**Local Committee Appointed.**  
It was the sense of Saturday's meeting to endorse and aid in forwarding the plans set out by the Salary Committee of the State Teachers' Association, which provides for a campaign of education in favor of removing the present 50 cent tax limit and which question will come up in the form of a constitutional amendment to be voted on in the general election next November.

For the purpose of raising paig it was decided to assess superintendents and principals \$1.00 each, high school teachers 75c, grade and rural teachers 50c. Half of the funds so raised will be retained in the county and half placed in the hands of the State Teachers' Association.

Any one who wants a gilt of this breed but does not have an order in may come also as we still have a surplus on hand.

This car of hogs is the one financed by the Coleman National Bank, and came from Illinois, being immunized against cholera at the Fort Worth Stock Yards, and are being put out at cost and sold on fall terms when arrangements for same are made.

## FRED CRUM GIN AT MELVIN BURNED

A fire originating in the boiler room of the Fred Crum gin at Melvin Monday night completely destroyed the gin plant and about 50 tons of cotton seed stored at the gin. About \$3,000 insurance was carried on the gin, which is estimated to be worth about \$7,000. The gin was built by O. C. Utsey in 1907 and sold to Mr. Crum about 4 years ago.

The loss is particularly heavy on Mr. Crum as the insurance did not cover hardly one-half of the value of the plant. The loss of this gin leaves Melvin with only one gin and there is yet lots of cotton left in the country to be ginned.

## JIM NED WELL FLOWS BY HEADS WITH TOOLS IN

**Well Has 128 Feet Oil Lime.**  
The hole has stood in oil since the fire which destroyed the derrick and let the tools in the hole, August 16, six months ago, and this week made several sensational flows by the tools and through the salt water which flooded in from above.

## WE MAY LOSE RURAL ROUTES UNLESS ROADS ARE MADE PASSABLE

There is the possibility of Coleman County losing some of its rural mail routes; unless the impassable mud barriers on the roads are fixed so that carriers can get by.

**Postmaster Warns Patrons.**  
On this subject Postmaster B. H. Pittman of Coleman, says:

"I desire to call the attention of the patrons on the three rural routes running out of Coleman to the terrible condition of the roads over which the carriers have to travel. There are a great many impassable places on all the roads and unless they are put in, at least passable condition, the routes are liable to be discontinued.

"Patrons will remember that when they petitioned for these routes they obligated themselves to see that roads were kept in good condition; therefore the patrons on the routes are supposed to see such obligations carried out.

"Carriers cannot afford to carry the mails month after month at pecuniary loss to themselves, but such has been the case for several months. If patrons want rural mail service, they should see that the roads are put in passable condition."—Democrat-Voice.

According to the information gained from one of our exchanges. There were more than five thousand suicides in the United States during 1919 and not a newspaper editor in the list of casualties. That is not because editors have more sense than others but because they are a bunch of fool optimists.

We hear a rumor concerning a building loan association which is being organized. This also sounds more like progress. We are always glad to tell of the developments of our little city and if you know of something that is going on and don't tell us, you are not doing your duty toward keeping our town on the map of progress.

Had you ever thought about the amount of building and repairing that is being done; so many of the already modern homes are being reconstructed and added to. Several new homes are under way and many are laying plans. The air of prosperity is passing over our little city. You had better wake up or she will get by you.

The farmer who raises his bread and meat this year, and a few bales of fifty cent cotton and other things, to sell, may have to pay a little income tax, but he'll have the money to pay with. This is the farmers' day and if they don't get their share of the prosperity while getting is good they should quit the farm and come to town and suffer with the poor folks who live out of paper sacks.

The country people are paying more attention just now to the raising of pure blooded chickens than ever before in the history of Brown county, according to the statement of people who are in a position to know. Hardly a day passes that pairs of fine chickens are not sent to rural communities and there are in the county at this time many flocks of pure blooded chickens.

Walter Ransberger has returned from a successful business trip to the lower Rio Grand Valley; he found the Valley green and flourishing with fine fruit growing lucious oranges and grapefruit till you couldn't "chin 'em," other fruit in abundance and vegetables. This is an ideal place to live and make your home. He and his wife leave this week for that part of the country.

In all cities, towns and most country districts, paint and clean up campaigns are being put on and with great results. Paint protects your homes and buildings and every one is more healthy when things are clean. Now is a good time to look things over as the spring work will soon be on and now is a good time. Take a look at our streets and alleys, do you find enough trash tin cans, etc., to make a huge bonfire?

Many of the trees in Santa Anna crippled and given a shaking up generally in the cold snap and its blanket of ice before Christmas and the severe spell a few days ago, are now being given a good trimming. The broken branches are being topped off and those not broken are being trimmed and pruned. It is said to be an "ill wind that blows nobody good," and so it may turn out that the little shake-up will do the trees more or less good, after all.

Houses for rent are in demand. Every house in Santa Anna that has been put in condition to live in, has been rented—and others are clamoring for houses. Will we permit these conditions to continue, and force these families to go else where because they can't find a home here! We must not. There are vacant houses here which are not occupied, but with a hundred dollars or so, could be put in repair and would soon pay for the repairing in rent money. It will only require a few gallons of paint, a few rolls of paper, a few window lights, a new door, and a little cleaning, which will cost but little, to put these houses in shape to rent. And they would sell for double what they would sell for as they stand. Why allow them to stand

when people are wanting homes—why not fix them up and rent them or sell them. These houses should be "fixed up" or torn down, as they give the strangers the "vacant stare" and he can't understand why those houses are in such conditions, if these people are as progressive as we have claimed them to be. We try to explain, but he "just can't understand." Let's fix 'em so they can understand. Tear them down, and rebuild or repair them as they stand. It will mean much to Santa Anna.

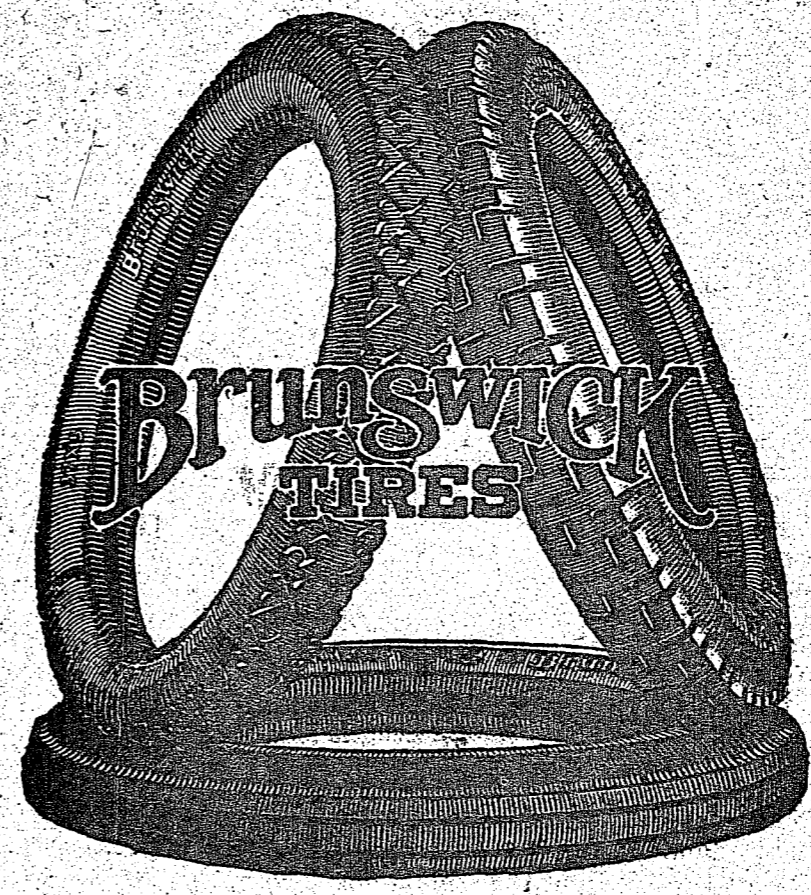

**INTERCHURCH MOVE IS OPPOSED BY BAPTISTS**

Following the announcement that the Interchurch World Movement will hold a conference in Dallas February 17, 18 and 19, and that pastors and representatives of all denominations

would be at the conference, Dr. F. S. Groner, secretary of the Baptist General Convention and general secretary of the Baptist Executive Board, has announced that the Baptist denomination will not be represented at the conference.

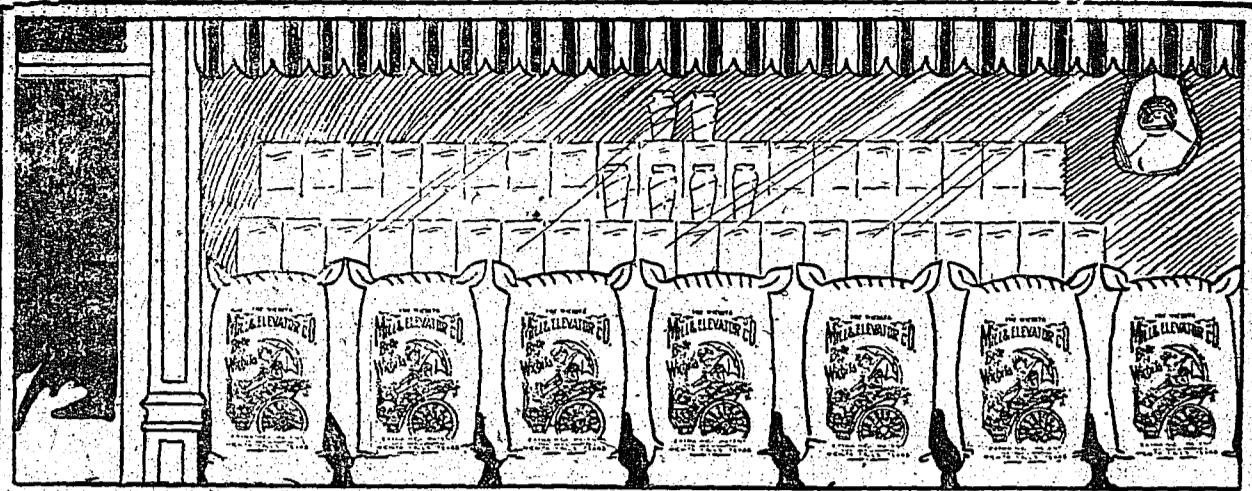
"My attention has been called to the announcement that the Interchurch World Movement headquarters for Texas has been established in Dallas and that they are to hold a conference here on the date mentioned," said Dr. Groner. "In order that the general public, as well as the Baptists, will not be confused by the announcement that all the denominations will be represented, it was thought best to announce that the Baptist denomination would not be officially represented nor will it participate in the movement's plans or programs. We have no connection whatever with the Interchurch World Movement and are in no wise related to its conferences and programs."

**Baptist Conventions Vote Against Movement**

"The Southern Baptist Convention at its 1919 session held in Atlanta last May, after careful and comprehensive consideration, officially declined to take part in the Interchurch World Movement as did the Baptist General Convention in its recent session in Houston. The action of the Southern Baptist Convention, which was made up of over 4200 messengers representing a constituency of more than 3,000,000 white Baptists, was practically unanimous, there being only two dissenting votes, and the action of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, representing a constituency of 350,000 white Baptists was absolutely unanimous and conclusive. It was thought that to avoid any confusion this statement ought to be given to the public to the end that the attitude of the Baptists toward the movement should not be misunderstood."

Baptist 75 Million Campaign a Success

Over \$90,000,000 has been subscribed in the Baptist 75 Million Campaign, reports Dr. Groner, who was state director in the campaign.

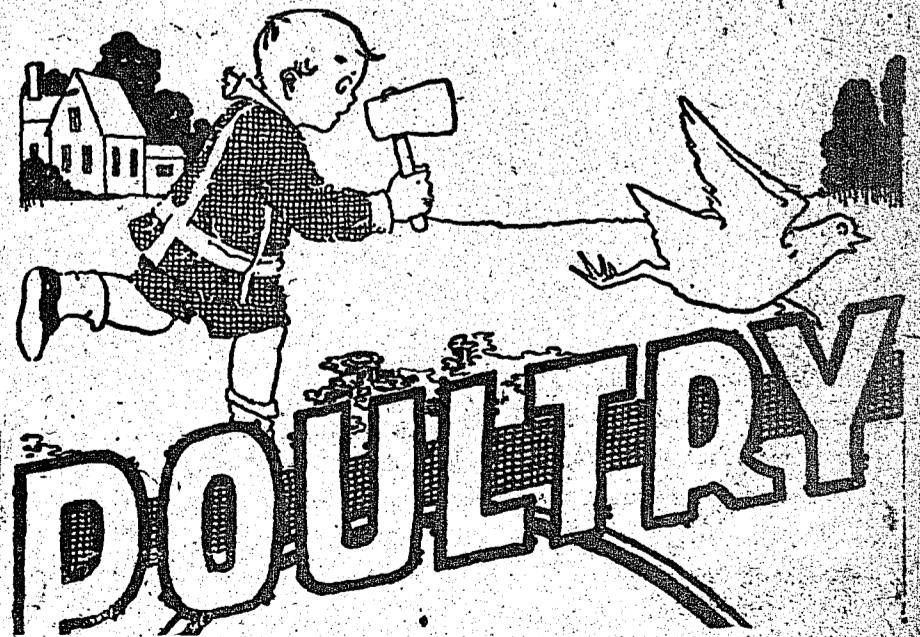

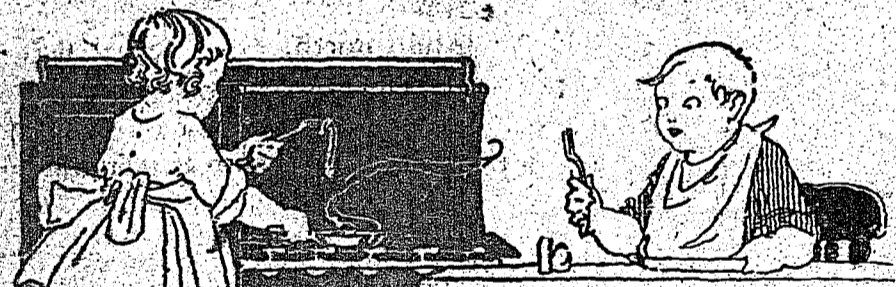
