Ft. Worth Business Men Will Arrange Tour Here October 5

Dave L. Tandy and Chas. G. Cotten, representing the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce, accompanied by Fort Worth newspaper men, were visitors in Santa Anna last week. While here they conferred with Lions Club officials and business men in connection with the visit which will be made by a large party of Fort Worth business executives in the course of their West Texas Good Will Tour, October 4-6. A visit will be made to Santa Anna Wednesday, October 5 from 4:40 to 5 p. m.

Tandy served as General Chairman of the executives' trip conducted by the Fort Worth Chamber of Commerce in April of this year, and is again acting in that capacity. Cotten is Manager of the Highway and Trade Extension Departments of the organization.

On the October trip the Fort Worth party will visit cities which were missed on the April trip. It is hoped to have 150 business men on the special train which will be used.

Cities included in the itinerary are: Weatherford, Strawn, Ranger, Eastland, San Angelo, Miles, Rowena, Ballinger, Meador, Brady, San Saba, Lometa, Cisco, Moran, Albany, Stamford, Hamilton, Coleman, Santa Anna, Brownwood, Lampasas, Killeen, Belton and Temple.

Local business men, headed by Dr. T. Richard Sealy will go to Coleman on that day and board the Fort Worth Special Train and come with the visitors to Santa Anna. Here they will be greeted by the band and will be given an official welcome by Dr. Sealy. A news photographer and a Fort Worth Star-Telegram reporter will accompany the group and will take pictures for a booklet the group is preparing.

A special feature of the program will be the presence of a local citizen dressed as the Indian Chief "Santana," for whom the citizens of this city intended the town should be named.

Reports from the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Census show that 3877 bales of cotton, counting round as half bales, were ginned in Coleman County from the 1938 crop before September 16 as compared with 4,351 bales by September 16 last year.

Mr. Willis states that about 60 students from here, members of the band and pep squad will attend. All will receive free tickets to the rodeo Tuesday night.

Director Willis attended a meeting of all divisional band directors at Sweetwater last Sunday. It was decided that the contest for this division will be held either at Abilene or San Angelo about April 1. Willis reported an interesting meeting.

Exhibition By Ad Topperwein Today At 3 P. M.

Adolph Topperwein, world famous exhibition shooter, will give a free performance in Santa Anna this afternoon, Friday, Sept. 30 at 3 o'clock at the local Golf Course. Mr. Topperwein, who can make his firearms do almost anything but talk, is coming here through courtesy of the Winchester Repeating Arms Company in cooperation with W. R. Kelley & Co. of Santa Anna.

Among his performances is the famous act of shooting cartons. He uses a flat sheet of tin and sitting before it, draws a head on an Indian of Uncle Sam or other portraits made by rapid fire shooting. It takes about 250 shots to draw a picture and he completes it in three or four minutes.

He also includes among his tricks the breaking of flying targets from all positions, including lying flat on his back. He uses mirrors to aid him in his trick of shooting directly in front and in back of him at the same time. He throws small objects into the air and hits them one by one as they descend.

Appropriate ground breaking ceremonies for the Texas Ex-Ranger Memorial Museum at Santa Anna were held here Monday morning at 10 o'clock at the building site in the Ranger Park.

The program was opened with an invocation by Rev. M. L. Womack of the Presbyterian Church and a song was led by Rev. R. Elmer Dunham of the Baptist Church. D. L. Pieratt, president of the Lions Club, spoke on the purpose of the museum and community building and the reason for selecting Santa Anna as the site for the memorial. The museum will house relics of Texas Ex-Rangers, particularly those who served in Santa Anna and Coleman County during the 1870's. It will also be a community building and when not in use by Ex-Rangers reunions and other meetings, the auditorium will be used by civic clubs for meetings and entertainments.

Mr. Pieratt further pointed out the reason for choosing Santa Anna as the site, since the Rangers of the '70's served in this territory and have since voted it their permanent home for their annual reunions.

One of the most touching scenes of the program was the digging of the first spade of ground by C. M. Grady of Brownwood, Ex-Ranger who served in Santa Anna. He has been bedridden for several months this year following a fall. Mr. Grady, still on crutches, spoke of how much this museum meant to the Ex-Rangers and voiced their appreciation to Santa Anna for their donations to the building.

A wreath of flowers was placed on the spot by Mayor Leman Brown on behalf of the city, followed by a brief history of the lives of the Ex-Rangers by V. L. Grady.

Actual construction of the stone building began Tuesday, Sept. 27, under supervision of Roy Galloway, NYA supervisor, and Leeper Gay, engineer.

"Musical Album" To Be Presented By Band Mothers

"A Musical Album" will be presented at the high school auditorium Thursday, October 13 under the direction of the local Band Mothers Club and the musical and novel program will use members of the high school band and local citizens as characters. Proceeds will go to the Band Fund for buying band equipment, sponsoring band trips and entertaining the band.

The cast and directors of the play will be entirely made up of local citizens.

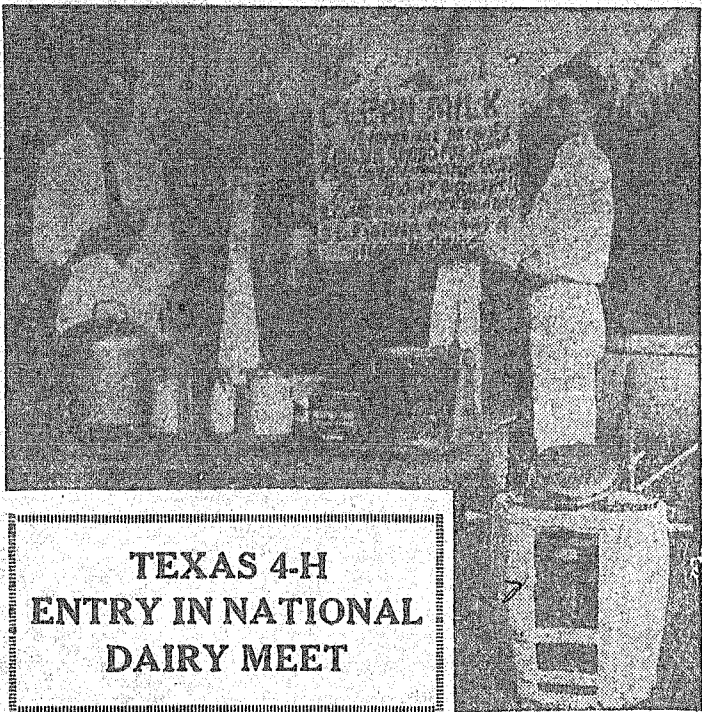
Murdock Transferred New Deputy Supt. To Arrive This Week

TEXAS 4-H ENTRY IN NATIONAL DAIRY MEET

PAUL ADAMS, 18, and Ivey Miller, 16, both of Pickett in Hopkins County, will represent the State in the National 4-H Dairy Production Demonstration Contest at the National Dairy Show in Columbus, Ohio, October 8 to 15. The contest is being conducted by the Extension Service throughout the Nation for the second year, and is designed to improve methods on dairy farms. The state winning team won over pairs from 12 other counties and was awarded the trip by State Club Leader L. L. Johnson. The boys demonstrated the

production of clean milk, showing the best utensils and the procedure to follow, and were coached by Assistant County Agent J. W. McFatridge. They receive all-expense trips to Columbus through the Kraft-Phenix Cheese Corporation, which is also giving a total of \$2,800.00 in college scholarships to the two highest ranking teams in each of the four Extension Sections. Last year L. C. Love and James Dean of Eastland County represented the State in the national finals.

Street Service Here Saturday

Precinct 2 Will Receive Aid In Road Improvement

Approval of a WPA project for improvement of 11.55 miles of Precinct 2, most of which will be on the Coleman-Rockwood road should be obtained in a few days and work orders are now expected from San Antonio. Total amount to be used on the improvement of these roads in Precinct 2, is \$64,992. Of this amount the Federal agency will provide \$45,708 and the county \$19,283.

Other work orders are expected soon to begin work on a new road, from Glen Cove to the Coleman-Balling road. This will be 21-2 miles long and will cover parts of Precincts 1, 3, and 4. Also 5.62 miles in the county will be improved.

Work has been completed on roads from Voss to Leaday and from Voss to Stacy at a cost of \$36,957. The project covered 15.2 miles.

Electric Lines For Coleman Co-op Are Being Extended

Work on the first 100-mile line of the Coleman County Rural Electric Cooperative, Inc. on the Coleman-Shield road is progressing with speed and much work has already been completed on the second 100-mile contract which includes line to Silver Valley, Novice, Goldsboro and Oplin.

A total of 320 paid subscribers has been obtained on the second line, according to S. R. Hale, superintendent for the cooperative. He has also received right-of-way along the line. This information must be sent to Washington, together with maps, and approval from the Rural Electrification Administration is necessary before construction of the extension can begin.

Santa Anna Loses To Cross Plains

Santa Anna Mountaineers lost to Cross Plains Buffaloes Friday night in a tight game which until the last quarter was scoreless. In the last minute of play the Buffaloes scored a touchdown but failed to kick goal, making the score 6-0. This was the second game in the District 25-B which Santa Anna has played this year.

The game opened with Cross Plains kicking to Santa Anna, who returned the ball from the 22 yard line to the 35 yard line, with Oakes carrying the ball.

Santa Anna continued showing their aerial passes throughout the game. In the first quarter Oakes of Santa Anna passed and ball was intercepted by Lackey of Cross Plains. Cross Plains kicked the ball to Santa Anna's 15 yard line. A pass from Oakes to Nichols for 20 yards was completed, but two incomplete passes by the Santa Anna eleven forced Santa Anna to return the ball to the Buffaloes by kicking to McMillan, with the ball resting at the end of the first quarter on the 40 yard line.

In the second quarter McMillan fumbled after 30 yard gain and Santa Anna recovered on Santa Anna's 35 yd. line. Santa Anna made only 6 yards on three plays and Oakes kicked to McMillan who returned the ball to 33 yd. line. Line plunges failed to gain necessary 10 yds. and ball was returned to Santa Anna. A series of incomplete passes again returned ball to Cross Plains by punting, with McMillan returning to the 32 yd. line. Cross Plains was unable to penetrate the Mountaineer line and ball again changed hands with Santa Anna punting again to Cross Plains after three unsuccessful attempts at a first down. McMillan passed to Walker who ran 50 yards to the 25 yard line to be stopped by Nichols who overtook him. Santa Anna recovered a fumble of Cross Plains on the Mountaineer 24 yard line.

Second half of the game was a repetition of ball changing between teams on failures to make first downs. Wolfe of Santa Anna intercepted a pass from Pierce to Barclay on the Mountaineer 10 yard line. Oakes kicked to Lackey on fourth down and ball was returned 15 yards to the 19 yard line to end the third quarter.

In the fourth quarter in the last minute of play, with the ball in possession of the Buffaloes, Santa Anna received a 5 yard penalty for off-side, placing the ball on the Mountaineer 2 yard line. Cross Plains gained about a yard and a half on three plays, with Lackey drying through the line on the fourth play to a touchdown. Walker tried for the kick but failed.

Downs made by both teams by quarters were: Santa Anna, 3, first quarter; 1, second quarter; 1, third quarter; 1, first quarter. Cross Plains, 2, first quarter; 1, second quarter; 3,

Saturday, October 1 is the day scheduled for the school bond election called by the Santa Anna School Board, who, if the vote is favorable will be authorized to issue bonds for \$27,500 to aid in constructing a new elementary school. If the bond election shows the people favor this plan, the Federal government then will give the School District a grant or gift of \$22,500 for the building, if plans submitted to PWA officials are approved.

The Santa Anna Independent School District would thus pay 55 per cent of the cost, the government paying 45 per cent. The loan of \$27,500, which will be voted on Saturday, would be obtained from sale of 4 per cent 30 year Irregular Serial Bonds which would have to be voted by the resident tax paying qualified voters of the Santa Anna Independent School District.

Voters qualified are to cast their ballots at the City Hall Saturday with W. E. Ragsdale, A. R. Brown and John Lowe holding the election. Here, quoting from the statement issued September 16 by the Board of Education, is the proposition:

"Shall the Board of Trustees of Santa Anna Independent School District be authorized to issue the bonds of said district in the amount of \$27,500 to become due and payable serially, 1942 to 1968, and bearing interest not to exceed 4 per cent per annum, payable semi-annually for the purpose of CONSTRUCTING AND EQUIPPING AN ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BUILDING, and if there shall be annually levied and collected on all taxable property in said school district for the current year and annually thereafter while said bonds are outstanding a tax sufficient to pay the current interest on said bonds and to pay the principal thereof as same becomes due?"

Again quoting from the published statement of the Board on September 16:

"It is possible to issue these bonds with no increase in the present rate of valuations. This has been made possible by virtue of the Board's having refunded the \$100,000 issue of 1927 in April of this year at 4 per cent whereas the old issue was bearing 5 1-2 per cent. This effected a net saving of approximately \$15,000 to the district."

School Bond Election Saturday, October 1

Santa Anna will probably never have another opportunity for many years to obtain a new elementary school building as reasonably as it can now. If citizens vote favorably Saturday, October 1, at the school bond election called by the Board of Education of the Santa Anna Independent School District. Here is a chance to build a new school to give our children better equipment and safer surroundings for a sum which WILL NOT INCREASE PRESENT RATE OR VALUATIONS ON TAXABLE PROPERTY.

Quoting from the statement issued two weeks ago by the Board of Education: "It is possible to issue these bonds with no increase in the present rate on valuations. This has been made possible by virtue of the Board's having refunded the \$100,000 issue of 1927 in April of this year at 4 per cent whereas the old issue was bearing 5 1/2 per cent. This offset of 1 1/2 per cent of approximately \$15,000 to the district."

The bonds if approved by the vote Saturday, and government application for loan and grant is approved will be issued in the amount of \$275,000. This money will be matched with a grant of \$225,000 from the PWA and is in the nature of a gift which will not have to be paid back.

It is not often that the school district is handed out a gift of 1 1/2 per cent of the cost of a building and if the gift is turned down doesn't may never be extended again. Any delay in constructing the building under the present arrange-

ments may postpone or cancel erection of a new elementary building which is needed so urgently.

School officials, pupils and the great majority of patrons who have children in school can realize the need for a new school. It has not been long ago that the building was under process of being condemned as unsafe for use, unless extensive repairs were made immediately. Such repairs were made to keep the building from being condemned, but repairs on an old building are comparatively temporary and more are needed continually. The building was at that time considered a fire hazard and falling plaster in many of the rooms at the present time certainly does not increase safety to children and teachers.

All of our school children need the best protection for health and safety and need the best chance possible for an education under pleasant and secure conditions as well as modern equipment. If a new building is not obtained soon the children and teachers cannot possibly work in the present building without extensive repairs which in the long run would be quite expensive since they will have to be repeated from time to time.

Since the school is needed and since it can be obtained by issuing bonds with no increase in present rate or total valuations and since now is perhaps the only time that the school district can receive a gift of 45 per cent of the needed building fund, school patrons are urged to voice their opinion Saturday at the polls.

Only resident qualified property tax payers who have rendered their property for 1938 taxes to school tax assessor are eligible to vote in this election.

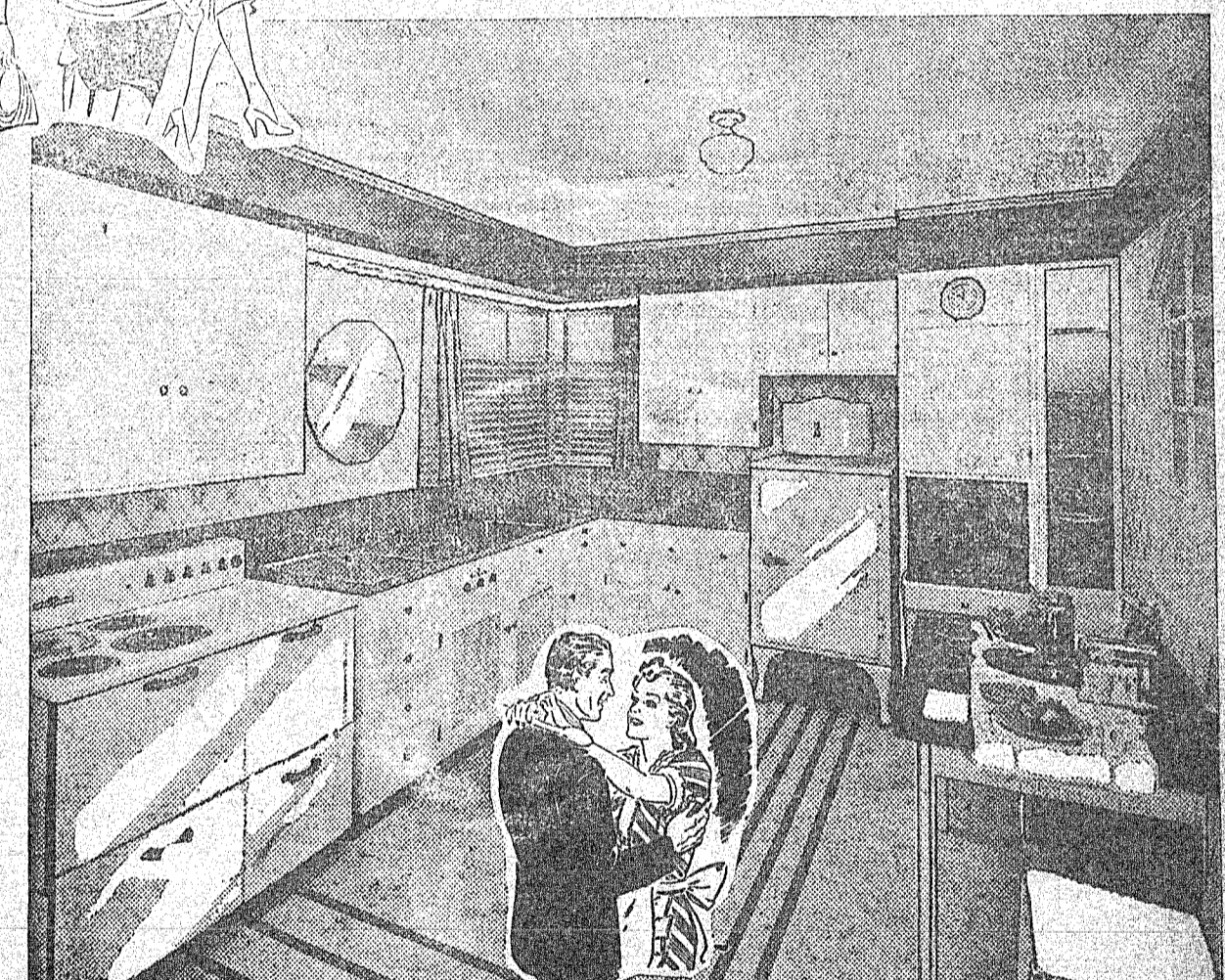
