STATE BOARD OF EDUCATION

Report of Deputy State Superintendent on Santa Anna Schools: May 9, 1939

All bonds have been refinanced at a saving of \$1500.00. Citizens have voted \$27,500.00 in new bonds to be matched by federal funds to build a much needed elementary building. It is hoped that a way can be found to provide a more modern plant for the elementary school.

Much work has been done on the high school building. To take care of the increased enrollment of 65 the study hall was enlarged and reconditioned and 40 new seats added. Plans have been made to refinish the interior of the building during the summer. New shades have been purchased for the High School.

All the furniture of the elementary school and much of the high school has been refurnished.

Additions have been made to the high school and grade libraries. Besides fiction these include three encyclopedias, Book Trails and foundation units.

Sets of maps for America and world histories have been purchased for the high school and a combination set for the grades. Four new typewriters have been purchased.

The school band has taken honors this year. With the award a purchase was made of \$50 in sheet music and \$165 in a bass horn.

Citizens lighted the football field and built 3000 seats. The field was sodded by N.Y.A. and high school boys. Former high school graduates piped water to it.

Evidences were seen through out the system that much high type work was being done. The superintendent was especially interested this year in strengthening the English. The "Plain Way" Series of work books seemed to be functioning well.

There was a fine spirit of cooperation between teachers and pupils. Pupils were orderly and courteous. With one exception every teacher had a degree.

A fine school has been established in Santa Anna. Children are being given work that will fit them for a fuller life.

I had known Mr. Scarborough for several years only casually, but this year as I worked with him I came to appreciate him as the highest type of Christian gentleman and as a most capable superintendent. Appreciating his worth I asked him why he did not seek a larger place. His reply was "I like it here and I suppose I'll stay until they send me away." My heart felt sympathy goes to you who have worked with him so long, to the teachers who served with him and to the students who are now and who have been under his guidance, and to the entire citizenship who have felt his influence and who mourn his passing. He has served his people well and his good works will live after him.

I am enclosing for you trustees a report of my visit and my conference with Mr. Scarborough. Much good work has been done this year and it was his wish that the school would continue its progress.

A Week Of Tragedies

If we were designating weeks we would call this our a "Week of Tragedies."

Our quiet little city has certainly been shadowed with gloom this week starting Sunday morning with the tragedy that ended the lives of Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Ragsdale and Prof. J. C. Scarborough, and critically injured Mrs. Scarborough, which brought grief and sadness to the hearts of all Santa Anna and surrounding territory, and followed by funerals for the three death victims Tuesday, leaving the entire citizenship downhearted.

Wednesday during the noon hour, a lone bandit walked into the lobby of the Santa Anna National Bank, pointed a six-shooter into Roy Richardson's face and demanded that Roy sack what cash there was available in a sack and hand it over to him and be quiet. Stafford Baxter appeared during the critical moment and the bandit turned the revolver on him and ordered him to be

quiet also, or get shot. When the money was delivered thru the window Mr. Baxter and Mr. Richardson were ordered into the vault. As they obeyed and entered, the bandit gave them instructions to fill the sack with money and no kidding. If so happened the men were placed in the wrong vault, and no more cash was available.

The bandit attempted to lock the door, but not being familiar with the lock, left it so the imprisoned men soon worked their way out and gave the alarm. Officers were called and after investigation, started out with meager information in search of the bandit.

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An Ordinance Fixing and Prescribing Uniform Rates and Charges for All Persons, Firms and Corporations Furnishing and Distributing Natural Gas in the City of Santa Anna, Amending the Franchises and Amendments Thereto of All Firms, Persons and Corporations Now Furnishing and Distributing Natural Gas in the City of Santa Anna, Repealing All Ordinances or Parts of Ordinances in Conflict Here-with.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA:

Section 1. That from and after the adoption of this ordinance the rates and charges for the supply and distribution of natural gas for domestic and commercial purposes in the City of Santa Anna shall be fixed, regulated and determined as follows, to-wit:

(1) \$1.00 minimum charge per month, or monthly billing period, for each connected consumer. This sum shall cover the cost of the first 2000 cubic feet of gas, or part thereof, used by such consumer in any month or monthly period, but such charge shall be paid whether gas is used or not used.

(2) 50 cents per thousand cubic feet for the first 10,000 cubic feet, or part thereof, used by any one consumer in any one month or monthly billing period.

(3) 45 cents per thousand cubic feet for the next 10,000 cubic feet, or part thereof, used by any one consumer in any one month or monthly billing period.

(4) 40 cents per thousand cubic feet for the next 10,000 cubic feet, or part thereof, used by any one consumer in any one month or monthly billing period.

(5) 35 cents per thousand cubic feet for the next 45,000 cubic feet used by any one consumer in any one month or monthly billing period.

(6) All over 75,000 cubic feet subject to contract.

(7) A penalty of ten (10) per cent may be added to the amount of each consumer's bill when such bill is not paid within ten days from the date of the monthly billing.

Section 2: That from and after the adoption of this ordinance the rates and charges for the supply and distribution of natural gas for industrial purposes in the City of Santa Anna may be determined by contract between gas utilities and consumers of gas for industrial purposes in the City of Santa Anna.

Section 3: This ordinance shall supersede all ordinances or parts of ordinances heretofore passed and adopted, in so far as the same affect the rates and charges for furnishing natural gas service within the City of Santa Anna, and all ordinances, or parts of ordinances, in conflict with the rates for supply and distribution of natural gas as herein fixed and determined are hereby repealed.

Section 4: Any person, firm or corporation, furnishing and distributing natural gas in the City of Santa Anna, who shall violate any of the provisions of this ordinance by charging or collecting for sale and distribution of natural gas to any consumer within the City of Santa Anna at any rate greater than, or less than, herein specified, or who shall in any way fail to comply with the provisions of this ordinance fixing and determining rates for the distribution and service of natural gas in the City of Santa Anna, in addition to any other penalties provided by ordinance of the City of Santa Anna, shall thereby render subject to forfeiture the franchise of any such person, firm, or corporation.

Section 5: Any person, firm,

one corporation, engaged in the business of furnishing and distributing natural gas within the limits of the City of Santa Anna, who shall charge or collect for such service at any rate greater or less than that fixed and determined by franchise and amendments thereto of any such person, firm or corporation, or who shall in any way violate the provisions of the franchise and amendments thereto of such person, firm, or corporation, might charge for the supply and distribution of natural gas within the limits of the City of Santa Anna, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be fined in any sum not less than Five (\$5.00) Dollars nor more than One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars, and each act of violation as herein defined shall constitute a separate offense.

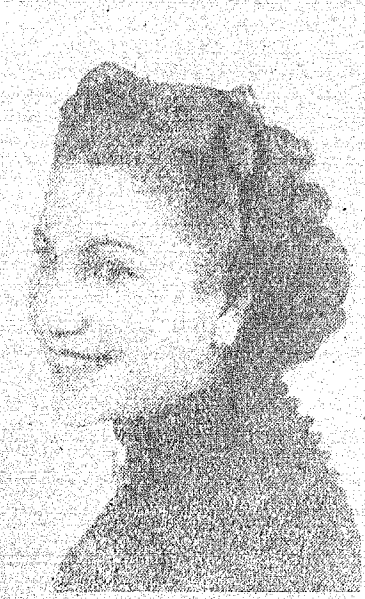
