, Educational and
Benevolent Program Can
Be Carried Out.

Americans should keep out of Europe, unless they have important business there, until Europeans have had an opportunity to get on their feet again, declares Dr. J. F. Love, secretary of the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention.

Dr. Love, as chairman of a commission named by the Baptist 75 Million Campaign to visit Europe and make a survey of the mission fields there, has just returned from a five-months' tour of the continent. He says Americans should distribute cash with such a

hand in many places on the continent that the people have become convinced that Every American has money to throw away and as soon as they see a citizen from this country they proceed to overcharge him for everything he buys and every service rendered. Unless Americans forego sight-seeing in Europe for a few years a lot of natives there will become professional beggars in Dr. Love's opinion.

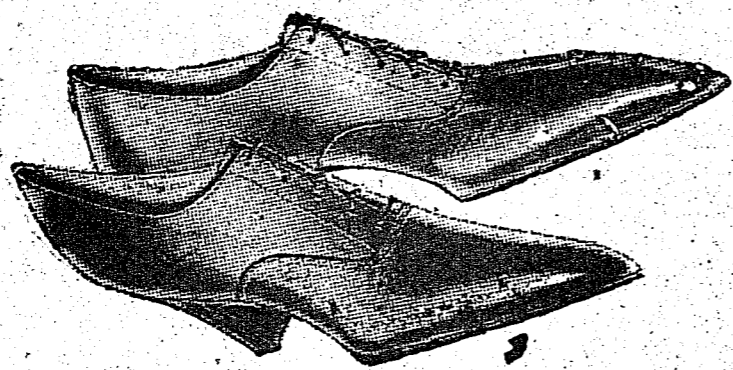

\$2,000,000 CATTLE LOAN COMPANY ORGANIZED

A \$2,000,000 Texas cattle loan company is being organized in Dallas, according to an announcement made yesterday. The major portion of its \$2,000,000 stock

it is said, has already been subscribed—largely by West Texas bankers and stockmen.

The company known as the Stock Raisers' Loan Company, will open for business within the next sixty days. Its head offices are at present located in the Southwestern Life Building.

Officers of the company are as

follows: President, L. E. Bumpass, former banker and business man of Farmersville; vice-president, W. B. McShan, former banker of Pilot Point and recently State Bank Examiner; secretary, M. J. Norrell, formerly with the United States Treasury Department and at present secretary and treasurer of the Dallas Trade League; treasurer, P. D. Harris, formerly with the City and Tenison National Banks of Dallas; general attorney, Jed C. Adams, Special Federal District Attorney for the Northern District of Texas. Directors are largely being selected from among West Texas bankers and cattle raisers.

"The purpose of the company in general," Mr. Bumpass said yesterday, "is to finance the live stock raisers of the State, to lend money to the cattleman to enable him to increase his herds and to prepare for market cattle he already has.

Will Lend to Raiser and Feeder.

"The company will handle excess loans to the stock raisers and feeder and will do its business through local banks which are interested in this company. It will rediscount loans made by local banks to their stock-raising customers and will loan directly to the stock raiser when his bank is unable to handle such a loan by reason of legal restrictions.

"The cattle paper," when accepted by our loan company, will be sent to the East for rediscount. Eastern connections have already been established by the company for rediscounting its paper.

"The Stock Raisers' Loan Company will in no way compete with Dallas banks, but, on the other hand, will aid them by taking over their cattle paper, thereby enabling them to make further loans to their cattle customers.

ROAD BUILDING

ORDER ALL MATERIAL EARLY

United Action Urged to Overcome Inefficiency in Open-Top Cars—Much Work Ahead.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)
While the expenditures during 1919 for hard-surface highways, according to estimates of the bureau of public roads of the United States department of agriculture, will set a new record with a total of \$138,000,000, this figure is small in comparison with the computed available total for 1920 or \$633,000,000, the spending of which promises to be dependent chiefly on the quality of materials the present limited railway facilities can transport.

The items entering into next year's estimate are: Brought forward from unfinished work, 1919 contracts, \$165,000,000; funds available from state and county taxes and federal aid, \$273,000,000; one-fifth state and county bond issues not before available, \$50,000,000; one-third unexpended balance of state and county bond issues previously available, \$45,000,000; available from new bond issues to be voted on in the fall of 1919 and spring of 1920, \$100,000,000.

Unless the available open-top cars, many of which normally lie idle in the late winter, are utilized in that slack season the work which can be done will necessarily be curtailed for lack of materials. The total for 1920 is more than four times the amount that has been expended during any previous year for like purposes. Therefore there must be a tremendous increase not only in the material supplies and shipping facilities, but also in the labor supply, and an enlargement of contractors' organizations. First of all, according to Thomas H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau of public roads, the attention of all state, county and city road-building interests should be directed toward overcoming this car shortage.

It has been customary to wait until contractors' organizations were ready to begin work before starting the shipment of material. Under these conditions many thousands of open-top cars lie idle during the latter part of February, all of March, and the earlier part of April. During the past spring the number of open-top cars that were idle totaled more than 250,000. This, of course, was partly unavoidable, owing to the late date at which work got under way, following the signing of the armistice. By awarding contracts as early as possible, contractors will be able to ascertain their material requirements at different points, and so will be in position to place orders dependent on rail transportation a considerable time in advance.

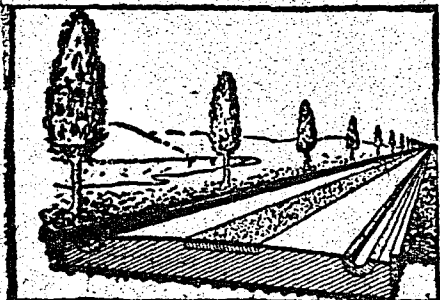
While the placing of material in storage, which may result from such a course, involves some expense, it will be small compared to the loss that will result if contractors are not in a position to go ahead with the work because of lack of materials. In view of the experience of 1919 and the greatly increased program for next year, it seems probable, according to the bureau of public roads, that contracts which are not awarded during the winter months will have little opportunity for being supplied with material which require transportation.

CEMENT RAIL FOR HIGHWAYS

Invention of Texas Man Relates More Particularly to Safety Road Making Means.

The Scientific American, in illustrating and describing a cement rail for highways and roads, the invention of J. F. O'Rourke of El Paso, Tex., says:

This invention relates generally to roads and highways for vehicular traffic, and more particularly to safety road making means in the form of spaced parallel rails, which may be

quickly constructed of plastic material, which may be molded or laid in sections. The roadway consists of spaced parallel side tracks and a central track of which the central track has a plane surface and the side tracks longitudinal wheel-receiving depressions.



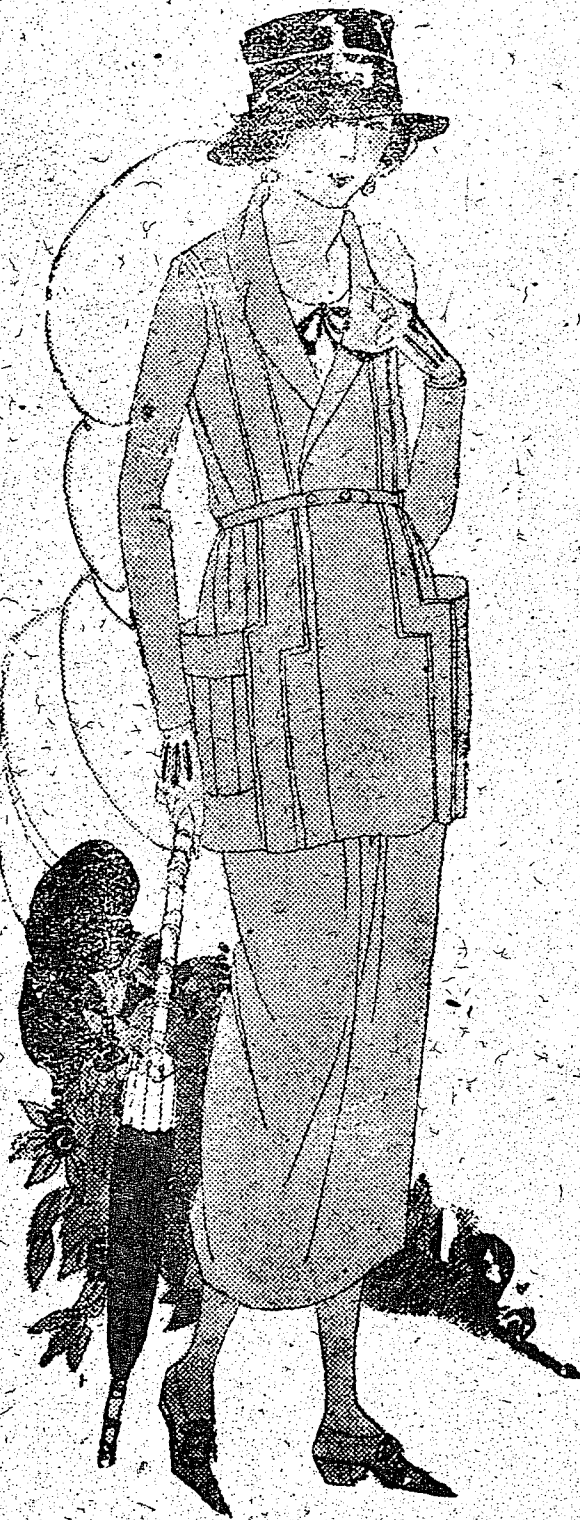

BAPTISTS LAUNCH BIGGER PROGRAM

\$100,000,000 IN SUBSCRIPTIONS AND \$20,000,000 IN CASH BY MAY 1 IS NEW AIM SET.

WILL SEEK SOULS, ALSO

Evangelistic Campaign Calculated To Reach Thousands of Unsaved Persons Is Announced For March and April of This Year.

Now that the subscriptions to the Baptist 75 Million Campaign have passed the \$90,000,000 mark, leaders in all the states composing the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention have resolved to place this sum at \$100,000,000 by the meeting of the Convention at Washington early in May. It is also planned to bring the total of cash offerings by that time to \$20,000,000. The convention at Washington will be the seventy-fifth session of that body and it is deemed appropriate to celebrate the diamond jubilee of the organization with an enlarged subscription and cash sum with which to carry forward the missionary, educational and benevolent work fostered by the convention in all parts of the world.

This additional sum will be sought from churches which did not have a part in the original campaign, from members of churches who did not subscribe then and from other persons who made subscriptions in the fall but who feel disposed to increase their subscriptions now. This effort for increased funds will be made during the last week in April so that everything can be completed before the convention meets in Washington May 12.

Returns By the States.

The reports on the original drive for funds in the 75 Million Campaign to date, as made by the several states, follow: Alabama, \$4,100,000; Arkansas, \$2,265,000; District of Columbia, \$250,000; Florida, \$1,370,392; Georgia, \$10,100,000; Southern Illinois, \$350,704; Kentucky, \$7,167,713; Louisiana, \$2,375,000; Maryland, \$907,760; Mississippi, \$4,144,902; Missouri, \$2,062,506; New Mexico, \$732,260; North Carolina, \$7,250,000; Oklahoma, \$3,200,000; South Carolina, \$7,554,772; Tennessee, \$5,010,000; Texas, \$16,560,000; Virginia, \$8,298,488. Returns from the foreign mission fields and other sources not included in the above bring the total subscriptions beyond \$90,000,000.

This vast sum of money was raised at a total expense of three-quarters of one per cent, making this probably the most economically conducted campaign in the history of the country.

Plan Evangelistic Campaign.

Prior to this effort for additional subscriptions and cash, however, a South-wide campaign of evangelism, stewardship and emphasis upon the fundamental doctrines of religion is planned for the month of March and the first three weeks in April, when the churches will employ their organized forces in seeking to win to Christ many thousands of the 20,000,000 people within the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention who are not affiliated with any church. A day of prayer in behalf of the success of every item on the Baptist program for the spring and summer of 1920 has been set apart. Many of the states have already got their evangelistic campaigns well under way.

In the hope of arousing as large interest as possible, city-wide, county-wide and associational campaigns of soul-winning have been planned in many places. In other places, especially the rural districts, where the summer months are considered more desirable for evangelistic work, the special program will be deferred until July and August. This will make it possible for city pastors to aid the rural pastors and thus double the evangelistic force of the denomination.
