## Plans Completed For Rug and Mat Show

The exhibit committee composed of Mrs. Estelle Flippen of Coleman and Mrs. R. F. Watson of Santa Anna have made plans for the Rug and Mat Show to be held October 29th by the Home Demonstration Clubs of the county, and are this week announcing regulations for the show.

The show will be held in Coleman at the J. E. Stevens Co. Assisting the exhibit committee will be an arrangement committee composed of Mrs. Frank Gillespie, Mrs. Sanford Tune and Mrs. Frank Brewer, and a hostess committee consisting of Mrs. Willie Henderson, Mrs. Raymond McElrath and Mrs. Ray Jameson.

Every hooked rug and mat is to be labeled. The labels are to be made from pieces of starched cloth, 2 inches by 3 inches when hemmed, and sewed on right side of rug or mat along one edge. The labels will give the kind of rug or mat, the lady's name, address and club.

The rugs are to be carried to J. E. Stevens store between 10 a. m. and 3 p. m. on Thursday, October 27. First, second and third places will be awarded in the following divisions: hooked silk rugs and mats; hooked cotton rugs and mats; hooked woolen rugs and mats.

Special notice will be given to clubs having most rugs and mats. The hooked rugs and mats will be on exhibit all day Saturday, October 29. The public is invited to see them. A few rugs will be for sale.

All teachers in the county are invited to attend, according to an announcement made by Supt. W. R. Chambers of Burkett.

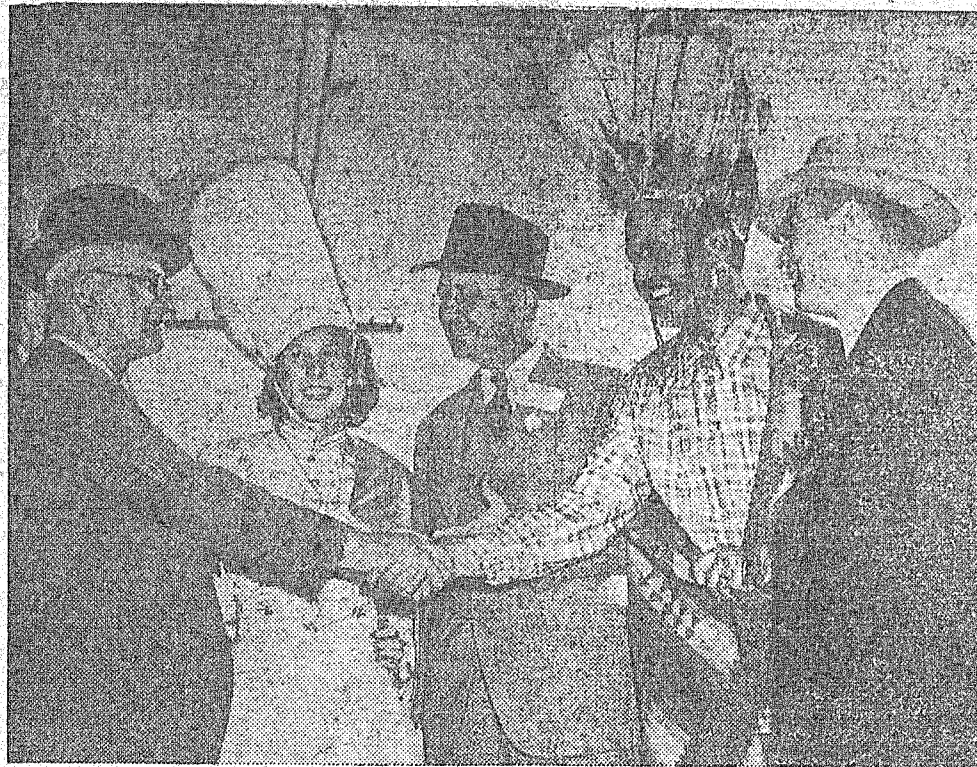

And the Santa Anna Mountaineers did win a game. Last week the local football eleven journeyed North to Twinkling City and downed that school's contribution to high school football 13-6 in a game that was packed with thrills from start to finish.

The ball game was definitely Santa Anna's and there was no fluke or luck that contributed to the winning score, in fact old lady luck seemed to have thumbs down on the local club. Four times within the short first quarter the Mountaineers were within scoring distance only to lose the ball on fumbles or penalties. The opening tally came shortly after the second period started when Vernon Oakes, Mountaineer safety man took a Wildcat punt on his own forty-five yard marker, and behind some neat blocking and himself doing the "dip-doodle" through the defense raced the remaining distance for the score. Their next score came in the latter part of the third period when Lee Schattel, center, intercepted a Wildcat fumble in mid-air and chugged off eighty yards and over the pay stripe.

The Wildcats lone marker came in the final stanza when one of the Wildcat pass receivers managed to get behind the Mountaineers secondary, snared a beautiful pass and stepped over the goal line for their only score. There was quite a discussion on this play as it looked as if the Wildcat end was off-side, but the play was allowed and the score remained 13-6.

### WELL EXPLODES; THREE INJURED SERIOUSLY

Three men, John S. Simpson of Coleman, John Knox Jr. of Midland and W. P. Lacy of Midland were seriously burned Thursday afternoon when a gas well explosion occurred on the L. L. Baker place northeast of town. Ambulances brought them to the Sealy Hospital about 4 p. m.

Simpson, who was the most seriously injured, is in a very dangerous condition, suffering burns on almost all of his body and on his face. He also suffered a broken arm.

Knox has extensive burns on about three-fifths of his body and Lacy has besides burns on about three-fifths of his body, a compound fracture of the right leg.

The 'Go' Sign Flashes And West Texas Is Ready

With fall rains starting to fall in the West Texas ranch country and rising wool prices reaching highest levels for more than a year, this region happily can join the rest of the nation which jubilantly is looking forward to increases in every line of business since the removal of war threats. That the green light is flashing a "Go" signal is shown by this week's report of the Federal Reserve Board, which notes a general increase in industrial activity, with the upswing most marked in the textile and steel industries. The report is of more than usual interest to West Texas because it was inactivity of the textile industry that brought the slump in wool prices; and now, with factories busy again, the demand for wool is bringing with it a price which in recent days has gone to as high as 26 cents, a cent over the "quarter" to which so many looked as a "top" only a short time ago. Threats of war in Europe unquestionably had a depressing effect on business; but, with these threats now removed, a more hopeful spirit is seen as prevailing in practically all lines of business. The optimism, itself, has given business a start—the ball has started rolling; fears of a drought have been removed; inflated inventories of last autumn have been reduced and current buying is keeping pace with consumption; and bank deposits in many cities have reached an all-time high. The darkness before the dawn was a war threat, now pushed out of the way; and, accumulated buying power is being turned loose to bear out prophecies of the nation's industrial chieftains that once more an active business is to be enjoyed by those who make an effort to get their share. —San Angelo Morning-Times



your rig around. Mrs. Harvey, a faded bit of old England, was sitting on the porch with you, and Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Kingsbery likely drove by in their rubber-tired Victoria drawn by two shining horses.

The cotton wagons were jammed in the streets those falls and farmers were paying off their land notes and their year-long grocery bills. Colonel Chambers and Colonel Walters and Colonel Weaver were getting old. Mr. G. D. McDonald, quiet and brilliant, adored by his students, superintended the 10 grades of school, where each student had 8 or 10 classes a day; there were no elective courses and before he could graduate he must translate Caesar and Cicero and Virgil, work algebra, geometry, and trigonometry. I have studied whole libraries of English classics, know the history and geography of the world, be able to debate on Civil Government and know how to spell.

The preachers packed the old tabernacle in those days at revival meetings. Brother W. B. Holland and Brother Allen, with his big golden harp, caused traffic jams every night, horses being hitched to every post all the way up to Herndon's Earnest crowds listened to those sermons in the flickering light of the gasoline torches. Nobody was too young or too old to go, except Mrs. Tooke, who didn't get about much any more.

We had a pretty good float-load of Civil War veterans in the Fireman's Picnic Parades on April 21st; they looked frail, but when the band played you should remember their rousing Rebel Yell! John R. Banister, home from his Border Patrol service, led some of those parades on his matchless dappled gray Ranger, while little Travis Hays, handling his pony like a man, rode by his side.

ren's heads poking from every opening, the "old woman" holding the reins with the least baby on her lap. They had to drive around to the back streets though for the women to get out, as the long step from wheel to hub couldn't be made without showing her shoes and maybe even a little of her stocking.

mountain" and Colonel Mahoney was selling his ranch which reached to the edge of town, to farmers in small tracts.

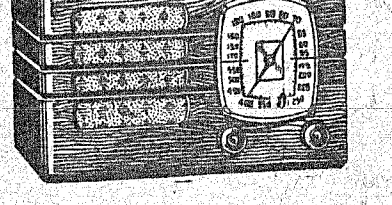
As the years passed, the Shield Bank and Shield Hall were dominant threads in the tapestry of Santa Anna. Here Erin Boyd thrilled us when she recited:

Mrs. Sanford Tune, home food supply demonstrator in the Live-at-Home Home Demonstration Club, says that food may be "fit for a king" and yet simple and easily prepared. A wise homemaker will see to it that the dishes she prepares for her family are attractive in appearance and interesting in flavor.

Mrs. Tune's favorite dish is to arrange salmon bacon pats,

buttered carrot slices, green peas and baked pear halves on a platter. The salmon-bacon pats are prepared as follows: 1 cup of soft bread crumbs is combined with 1 slightly beaten egg and 1-2 salmon juice from cans of salmon.
