Everyone present either knew or learned during this drill the oath and part of the laws. On knot tying, even the newest members tied the first two, while some of the ones who began a week or two ago are almost ready for Tenderfoot tests. As soon as ten are ready for the test, the troop can be permanently organized and hikes, uniforms and other features will be in order. Eventually all who pass the tenderfoot tests will find a way to secure uniforms, as some already have. Friends of scouting may help out greatly by giving boys who present a Scout card the work they can do to earn funds for Scout activities. Through similarity of names an error occurred in the names of the leaders of the temporary patrols last week. The two leaders are Dock Brand and Duane Griffin.

For fun and exercise half-minute rounds of boxing by such boys as paired themselves up with someone their own size was one lively feature of the meeting. Another was called "Bull-Pen" and consisted of players holding hands in a circle, out of which the "bull" tried to break by crashing thru the fence. Several new boys added to the growing interest in the work. Parents are urged to start their boys in right away so they can keep up with the large number already in and be ready to pass the first tests provided. 
