Texas Mountain Sheep

Herds of domestic sheep and elk upon the range of the wild mountain sheep in Texas will keep those nimble-footed and interesting animals from increasing much beyond their present number.

Mountain sheep, which are found in the Breach of Diablo Mountains of West Texas, now number fewer than 400, according to Snow, who counted 130 in the Breach Mountains and who believes, after his survey, that there are approximately 250 in the Diablos.

While it is not likely sportsmen will ever have an open season on wild sheep, which are among the most colorful animals in the Lone Star State, three ranchmen of the Trans-Pecos are leading the fight to help the species survive.

The United States Civil Service Commission announces an open competitive examination for Engineman (Steam Electric) for filling vacancies in Assistant Engineman positions at \$1800 a year at new institutions to be established by the Bureau of Prisons, Department of Justice, at Dallas and Texarkana, Texas, and at the already established institution at LaTuna near El Paso, Texas.

Mrs. Crawford demonstrated light refreshments with lemonade, poppy and cookies served at tables placed in groups with four people at each table. Mrs. O. G. Curry gave a report on her trip to the Short Course at College Station showing quilt designs, patterns for children, gifts and new recipes for serving fruit in pastry shells made over the back of muffin tins. She told the group present that there were 2600 farm women served noon meal the last day at the mess hall, necessitating the use of 150 gallons of iced tea, 200 loaves of bread, 600 lbs. of potatoes, 700 lbs. of meat and 10 gallons of salad dressing used on banana salad in which 150 dozen bananas were used.

Ten women of the club plan to attend the annual encampment at Coleman park.

The Santa Anna Home Demonstration Club will meet this afternoon at 2:30 at the Ranger Park Museum with Mrs. L. V. Stockard as program leader. Various reports including a report on the encampment will be given. Refreshments will be served. Visitors are welcome.

Economy of cooperative ventures has been proved conclusively to numerous Texas county home demonstration councils which in recent months have purchased such diverse merchandise as cottonseed oil, rose bushes, fruit trees, strawberry plants, and fresh pineapple at considerable saving according to reports of Texas home demonstration agents compiled by Helen H. Swift sociologist in charge of rural women's organizations for the A&M College Extension Service.

The Farmer county council bought 210 gallons of cottonseed oil for home storage of meats while Lamb county women bought roses by the co-operative plan. Citrus fruits for Baylor county, fruit trees for Hamilton county, and 75 crates of fresh strawberries for Uvalde county were included in the co-operative purchases, Miss Swift said.

Purchase of fresh pineapple from Mexico for canning purposes, which has been advocated for the past four years by Grace I. Neely, Extension Service specialist in food preservation, was the most popular item bought co-operatively, the report revealed.

In Schleicher county 160 doz pineapples weighing 7,000 lbs. were secured at a cost of 91cts. per dozen and the fruit was canned at home for from one-half to one-third the cost of a good grade of factory-canned pineapple. Miss Neely says: As many as 255 club women and girls canned 190 dozen pineapples in Bell county.

Eighteen women in San Jacinto county canned an average of 36 pints of the fruit purchased co-operatively, while Callahan county secured 150 dozen pineapples.

National Guard

The Texas National Guard consists of the Adjutant General's Department, the 36th Division, and the 56th Cavalry Brigade, with 217 separate units (headquarters, companies, batteries, troops and detachments) distributed all over Texas. The 8,964 enlisted men and 11 warrant officers are of the highest type of young manhood, and are commanded by 737 officers. These officers are men of good standing and influence in their communities, engaged in various businesses, at which they make their living. They are doctors, lawyers, farmers, merchants, accountants, architects, bankers, city managers, business men, manufacturers practically all lines of business, everything. The Federal pay-roll, including both men and officers from the highest to the lowest military grade, though large in the aggregate, averages only about enough to off-set cost of uniforms, equipment, and other expenses incident to the military service rendered to the State and Nation by the men and officers of the Texas National Guard. As a practical matter, their time is given free as a patriotic duty.

The officers, from the wartime division down to date have been selected solely by their military commanders. The various Governors have always appointed the men recommended, respectively, by the commanding generals of the 36th Division and the 56th Cavalry Brigade. The officers commissioned in the Texas National Guard are then appointed by the President and commissioned in the National Guard of the United States and the general officers are confirmed by the United States Senate. Thus the National Guard serves in two capacities - one, a National Guard of the United States, and as such, is a component of the Army of the United States, subject to Federal service within or without our continental limits. As such Federal force it constitutes America's First Line of Defense during the time the Officers' Reserve Corps is being mobilized, and Selective Service is being organized, supplied and trained by our too small but efficient Regular Army. Its other capacity is as Texas National Guard, of which the Governor of Texas is Commander-in-Chief and as such it is available for use in any State emergency.

WPA STOPS CUTTING WORK RELIEF ENROLLEES

Colonel F. C. Harrington, Work Projects commissioner, directed State WPA administrator's Saturday set to furnish any more work relief enrollees with 18 continuous months of service until further notice.

The order was prompted by the Senate's approval of an amendment to the funding bill which some administrative sources immediately interpreted

as repealing a provision of the new relief act under which some 650,000 enrollees would have been let out by September 1. All of those have been on the pay roll for 18 months or longer.

Harrington was unable to say immediately how many persons had been dropped prior to today's action.

The state directors were told to keep the present rolls intact pending House concurrence in the Senate amendment and approval by the President.

During the Civil war period the Chambers family lived in Waco. It was while the husband was in service that Mrs. Chambers with a gun, held a negro man who was taking her last ham from the smokehouse. Aid came in response to her call and it was learned that he was a very dangerous desperado.

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her mother used in capturing the darky.

Mrs. Chambers had lived in Coleman County since moving from Waco in 1887.
