FOR HEALTHY SUMMER APPETITES

It's a mistake to assume that summer meal planning should be geared to languid appetites and minimum food requirements. The lively children and the young people who are going swimming, playing tennis and taking part in other intensely active games in the open are

using up energy that needs replacing by hearty nourishing food. So I'm presenting the following recipe for a meal-in-a-dish affair that comes from sunny Italy. It's hearty and delicious and savory— and easy to prepare—once you've checked your supplies to be sure that and easy to prepare—once you've checked your supplies to be sure that you have all the ingredients. It's an ideal dish' to take to a pienic in a Dutch oven or a heavy kettle that will keep it good and hot. It could be reheated over a camp fire if necessary or even cooked entirely in the open. You won't need much else with it,—a lettuce salad perhaps, good pienic coffee, fresh fruit and cookies would complete a thoroughly satisfying and delicious meal. Here is the recipe for Delizia: cooking

1 ½ cup olive oil (or other cooking

1 lb. hamburger
1 cup canned tomato soup (un-
diluted) or tomato paste
1 ¹ / ₂ tsp. salt
1/2 tsp. pepper
1/3 tsp. cayenne pepper
1 ½ tsp. Worcestershire sauce
1/2 cup grated cheese

Cook spaghetti in 2 qts. boiling water, to which 4 tsp. salt have been added, for about 15 minutes or until tender. Saute chopped onion. garlic, red and green pepper, carrots and celery in oil until onions are a golden brown. At same time form hamburger into tiny balls and sear on both sides in the oil. Add tomato, salt, pepper, cayenne pepper and Worcestershire sauce. When heated, add cheese, stir until melted and then add spaghetti. Stir the mixture over the fire for 5 minutes, then turn into a baking dish. Sprinkle generously with grated cheese and bake. 20 minutes in a moderate oven, 350° F. This will make 10 servings. Note: If it is more convenient not to use the oven, cook gently on top of the stove for 20 minutes instead of the 5 minutes, stirring occasionally. Then turn onto a hot platter and sprinkle with grated cheese.

Question: Now I want to ask you for a recipe for mush. My family dearly loves fried mush, and to find a recipe is beyond me. For years it seems, I've kept my eyes peeled for even an idea on how to make it, but there just isn't any such thing. Answer: In the first place in making mush, plan to use only four cups of boiling water for each cup of com meal with the other seasonings which you choose to include. This will make a mush with a little heavier consistency than when it is made with six cups of boiling water as it generally is for the regular mush. When it's of this consistency the slices will hold together when they are fried. You'll have to use a slow frying in order to brown the slices. You can also dip these slices in finely ground cracker crumbs and then in beaten egg (adding about 3 tablespoons of milk for each egg), and then again in the crumbs and fry in deep fat. Or you prefer, the slices may be sprinkled with flour or dipped first in beaten egg and then in the bread or cracker crumbs and fried.

- serve and what would you serve with it? At this time of year I think a melon ball cocktail is espe-Answer: cially refreshing. Cut balls from ripe watermelon and canta-loupe with a small round cutter for this purpose-or just cut in cubes. Use an equal number of each kind for each serving. Make a simple sugar syrup with 1 cup sugar and 1 cup water, and with ¼ cup crushed mint leaves. Strain and pour over the melon balls. Chill thoroughly, and when to serve, place in ice cold cocktail glasses and garnish time with sprigs of mint, or moisten the rim of each glass and dip into the chopped mint before filling. This leaves a line of green adhering to the edge of the glass. Crisp round "butter crackers" will be suitable with this cocktail.




Fishermen Urged to Be Careful

William J. Theker, exceptive secretary of the Game. Fish and Oyster Commission recently stated. The very same chap who is the most careful hunter in the world will do the most utterly absurd things while in a boat. A bill to enforce safety rules upon the fresh waters of Texas failed to squeeze through the Legislature during the closing days, but if fishermen will observe a few common sense rules there will be fewer casulties."

Don'ts Tucker's safety suggestions: Don't permit a boat to become overloaded; don't venture on a big lake in a small craft without any thought of perils of weather (State Game Wardens recently rescued four boatloads of fishermen on Lake Buchannan in a single day). Don't stand in the boat when another person is casting; don't stand up a la tightwire act to change-seats; con't lash around without regard to harm to other from a plug with many hooks; don't land a cance improperly: don't use bottle bait while in a boat; den't race large boats to clusely to small craft. Don't forget your boat might turn over any minute. Will you be without a life preserver and drown as many many others have done? It is better to be safe than sorry.
