## General Sales Tax Proposed By House Committee

A general sales tax of 2 1/2 per cent was proposed by the House Constitutional Amendments Committee Monday after several days deliberation and comparing of proposed measures for raising of additional revenue to meet additional demands.

Several measures have been proposed, one of which was by the Governor, in the form of a transactions tax that was made flexible enough in effect, and should others find a better solution to the problem it would meet with his approval, but with the urgent request that something be done.

Governor O'Daniel is one governor who has not forgotten his campaign promises to the people, and is mild but firm in reminding the law making bodies that the people expect something and it is their duty to find the solution to the problem and submit it back to them for their approval or rejection. When the constitutional amendment is submitted to the voters of the state, the Governor and the legislature have done their part, and it is up to the public to either approve or reject the matter which, if approved, will settle the matter for all time to come.

The proposal provides a 2 1/2 per cent general sales tax in addition to a like rate on electric, gas and telephone bills other than for industrial purposes. The measure will provide a few exemptions on articles already too heavy with other taxes. The first sales of farm products are exempt. According to the proposal in its present form a merchant will be required to pay a flat 2 1/2 per cent on their gross sales to the state. The merchant will have to figure that out and add it on in pricing merchandise when marking up their goods for sale.

Just how the proposal will take in the public mind, it is too early to predict. As to our personal opinion, since the state is a lavishly spending institution, and has assumed so many new obligations, such as old age pensions, teacher retirement aid, help for the blind and other indisposed beings, thus creating a demand for additional income, we feel the committee has worked out and offered the house for approval one of the best solutions to the perplexing problem that in their minds they could find, and unless the reaction is too great in opposition, we are inclined to want to favor the measure. However, this writer is democratic, and if the measure is submitted to the voters over the state, which ever way it goes will be our way and that without murmuring.

It is estimated the proposal will raise \$33,000,000 a year. Of this sum \$26,000,000 would go into the old age pension fund, 2,500,000 for teachers' retirement fund, and \$1,500,000 for dependent children. The remainder will be used for administration and repayment of funds borrowed for pension purposes.

With \$26,000,000 a year allocated to old age pensions, the state would pay 216,667 aged persons an average of \$10 a month. There now are only 115,000 on the rolls and their average from state money is \$6.90. Advocates of the amendment are hopeful the federal government will continue to match state payments.

Under the committee's plan, persons with a net income of \$50 a month would not be eligible for pensions. Those with no income would receive the full \$30 state and federal money and those with income of less than \$30 would be given enough to make up the difference.

One provision of the amendment which may attract considerable support is that setting out that no additional taxes shall ever be levied for old age pensions. This was designed to halt agitation for pensions of \$50 a month or more.

## Robbers Invade Barton Home

Last Saturday, shortly after noon, two young men entered the ranch home of Baley Barton on Hime Creek and attempted to rob grandmother Bailey, 86, who was alone in the home at the time. Mrs. Bailey is a sister to the Barton Brothers, and has lived on the ranch since the early settlements in this county. She resented the attempted robbery, and was forced at the point of a pistol to give up what cash she had in the house, which was only \$3.00. After handing over the money she made fight with a butcher knife and was knocked down and left. Mr. Barton and his nephew, A. F. Bailey, son of Mrs. Bailey, and his family were in town, and were apprised of the robbery upon their return home later in the evening. The sheriff was notified, and several officers made an investigation. Mother Bailey was able to furnish a fair description of the two men and a diligent search has been carried on trying to locate the culprits and bring them to justice. At this date, Wednesday evening, no arrests have been made.

Mrs. Bailey was not seriously injured in the affray.

## Scout Movement Is Progressing
