Ross K. Prescott Offered Position On G-Man Staff

Ross K. Prescott, who taught in the Santa Anna High School two years and a half. Tuesday was offered an appointment as special agent in Federal Bureau of Investigation under chief G-man, J. Edgar Hoover.

Prescott left the Santa Anna school after he had been elected to the state house of representatives last summer after serving one term as representative, he ran for state senator, losing to Sen. Porcua Melonnie of San Angelo in the second primary.

Born and reared in Brownwood, Mr. Prescott was educated in the schools there and later graduated from Daniel Baker College. After attending the University of Texas, he was admitted to the bar. Having practiced law in Brownwood before teaching here, he returned to his native town after his unsuccessful senatorial campaign and re-established himself in the law profession.
