Capt. Sam Collier Injured Tuesday In Auto Collision

The following account of a collision in which our fellow townsman, Capt. Sam H. Collier was painfully injured last Tuesday evening, appeared in the Brownwood Bulletin Wednesday.

"Two men were seriously hurt and one was slightly injured late Tuesday afternoon in a vehicular collision one mile east of Bangs on the Brownwood-Bangs highway.

Sam Collier, representative of the Temple Trust company, who has offices in Brownwood but resides in Santa Anna, suffered a broken right arm, M. B. Sikes, Bangs, received chest injuries and fracture of six ribs. Guy Eads, Bangs stock farmer, was treated for a scalp wound and then released from the hospital.

Collier was enroute to Santa Anna, and Eads, stock farmer, was driving the other machine toward Brownwood, with Sikes as a passenger. The two vehicles collided in passing a truck, passers-by said.

Ex-Senator E. M. Davis, who arrived at the accident scene about the same time as an ambulance, said the collision occurred during a hard rain that made visibility very poor.

The injured were rushed to the Medical Arts hospital here in an ambulance.

Capt. Collier was treated in the Brownwood hospital and brought to his home here Thursday morning. If no complications set up, and he responds to the treatment, nature will soon do its work and Capt. Collier will be up and about again.
