 Stete capitolat Aunta，and wiet his soplemdid trumph tn arch ecture，says the Texas Comme ial Secretaries Aspociation．It is the largest state eapital in the
Upited States and approaches the national capitol in area and excels it in grandeur．It is the eeventh largest building in the vorld．It was built exclusively from Texas materials and stands the matchless and varied re－ sources of ont great states 10 erect this building the state gave the contractors a block，of coun－ ties equal in area to the grant which King James gave to the tablish a colony in America and which is now the state of Con－ necticut．A description of the ouilding follows：
600 feet from building measures 600 feet from east to west：from north to south it measures 287 top of the dome 313 feet，the than the national capitol，the latter being ony 307 feet；the putside of the lezas capitol is

The Santa Fe cut－off which is being constructed from Cole man，Texas，to Texico，N．M．，is being completed，according to officials of fthe Santa Fe in this city．Trainloads of steel and ties are being rushed to the scene of tracklaying near Sweetwater． In the construction of this line only the heaviest of steel is be－ ing used and the most substan－ tial of ties Ever to han tie plates and eightspikes．Temm porary wooden bridges put in by the system on this line just be－ fore the track was laid are being removed and modern reinforced concrete structures are takihg their places．

\section*{THAT DEPOSLTORY ARTICLE}

It may seem to an outsider that a newspaper man ought always to be able to express himself so plainly that no one could misconstrue hismeaning, but every editor, no matter how careful he is and no matter how good his intentions are will occasionally have his words misconstrued even by his friends

In an article in last weeks paper the News showed how the school board was making a clear saving of \(\$ 150\) per annum in handling the school funds \(\uparrow\) We thought this commendable so we said: "This is pretty good economy the school board has adopted." We meant this as a compliment to the board. Imagine then our: surprise when a member of the board accused us of speaking these wordsin irony and as a criticism of the aetion of the board. He is a friend of the News and wouldn't have accused us of this if he hadn't really thought the article was written in a spirit de eriticism. He was kind enough to accept our word whe we explained that the sentence was written in commendation and not in irony, or with any thought irony.

In another feature of the same article, however, we really did another man an injustice. We stated that last year was the first year that the school funds drew interest, when as a matter of fact Mr. W. R. Kelley kept the funds the year before and paid five per cent interest on them, and received no salary for his work. We knew this at the time we wrote the article but somehow it slipped our mind. All we can say in extenuation of this injustice to Mr. Kelley is that it was wholly unintentional and that we regret it more than anyone else does.

\section*{A REMARKABLE RECORD}

On another page of this paper our readers will find a review of the work of the Campbell administration, outlining briefly the more important legislation passed since Gov. The laws passed during this administration have been severely criticized by some of the city dailies-who, by the way, usually stand closer to the big corporations than they do to the people -and by men whose unholy grafts have been disturbed by this legislation: In addition, quite a good many honest people have been led by the city press to believe that the financial interests of the state were being injured and that for eign cantal was being driven away by eign capal was belng istration. We are inclined to believe that nine tenths of those who disapprove of the legislation passed during Mr. Campbell's administration get their opinions second handed. If among all these laws, any of our readers can find half a dozen that are objectionable and ought to be repealed we shall be glad to have you write the-New's pointing out these particular aws and stating why they are objectionable. It is very difficult to make a law that is absolutely perfect and it is more than likely that some of these laws are defective in some particulars but as a whole we consider them the finest lot of laws ever made during any administration in the history of the state. And so tor as able to see no lar as ar interst has been injured-inbusin should any honest buisiness deed why should a fear any just law. on hae contrary millonso the state and has found hones, proitable and safe investment, and tens of thousands of immigrants have found nothing in our laws to deter them making the Lone Star state their home.

Last week's elections have assured us hat a new political party has arisen within the nation. The victories of the insurgents over the stand-pat Republicans in Wisconsin, Michigan and New Hampshire added to the victories previously achieved in Kansas, Nebraska, Iowa and California are proof sufficient that these so colled "insurgents" have already attained to the proportions of a national party.

These insurgents differ as widely from the old line Republicans as the Democrats do--indeed there are some Democrats` who were more in accord with Cannon and Aldrich during the last-session of Congress than were the insurgents, who are really in sympathy with many of Mr. Bryan's ideas of government, and who had much rather see the Democrats triumph than their an cient enemie the stand-pat Republicans.

Replying to some recent comments on census estimates for the South - estimates that, owing largely ta the wonderful development and growth of that section during the past ten years, the total population of the country will exceed ninety millions and that the South will probably get a large increase in its representation in the national house of representatives and in the electoral college-the Philadelphia Press takes occasion to point out the fact that New York gained ten members of congress by the census of 1820 , when "the new Erie canal was bringing New York state abounding prosperity." The New Orleans TimesDemoerte feels warranted in predicting that Texas alone may gain nine congressmen by the latest enumeration, if the basis of representation remain unchanged \({ }^{\mathrm{F}} \mathrm{an}\) unprecedented gain," it says. And it proceeds to make these interesting comparisons'and calculations: \\
- The basis of representation in 1820 was only forty thousand, one-fifth of what it is to day; so that New York's gain of ten congressnen in 1820, when it had twenty-seven congressmen altogether, would have amounted to two at the present time; and the state would then have had only six or at most seven representatives. The new census will show Texas to have increased five times as much during the last decade as New York did in the decade 1810-1820 and more than twice as much as the Empire State has in the past ten years. \\
"The press admits that the Southwest will gain in congress,
\end{tabular} & \begin{tabular}{l}
but it declared the Suuthern states fartherest east will be fortunate if the new apportionment makes no reduction in their representation in congress." But even in the last decade, when the growth of Southern population was not as marked as it is today, the South gained nearly one-half the total increase in representation, or fifteen out of thirty-four new members. \\
"No Southern state lost, six stood stationary, and nine increased one or more congress. men, while of the twenty-nine Northern and Western states, fifteen remained stationary and fourteen gained in representation. We believe that the South will make a far better showing relatively this time." \\
When the population of both states are considered in connection with their selative increase and the relative increase in their congressional representationduring fifty years, it ought to surprise nobody if Texas shows up with twenty-five congressmen following the next apportionment. \\

Fort Worth, Texas, Sept. 14. The Texas Commercial Secretar ies Association recently sent out inquiries to commercial clubs throughout the state asking for an estimate of money to be ex pended on the improvements to public highways during the year 1911, and the replies received in dicate that there will be approxi mately \(\$ 20,000,000\) of bonds issued for building and improving public highways during the coming year.
The judicious expenditure of this enormous sum now constitutes the most important economic question before the people of Texas and the secretaries in all probability will submit the problem for solution to the 32 nd Legislature with the suggestion that a Public, Highway Depart ment be established to intelligently supervise the expenditure of thismoney. The construction of a publie highway is as mucha and technical questions are always involved with which local road officials are not presumed to be familiar and experience 1 is known to be a very expens. There is nothing that discourages the tax payer so much as to fail to receive satis. factory returns for his inyestment in public improvements and to properly safeguard and intelligently direct the expenditure of the bond money is a question that should receive consideration of thoughtful citizens.
