## Debts Of 86 State Families Reduced Last Month By FSA

Substantial debt reduction on more than 35,000 acres of Texas farm land in 86 farms was effected last month by the farm debt adjustment section of the Farm Security Administration, according to Leon C. Ranson, FSA's supervisor for Coleman County, who issued a plea for farmers who face foreclosure or need adjustment of their debts to come to this office at Coleman.

"Don't wait until your farm home has been foreclosed and then write President Roosevelt," Mr. Ranson said. "Then it is too late." Members of the debt adjustment committee are local men who are experienced in this work and are interested in seeing that both debtor and creditor are "fairly represented," he added. ## Fine Rains Fall Throughout Texas

Farmers, ranchmen and the people in general have splendid cause to be optimistic over the outlook for a better year in 1939. The fine rains throughout the country this week have greatly increased the prospects for small grain, early grazing and plenty of stock water for the present.

Reports coming from over the state indicate the rain has been most general and the long drought has been broken with plenty of moisture. Some sections report as much as five inches, tapering down to two and three inches with but a minimum of damage. Some damage was wrought in a cloudburst at Odessa, a terrific windstorm did some damage in the vicinity of Cisco, and Dallas also reported some damage from wind. The damages reported were offset several times by the benefit derived from the mid-winter rains.

## County Officials Salaries To Be Same As In 1938

Members of the Coleman county commissioners' court have voted to make county officials' salaries the same in 1939 as in 1938, "subject to the action of the legislature."

All office holders with the exception of the county attorney and the county treasurer remain the same, \$3,000 per year. The county attorney receives \$216.75 per month while the county treasurer's salary is \$166.66 per month.

Both the county agent and the county home demonstration agent were re-employed for a period of one year at a yearly salary of \$800 each—the county agent's part. County Agent C. V. Robinson and Chrystene Trowbridge, county home demonstration agent, receive additional salary from the federal government.

## Oscar And Family Swim To McInnis Ranch From Island

Oscar, the ungrateful brute, and his family of three evidently do not like their pretty, but isolated, home on McCartney Island in the middle of Lake Brownwood. The four buffalo placed on the 175-acre island several weeks ago, early last week were found wandering around in the McInnis Ranch, across Lake Brownwood from the island. It is presumed they swam across, as no one reported seeing four buffalo driving an outboard motor boat.

There is little danger, however, of a buffalo herd of four descending on Brownwood. The McInnis Ranch, a game preserve containing several deer, is well fenced.

It is understood the buffalo will be severely reprimanded and taken back to the island and told to stay there.

Oscar could not be reached for a statement of why he left the island.

The animals were presented to the Lake Brownwood State Park by the United States Biological Survey. They came from the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge near Cacca, Oklahoma. (Brownwood Bulletin)

## Death Toll In Texas Decreases For Year 1938

Austin, Texas, January 10.—State police closed their 1938 death book today and showed a gain of 23 percent in the encounter between man and vehicle.

As a result there are 464 motorists and pedestrians alive in Texas today who had the previous year's record been continued would be dead. The 1938 death count rose to 7,579 persons, but remained far under the 1937 all-time high mark of 2,043 dead.

Strict supervision over reckless and speeding drivers, educational work, engineering and public opinion performed by the state highway department, said Homer Garrison, Jr., public safety director, who had ordered Texas Highway patrolmen concentrated at points where death had successfully walked most of its victims in 1937.

Christmas holidays were graced with discouraging weather conditions which vaulted the death figures to an estimated 30 persons, but unofficial returns for the month of December showed a drop of 65 under that month of the previous year when 230 Texas travelers were killed.

Lowered speeds and more alertness on the part of drivers, Director Garrison pointed out, brought about a decrease of 1,189 among the year's injured. The total injury group included 14,994 persons, many of them never to walk again, the reports stated. A stronger driver's license law made effective in late 1937 was given credit in the safety march for removing three percent of permit applicants from behind steering wheels.

A month by month comparison of the two years—1937 and 1938—revealed death reductions every month of the latter year with the exception of March. The lowest death month in 1938 was April with 94, the highest being the estimated 165 deaths in December. Similarly, sharp drops occurred in the injured persons columns.

Speaking of traffic law enforcement Garrison said an addition of 100 highway patrolmen to the force of 200 last June permitted expansions of patrol stations and a high increase in the number of arrests for reckless and drunken driving. "Even with the limited body of 300 officers to maintain

## Texas Farmers To Receive \$42,000,000 From 1938 AAA

College Station.—More than 360,000 Texas farmers and ranchmen who adopted the AAA's Agricultural Conservation Program in 1938 will receive approximately \$42,000,000 in conservation payments to be distributed for the most part in January, February and March of 1939, according to current AAA estimates.

George Slaughter, Texas Agricultural Conservation Committee chairman, said computation of payments is in full swing at AAA headquarters here and that checks will start going to producers about January 15.

He urged those eligible for payment to send in their applications for grant as early as possible, explaining that the state office cannot begin distribution of checks to a given county until at least 25 percent of that county's applications for payment have been received.

Total 1938 payments will exceed the aggregate of 1937 checks by about \$9,000,000, and the bulk of conservation grants will be issued considerably earlier this year, Slaughter predicted.

The money will go to cotton, wheat, rice and peanut farmers who substituted soil-conserving crops for some of their soil-depleting cash crops, and for carrying out other soil-building practices, and to ranchmen who have sought to improve and protect grazing land according to AAA range program specifications.

Slaughter represented these payments as "at least a step toward equalization of burdens imposed upon the man behind the plow by tariffs and freight rate differentials."

He commended the work of local traffic officers and safety associations of the state and cities in keeping the death record below the figure of the preceding year.

The safety official blamed a lack of vigilance on the part of drivers for many of the deaths, and pointed to the state law which gives vehicles approaching from the right clearance over all other travelers and the statute that was most violated in circumstances leading to collisions.

Speeding vehicles that do not have clearance in overtaking and passing others were responsible for the hundreds of fatal head-on collisions, he declared.

## Coleman County Cotton Acreage Is Unchanged

Cotton farmers who cooperate with the federal government's plans will plant just about the same amount of cotton this year as they did last year, according to County Agent C. V. Robinson.

Where the factor last year was 30.8 percent it is increased this year to 31.7 percent. That difference would mean the estimated acreage would be less than 100 acres.

Approximately 70,000 acres were planted to cotton in Coleman County last year.

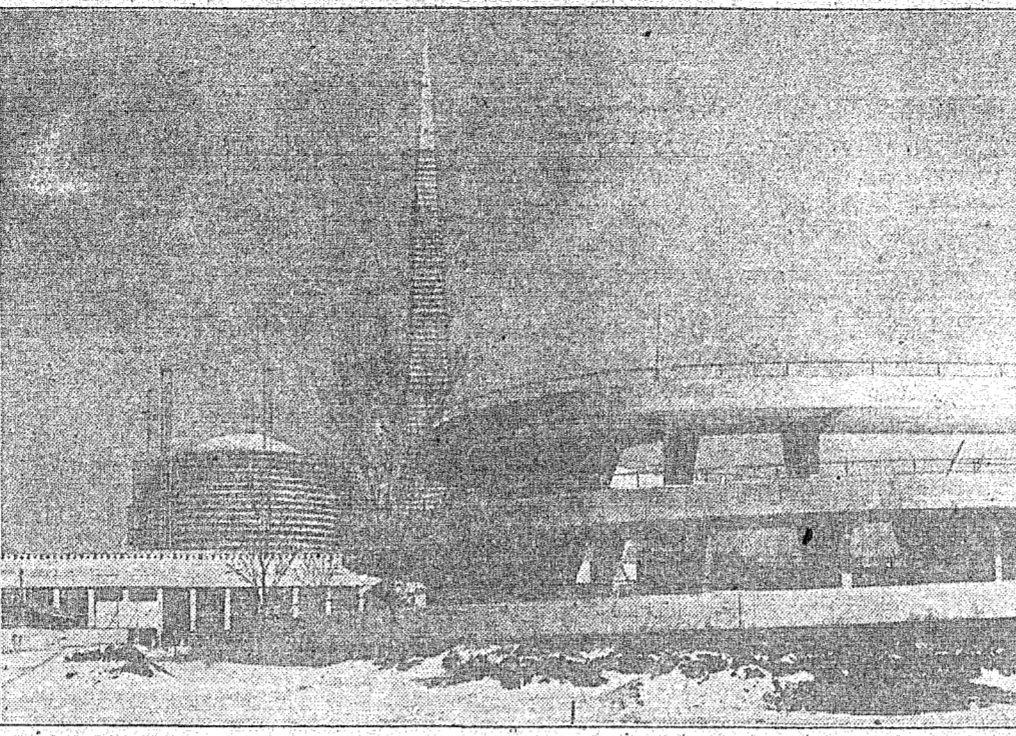

## Number Two Miler Dogs Heels Of World's Champion

Denton, Texas — By virtue of his magnificent showing in the featured mile at the Sugar Bowl in New Orleans on "New Year's Day," Blaine Rideout, the larger of the famous North Texas State Teachers' College underpath twins, won recognition as the second best miler in the nation this season and gained an invitation to run in the famous Wanamaker mile at the Millrose Games in New York City February 5.

Rideout finished one stride behind the great Glen Cunningham, world's record holder, at New Orleans. Cunningham's time of 4:10.7 was the fastest mile ever run in the South and the fastest ever run at this time of year out of doors. Rideout's time in the event was 4:10.8, as he finished a good 40 yards ahead of the third runner, Don Lash of Indiana.

Also invited to run at Millrose is twin brother Wayne Rideout, world's record holder in the two-thirds mile run, who will be entered in that event.

## Health Program Increases in 1938

Austin, Texas, January 10.—The Texas State Department of Health is facing one of the most critical stages in the history of its existence, states Dr. Holman Taylor, Secretary, State Medical Association of Texas.

"The rapid expansion of the public health program during the past few years in Texas has been due in part to the increased interest of the citizens in the need for a more adequate program of health protection and a more emphatic demand that these services be given through the State Department of Health," Dr. Taylor further states.

"If these demands are to be satisfactorily met and the people in all parts of the state gain the reasonable health protection to which they are entitled, the following fundamental needs of the Department should be met for the next biennium.

1. A substantial increase in the amount of funds for the support of the central administration.

2. Adequate appropriation for

the promotion of a successful anti-venereal disease program.

3. The passage of a new up-to-date sanitary code in line with the national code.

4. Sufficient monies to be used as an equalization fund for promotion of local health work in the financially weaker cities and counties.

5. An increase in the number of public health districts, from 6, the present number, to 12 with adequate personnel to carry forward an effective program of communicable disease control.

6. A separate appropriation for both Malaria Control and Pneumonia typing.

7. A Constitutional Amendment to permit counties to levy and collect a special tax to support local health work if their general revenue funds are inadequate or overdrawn.

8. Establishment of a division of mental hygiene to reduce the number of mentally ill.

"If these eight vital needs are met by the incoming 46th Legislature, I feel confident that the Texas State Department of Health will be enabled to render the type of service that will be reflected in a constantly decreasing death rate from those diseases that are preventable," concluded Dr. Taylor.

## Hotbed Season Is Here For Gardeners

College Station, Texas.—Winter jobs for gardeners include construction of a hotbed in sections where these are needed to start plants, building flats for growing plants, checking over tools for possible repairs or replacements, and building a fence around the garden if one is necessary.

These are some of the winter jobs listed by J. F. Rosborough, horticulturist of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, as he looked forward to 1939.

"Now is the time for getting the hotbed ready if seeds are to be planted in January," he said. He pointed out that manure heated hotbeds should be allowed to heat for three or four days before planting.

If the old hotbed is to be used, it should be disinfected; all of the old soil should be removed and fresh manure and soil added. Rosborough said that the electrically heated hotbed was practical and economical where current was available.

"Southern exposures are best for the location of the hotbed," the horticulturist stated. "A fence or a building on the north side makes an excellent wind-break. Above all, the hotbed should be located on a well drained spot, for water logged manure will not generate much heat."

Detailed information on hotbed construction can be obtained from county agricultural and home demonstration agents, and these also have free bulletins on the subject available for distribution.
