To the Democrat-Voice:

As a citizen of the county I am much interested in the proposition of drafting the services of practical business men to administer the financial affairs of the county, and heartily endorse the move to elect practical men of affairs to compose the county commissioners' court—men who are more interested in the welfare of the county than in the per diem which the office affords.

Surely there are four patriotic unselfish men in the county, who will serve on the county commissioners' court if their fellow-men demand that they do so? Coleman county is a fourteen million dollar corporation, in which every man, woman and child is a component part. To administer the affairs of a corporation of such magnitude is not child's play and it behooves everyone of us, as a stockholder in this corporation, to elect practical men to direct its affairs, and not be governed by sentiment or charity in calling men to serve the county in such a responsible capacity.

**560 WELLS IN DECEMBER.**

Texas had a total of 560 completions in December, of this number 462 being producing wells. The total initial or flush production of the good wells completed in Texas reached an aggregate of 224,135 barrels. The Texas total production for December was 9,013,669 barrels.—Comanche Enterprise.

**TEXAS COTTON BUSINESS.**

Galveston has an out put of one-third of all the cotton that is sent out of the U. S. The cotton receipts at that port passed the 1,500,000 bale mark last week, according to the Galveston Cotton Exchange. Local receipts at all the ports in the U. S. are shown to be 4,732,706 bales. Therefore Galveston total is almost one-third of the entire aggregate.

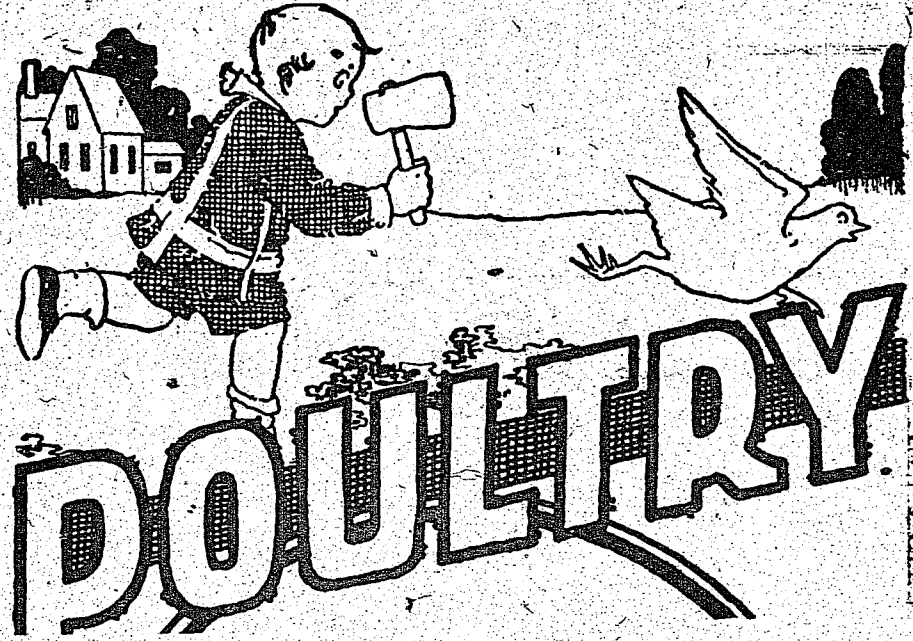

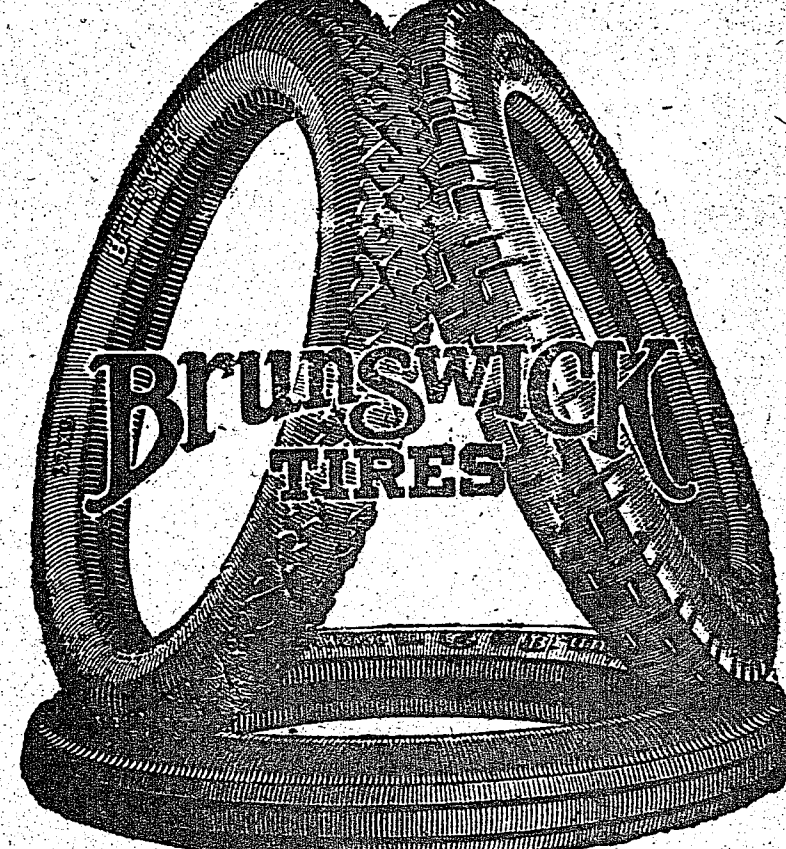

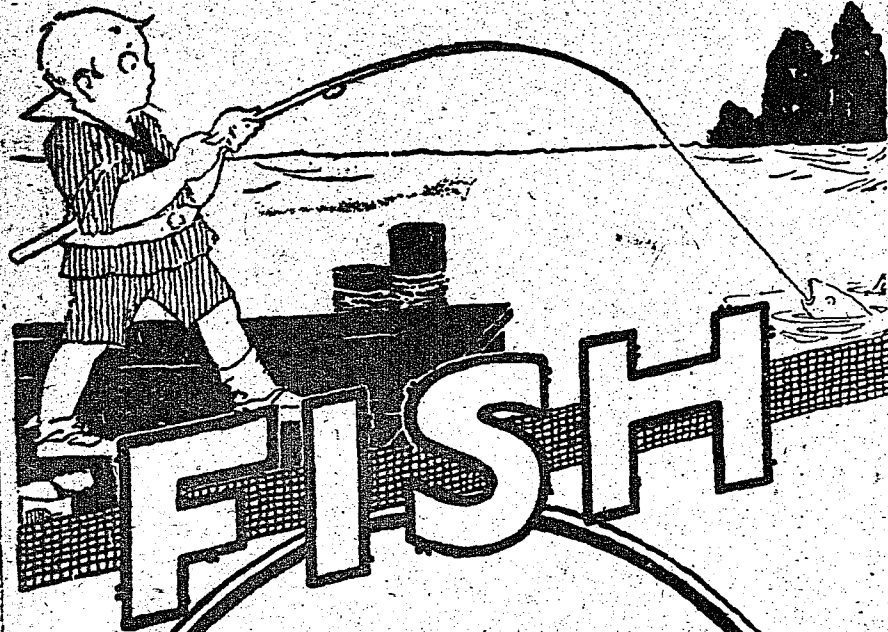

## ROAD BOND ELECTION MARCH 13

State of Texas,  
County of Coleman.

On this 9 day of Feb. 1920, this Court being in regular session came on to consider the petition of Leman Brown and 201 other persons praying that bonds be issued by said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county Texas, in the sum of four hundred thousand (\$400,000) dollars, bearing interest a 5 per cent per annum payable Semi-annually, maturing at such time as may be fixed by the commissioners Court serially or otherwise, not to exceed 30 years from the date thereof, for the purpose of constructing and operating macadamized, graveled or paved roads and turnpikes or in aid thereof.

And it appearing to the Court that said petition is signed by more than fifty of the resident property taxpaying voters of said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, Texas, said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, Texas, having been established by an order of the Commissioners Court, of Coleman county, Texas dated the 13th, day of Nov. 1918 of record in book J, page 301 of the minutes of the Commissioners Court of Coleman county, Texas, within the following metes and bounds to wit:

Beginning at the South east corner of Commissioners Precinct No. 3 of Coleman county, Texas, the same being the S. E. cor. of Louis Julienna survey No. 196 on the South boundary line of Coleman county, Texas, thence north with the East lines of surveys Nos. 195, 234, 7, 236, 238, 239, 253, 241, 242, 243, 249, 245, 246, and 92 to the most southern S. W. corner of survey No. 85; Thence East with the south line of said survey No. 85 to its S. E. corner; thence north with the lines of surveys 85, 84, 78 and 10 to the N. E. corner of survey No. 10; Thence east with the North lines of surveys Nos. 75 and 76 to west line of G. W. McHoney survey No. 6; thence south to its S. W. corner; Thence east to its S. E. corner; Thence north to the most southern N. W. corner of survey No. 755; Thence east with the most southern north line of survey No. 755 to an ell corner; thence north to its N. W. corner; thence east to its N. E. corner; thence north with the west line of survey No. 663 to its N. W. corner; thence east with the north line of said survey to the S. W. corner of

survey No. 664; thence north with the west lines of said survey to its N. W. corner; thence east with the north line of surveys Nos. 664 and 44 to S. W. corner of survey No. 51; thence west lines of surveys Nos. 51, 493, 492 and 491 to N. W. corner of survey No. 491. Thence east with the north line of survey No. 491 across survey No. 483 to the west line of survey No. 48; thence north to its N. W. W. corner of survey No. 657; thence east to its S. E. corner; thence south with the East line of survey No. 656 to S. W. corner of survey No. 647; thence east with its south line to its most southern S. E. corner; Thence north to its ell corner; thence east to corner on the east boundary lines of Coleman county, Texas. Thence south with the east boundry line of Coleman county to its S. E. corner on the Colorado river; thence west with the southern boundry line of Coleman county and the meanders of the Colorado river to the place of beginning.

It is therefore considered and ordered by the court that an election be held in said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, Texas, on the 13th, day of March A. D. 1920 which if not less than 30 days from the date of this order, to determine whether or not the bonds of said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, Texas, shall be issued in the amount of \$400,000.00 bearing interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum payable semi-annually and maturing 30 years from the date thereof; and whether or not a tax shall be levied upon the property of said Commissioners precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, Texas, subject to taxation for the purpose of paying the interest on said bonds and provide a sinking fund sufficient for the redemption thereof at maturity.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication in a news paper published in said commissioner precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, for four successive weeks before the date of said election, and in addition thereto there shall be posted notices of such election at three public places in Commissioner precinct No. 2 of Coleman county, one of which shall be at the court house door of Coleman county, Texas, for three weeks prior to said

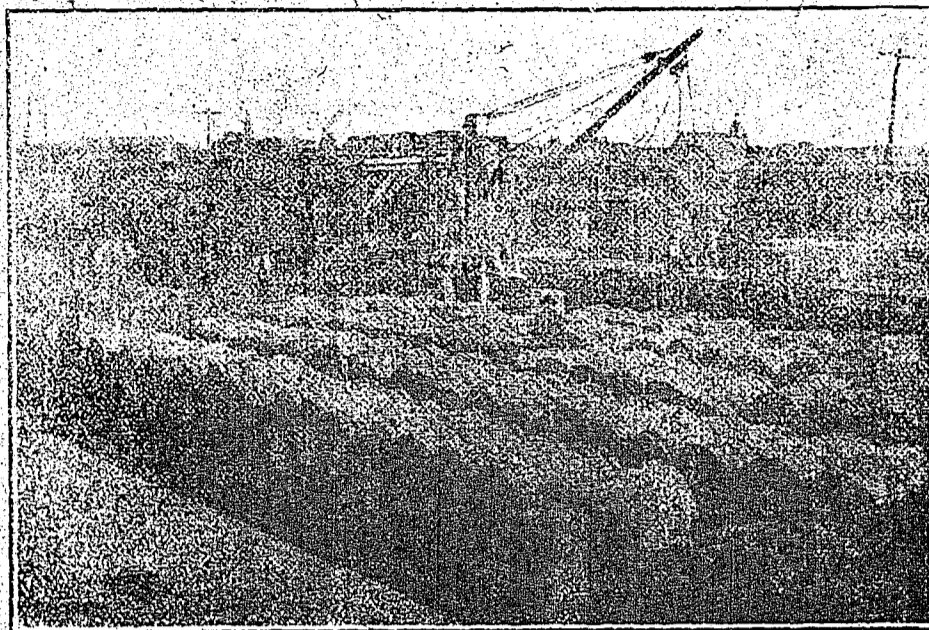

## Over \$2,000,000 Cotton Crop Gathered Around Santa Anna Loading Cotton From Platform



The above picture will give you a good idea of the way the cotton is handled in Santa Anna. According to the books of the public weigher there has been 10,886 bales weighed compared to 465 in 1918 and there is approximately 2000 more bales in the fields yet to be picked. There is about

2500 bales in the yard now. Before the last rain there was about 125 bales a day coming in.

Figuring this at \$200 a bale it would make a neat sum of \$2,177,200, not counting the cotton that is still in the field would make the farmers in good shape to go through the coming year.

The farmers of this part of the country are not going in to heavy on the cotton business this year but are planting some small grain and other crops.

Our farmers are in better shape than ever in the history of the county.

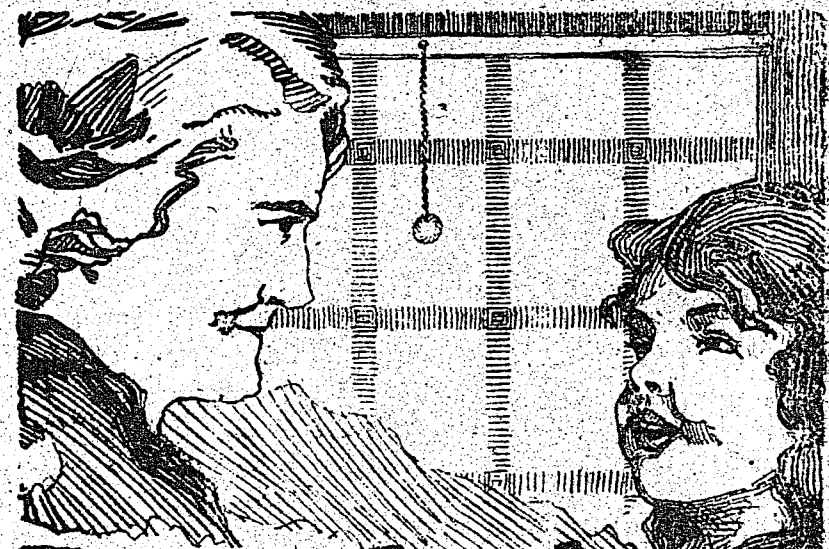
