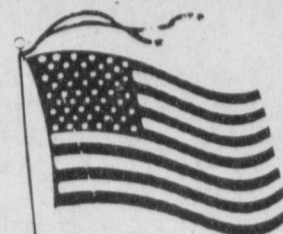

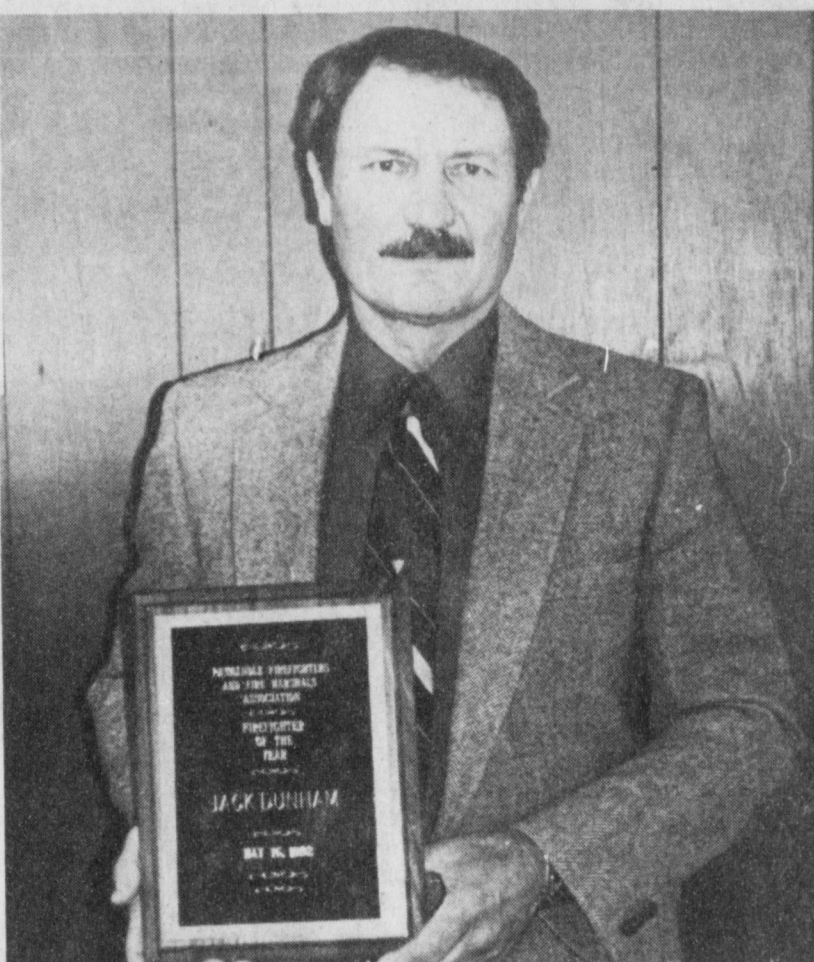
Alexandra Cage Receives Bachelors Degree At Austin

Good General Rain Falls Over Area

Rain, rain, and more rain, intermediate showers have fallen over the Muleshoe area since Wednesday, with rain amounts varying from a little over an inch in the southern end of Bailey County to one and a half inches at Lazbuddie.

According to the National Weather Service out of Lubbock, the spring showers were caused by an unstable upper-level air mass covering the South Plains. A low-level flow from the Gulf of Mexico also contributed to the moist, unstable air.

Daytime heating combined with weak disturbances moving northward from Mexico are expected to produce more thunderstorms over the next few days.

C.E. Grant, west of Muleshoe, reported that he received three and a half inches of rain and some hail on Wednesday and Friday afternoon,

he reported another .6 inch of rain.

Grant stated that quite a bit of hail fell on his farm. The hail did a little damage to his cotton but he is hopeful that it will come out of it.

At the Muleshoe National Wildlife Refuge it was reported that they received .64 of an inch of rain since this rain started on Wednesday. When the Journal spoke to them on Friday it was still raining.

In the southern part of the county, Mrs. Bennie Claunch reported that they had received a little over an inch of rain and it was still raining. "We live one and a half miles east of Bula and I understand they received a lot more at Bula," said Mrs. Claunch. "This is just what the dry land cotton needed. We needed the rain to get the cotton up."

At Foster Fertilizer in Lazbuddie they reported from one to one and

half inches inches of rain had fallen at Lazbuddie.

Saturday morning when the paper went to press, Muleshoe had unofficially received 2.70 inches of rain and it was still raining.

The National Weather service out of Lubbock has reported mostly cloudy skies with a 50 percent chance of thunderstorms, some were ro be severe during the Cont. Page 6, Col. 1

Former Resident On Senior Golf Tour

A former Muleshoe youth, Terry Dill has been featured in the May 8, 1992, Dallas Morning News. Dill played golf in high school and went on to play on a tour.

Thirteen years after leaving the regular tour, Dill was a practicing tax attorney. Seventeen years after graduation from the University of Texas, he returned to get his law degree.

A desire to raise four sons in pastoral surroundings led him to follow a law professor to Camden, S.C. A few years later he taught law at Texas A&M for three years, before returning to South Carolina.

About this time, he began to think about the senior tour and the dramatic vault in purses.

"All of my life, since I was 13 and saw Ben Hogan, all I ever wanted to do was be a touring golf pro. Law was just a way to earn a living," Dill said.

Being cautious, Dill made no sudden moves. He studied the senior tour for a year, charted the play on television, and tried to figure how he would fare.

"One thing being a lawyer helped me," said Dill. "In law, preparation is everything. The best-operated lawyer wins the case."

He got his golf clubs out of the closet, an went on a diet. He lost 30 pounds and in the next three months, Dill hit 100,000 balls from 100 yards on in.

Senior Citizens Get Hair-Raising Experience

Getting about 100 senior citizens together could be a "hair-raising" experience, and for several couples at the first Spring Fling at Lake Brownwood recently, it was.

A few brave men's hair stood on end as their partners used shaving cream to whip up new hairdos ranging from beehives to a porcupine style in a "Hair Raising" Contest. It didn't matter who won. It was all part of the fun.

Each April, adults 55 and older participate in one of five consecutive Spring Flings for four days at the Texas 4-H Center. They take part in "hands on" learning centers for arts and crafts, as well as educational seminars.

The event is so popular that it also occurs in the fall as Octoberfest. Each weekly program is limited to the first 165 persons to enroll.

Texas Agricultural Extension Service specialists and county agents and experts from other agencies provide special sessions covering such topics as pesticide safety in the home, IRAs and changes in social security, car safety, nutrition and exercise, recycling and photography. Participants can also fish, take boat rides and play in various games.

"We believe in promoting activities where 4-H young people can learn by doing," said Mike McKinney, Extension 4-H specialist and program director at the center, which is owned by the Texas 4-H Youth Foundation. "These adults are the same way. They still have to build their self confidence even at their age."

"When participants do something like an oil painting, they have a finished product that they can take with them."

Participants help carry out the 1992 theme, "Down On The Farm," by wearing farm clothes and taking part in seed-spitting contests, pig calling and cracking peanuts with their toes. The entire 4-H center staff pitches in—from

decorating to planning appropriate meals.

"The theme allows older adults to have fun and act like kids," McKinney said. "I call them recycled teenagers. They're all so energetic and about 50 percent of them have been here three or four times."

Shirley Riebe of Weatherford has been to the center five times in three years. This year she brought her sister-in-law, Kathryn Riebe with her. Both agree that the cost is particularly attractive while the benefits—lodging, food and programs—are excellent.

"We enjoy just letting our hair down and forgetting all our troubles," Shirley said. "It's like a mini vacation and we enjoy the fun of the staff."

"We've participated in just about everything so far," Kathryn said. "We've done things like make necklaces while our husbands painted pictures."

"When participants come they know that they're welcomed to participate in as many of the learning centers as they like or spend most of their time doing one activity, whether it's doing bead work or fishing in the catfish pond," said Lynn Copeland, director of the Texas 4-H Center. "That's fine. We don't try to force feed any of the curriculum on the participants, and it's been very well received."

"Part of the beauty of seeing these older Texans is that they are still very much interested in learning new skills and making things with their hands that are not for a shelf in their home, but can be given to a son, a daughter, a neighbor or perhaps an older brother or sister who can't come," he said.

The success of the program has been due largely to the all-volunteer instruction staff, Copeland said. Instructors teach everything from leather crafts to chair caning to various kinds of table and card games, he said.

Annie Leatherwood, a volunteer and retired art teacher from Stephenville, attended her first Spring Fling in 1984 after her husband died.

"I went down to the senior citizen center and the director handed me a flyer and said, you might want to do this," Leatherwood said with a chuckle. "I said, I don't want to go sleep on bunk beds and cuddle old gabbies."

But she did not have to sleep on bunk beds. On her first trip, Leatherwood ended up helping an arts and crafts instructor. Eventually, she started teaching her own classes, including fabric painting and dancing this year.

"Some of these people never get out of their houses until they come here," she said. "They come, let their guards down, take classes and realize they can do some things they've never done before and they keep coming back. I think that's the biggest compliment."

Copeland said he knows of at least one other organization that has set up a program following the center's pattern and added, "We welcome other conference centers to join in to provide their resources for the benefit of older Texans."

Spring Fling started in 1981 to provide older adults with the same kinds of enriching experiences at 4-H young people receive through programs, resources and facilities of the Texas 4-H Center, Copeland said.

"The event is a unique mix of enjoyable learning and fellowship with people from all over the state, offered at a very reasonable price," he said.

The cost runs between \$95 and \$120 for all meals and snacks, lodging and printed material. There are some minor additional costs for arts and crafts materials, Copeland said.

For many participants, one of the greatest benefits of the program is friendship.

"I was in San Antonio and I heard someone say, 'Well, look who's here,'" Leatherwood said. "There were six people I had met at Spring Fling. I walked into a restaurant in Marshall and saw some of our people. For me, one of the best parts has been making new friends."

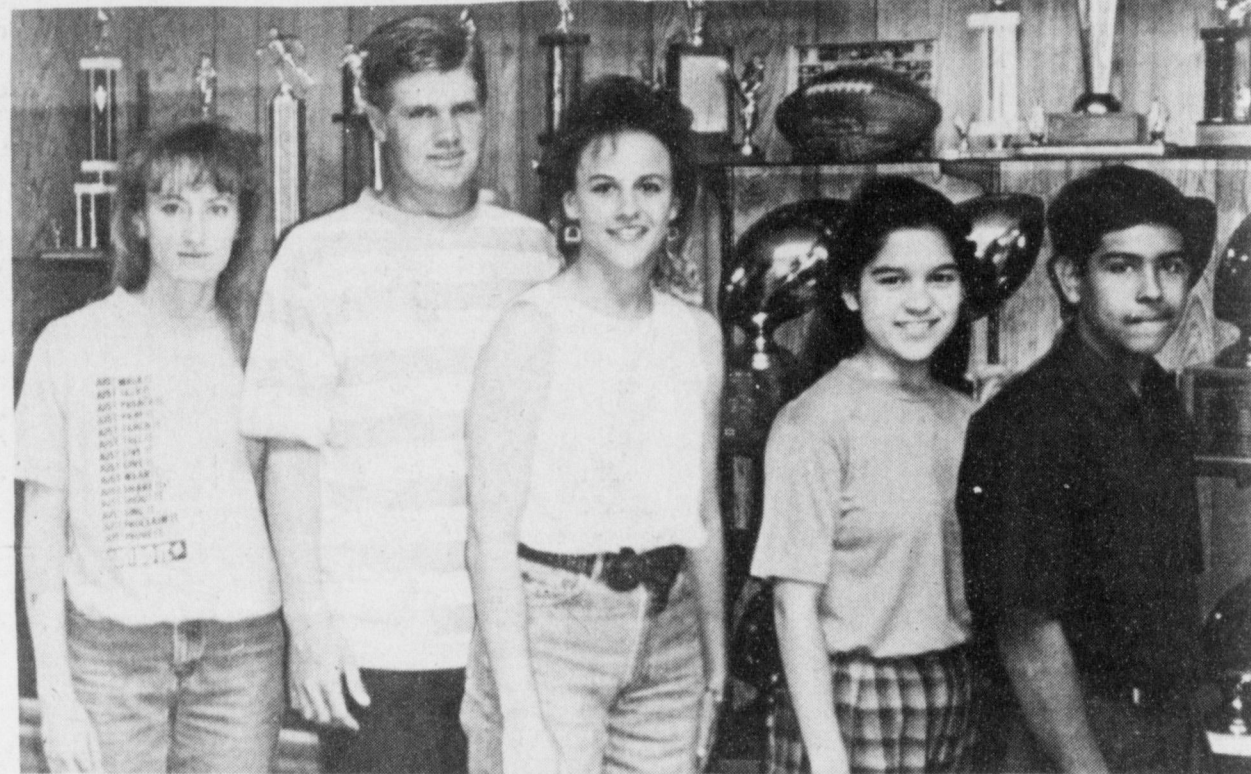

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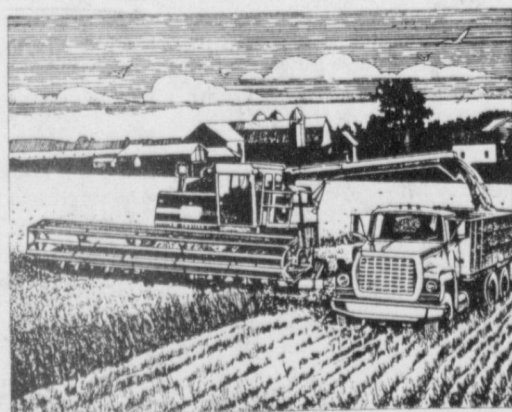
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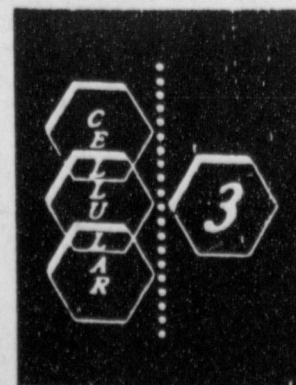

Herbed Chicken

Prep time: 15 minutes
Cooking time: 20 minutes

- 3/4 cup Miracle Whip or Miracle Whip Light Dressing
- 1/4 cup chicken broth
- 2 garlic cloves, minced
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped green onions
- 2 teaspoons dried basil leaves, crushed
- 1 teaspoon dried thyme leaves, crushed
- 6 boneless skinless chicken breast halves (about 2 pounds)
- Mix dressing, chicken broth, garlic, onions and seasonings.
- Pour dressing mixture over chicken; cover. Refrigerate several hours or overnight. Drain.
- Place chicken on grill over medium-hot coals (coals will have a slight glow) or rack of broiler pan. Grill or broil 8 to 10 minutes on each side or until tender.

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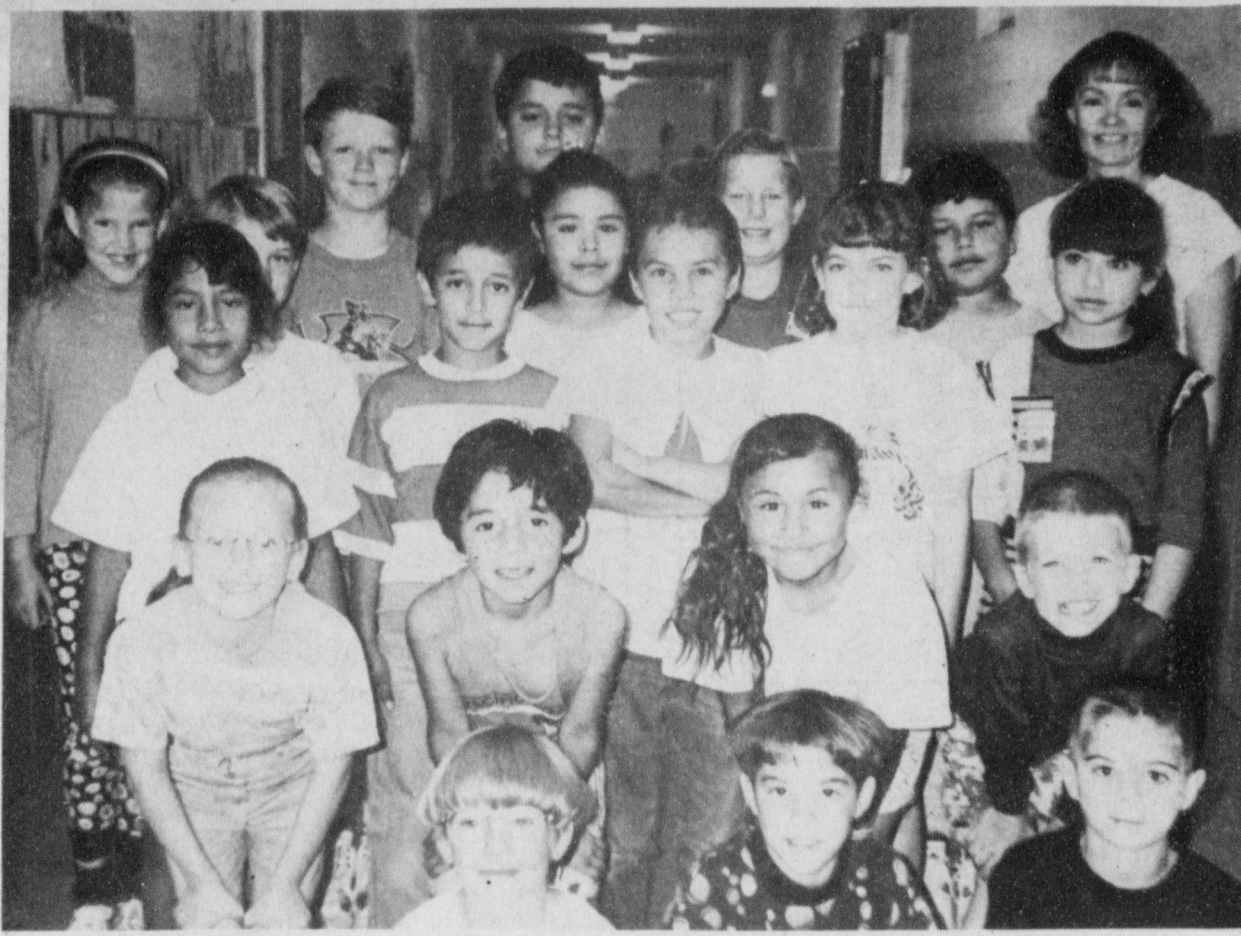

1 egg, lightly beaten

The drop in interest rates has fueled demand for stock and income funds.

Sales of stock and income mutual funds totaled \$31.8 billion in January according to the Investment Company Institute.

Assets of all mutual funds totaled a record \$1.4 trillion in January.

What signal does this provide? The most obvious is that many investors who are dependent on income are seeking higher-yielding -- but higher-risk -- investments.

This is not necessarily bad, although many periods when a large influx of cash into mutual funds and stocks occurred, especially by novice investors, preceded market tops.

The biggest factor to consider, especially for those investing in mutual funds, is to be aware of the increased risks.

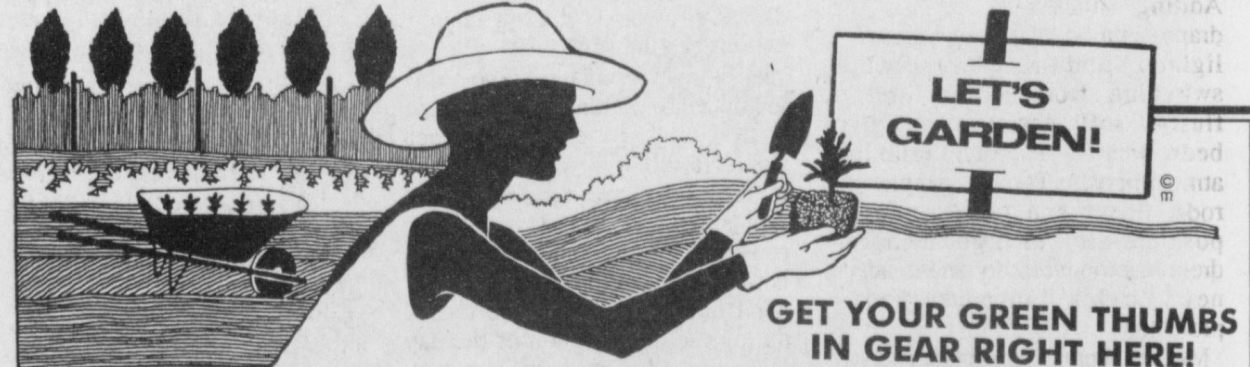

Curtains Give Room New Look

Changing window coverings changes the appearance of a room. Adding full-length curtains or drapes in a colorful bold print will lighten and brighten, while switching from stiff white to fluffy, soft pastels will give bedrooms a restful, relaxing atmosphere. Today's improved rods, tracks and hooks make it possible to change window dressings more readily and to adapt new styles without undue problems.

Modern technology has been used by manufacturers to develop lightweight window blinds which provide privacy without cutting out daylight. Ask to see Hunter Douglas Silhouette window blinds at local home-decorating shops. These fabric window dressings in light colors, neutral and pastels are custom fitted, so odd-size windows can have a unity. They take up little space, roll up like shades and can be used alone or in conjunction with drapes or valances.

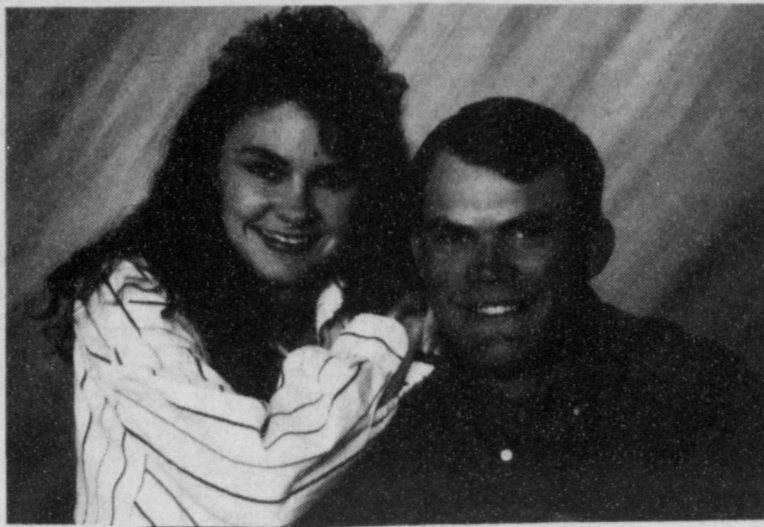

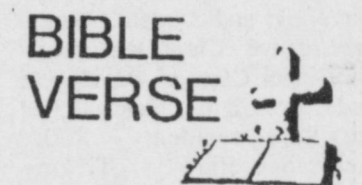

3. Do you like your current tires? Do you like the way your tires make your car feel and sound? Or how they make your car look? What would you like to change? Make a list of things you like and dislike about your current tires.

4. What do you want from your tires when you are driving? Do you want a soft, comfortable ride, or do you want a tire that has been built to harness your sports car's capabilities?

5. What weather conditions do you normally drive in all year round? Are the roads mostly dry (summer tires), or are they usually wet (all-season tires)? Do you drive in snow? If so, is it deep or light?

6. Where do you do your driving? Do you drive mostly around town? Do you drive frequently on gravel?

7. At what speeds do you normally drive? If you travel at higher speeds, or own a sports car, you may need a speed-rated tire.

8. How do you want your car to look? There are several "cosmetic" options for tires: modern and performance-oriented are a few options.

9. What kind of warranties do you want, or are available? Many manufacturers limited warranties which cover you from faulty workmanship and product defects.

10. How much do you want to spend? Once you know the answers to the first nine questions, you are ready to consider price. Your dealer will be able to show you various price options for tires that meet your driving needs. You should also price around. Prices on the same tire can vary from store to store.

Crop Scouting Principles To Be Taught At Workshop

Training of scouts who survey crops to assess pest population densities in integrated pest management (IPM) programs across the area will be held in Plainview on June 2 at the Ollie Linder Agricultural Center, on South U.S. Hwy. 87 (Business 87).

The workshop is open to summer scouts of private consultants and aerial applicators as well as farmers who scout their own fields. It is conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Training begins at 8:30 a.m. and ends at 4:30 p.m.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for five continuing education units (CEUs) toward recertification requirements for private, commercial and non-commercial pesticide applicators.

This year's workshop will provide instruction on scouting cotton and grains, identification of plant disease and nutrient deficiency symptoms, use of herbicides and safe handling of pesticides, said Dr. W. Pat Morrison, Extension Service entomologist at Lubbock.

IPM is a coordinated approach to management decisions which are based on pest populations and economic thresholds to effectively control weeds, insects and diseases and maximize net profit while creating minimal harm to the crop or environment.

Scouts examine fields in a systematic pattern at regular intervals each week. Producer treatments for pests are based on economic threat to the crop, presence of beneficial insects which are enemies of the pests, and proper timing of pesticide use for maximum returns with the lowest chemical input.

Topics for the workshop, and the instructors, all of whom are Extension Service specialists or pest management agents, are:

CEU training and instructions Morrison. Principles of IPM and sampling, Mark Brown, Crosby-Floyd pest management agent, Crosbyton. Cotton growth and development, Dr. James R. Supak, agronomist and cotton specialist, Lubbock.

Trips, fleahoppers and aphids, Dr. James Leser, entomologist, Lubbock. Bollworms, loopers and armyworms, Kerry Siders, Castro-Lamb pest management agent, Dimmitt. Beneficials, Brant Baugh, Bailey-Parmer pest management agent, Farwell.

Additional information about the workshop is available at county offices of the Extension Service.

FmHA Releases

Loan Servicing Regulations

Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) has released long delayed new loan servicing regulations which will affect all borrowers. The new rules, at 396 pages and weighing in at nearly three pounds, began arriving in FmHA County Offices last week. They are expected to be implemented shortly with a mailing of as many as 40,000 delinquency letters to farmers.

The new rules sharply cut the terms of servicing to delinquent borrowers. Pending their issuance FmHA has been a moratorium on servicing since November 1990.

Pete Morrow, Director, Southwest Farm Advocacy Group, stated

"Many farmers behind in payments for reasons beyond their control have been unable to seek refinancing of their loans with FmHA because of this moratorium. At long last, many will be able to address the problem."

Continued Morrow, "We're still sorting out many aspects of these new regulations, but it is safe to say they are not farmer-friendly. FmHA has fixed a program that wasn't broken. Nevertheless, there are still many options for borrowers, it just may be a little harder to find them in the regs."

"Farmers who need servicing because they have used up their borrowing limit should go to their County Office now and ask for the new application forms," advised Morrow.

Texas Oil & Gas Report

The Railroad Commission assesses \$21,000 in administrative penalties this week to five oil and gas operators for violations under Commission well plugging and pollution rules, according to RRC Chairman Lena Guerrero.

Henderson Exploration of Henderson was ordered to pay \$6,000 for two inactive and unplugged wells on the John Stanush lease in Wilson County; Minerals of Texas, Inc. of San Antonio was assessed \$3,000 for one well on the Minotex/Benke "A" lease in Frio County; and, Creel Production Co. of Hardin was penalized \$4,000 for one well on the Crown Central Fee lease in Liberty County.

In addition, Diamond D Oilfield Services of Detroit, Tex. was ordered to pay \$4,000 for oil, saltwater and drilling mud spills on the Henry Barton lease in Red River County.

Also, one operator agreed to pay a penalty without admitting any violation of Commission rules. Oil & Gas Investments, Inc. of Houston was assessed \$4,000 for one inactive and unplugged well in the Blue Ridge Field in Fort Bend County.

To date in 1992, the Railroad Commission has levied more than \$359,000 in pollution and well plugging penalties. Last year, the Commission assessed \$732,000 in such penalties.

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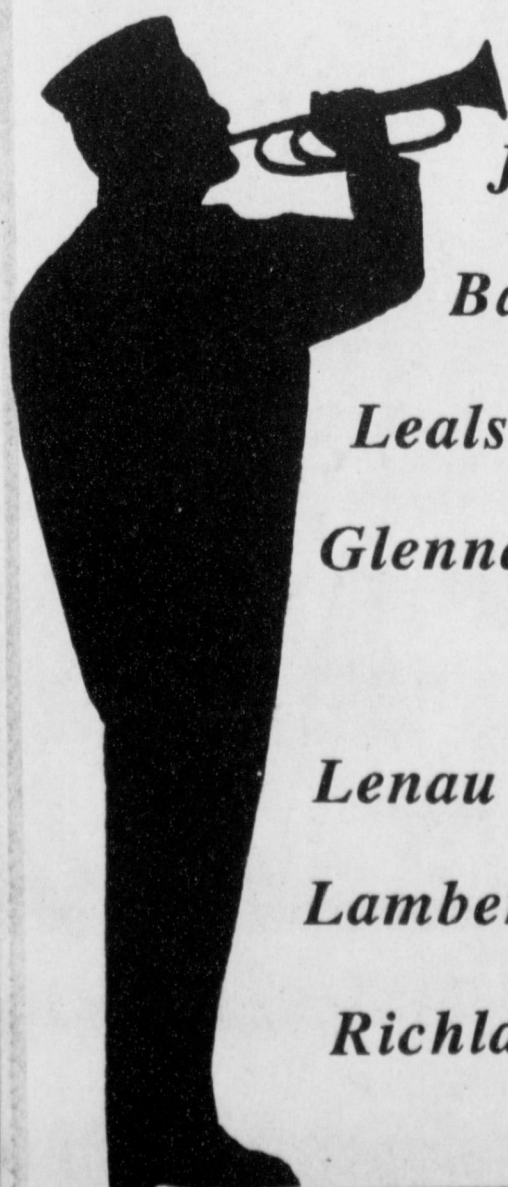
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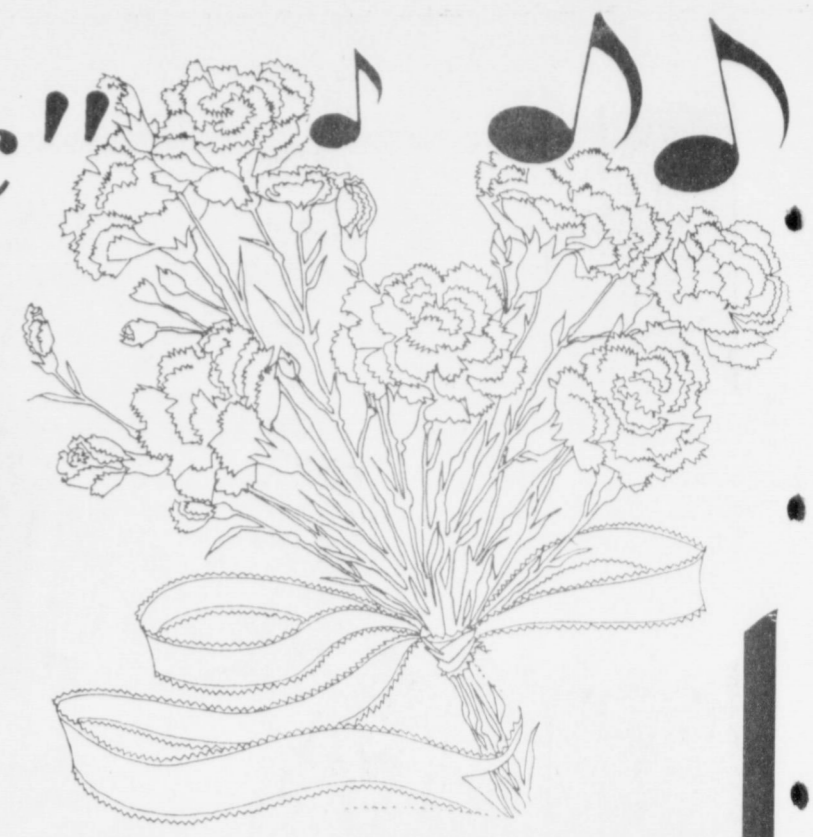

Check Automatic Garage Doors

Thousands of Texas homes have automatic garage door openers. Properly installed and maintained, these devices can give years of trouble-free service. But each year, a few children are injured or killed by automatic doors that don't work properly.

The Texas Safety Association urges homeowners to check the operation of their garage door and establish a maintenance and testing program that will prevent tragedy the year round.

The garage door is the heaviest piece of moving equipment in a typical home, exerting up to 250 pounds of pressure when it closes. Children struck by or trapped under descending doors may suffocate or suffer irreparable brain damage.

Most automatic openers made since 1982, come with a reversing mechanism, designed to stop and reverse the descending door on contact with any object. Homeowners should test the opener once a month, to make sure this feature is working properly.

First, check the balance of the door. Start with the door closed, and

disconnect the automatic opener so that you can lift it by hand. Open it part way, so that the bottom of the door is three to four feet above the floor. The door should remain in that position. If it doesn't, have it adjusted by a professional.

Re-connect the automatic opener. With the door open, lay a two-by-four wooden plank flat on the floor near the center of the door's path. Push the button to close. When the door hits the wood, it should not only stop, but also change direction. If it doesn't, disconnect the automatic opener until it can be repaired or replaced.

From time to time, visually inspect the springs, cables, rollers, and other door hardware for signs of wear. All moving parts require periodic lubrication with household oil or silicone spray. Follow the instructions in your garage door owner's manual.

Although good maintenance will minimize the chance of an accident, it's best to take some basic

precautions.

The push button should be at least five feet above the ground, out of a small child's reach. Teach children not to play near an open garage door, and never to run under the door as it closes. (Don't set a bad example by doing it yourself!) Remote controls shouldn't be viewed as toys for kids; keep them locked in the car. When you push the button, keep the door in sight until it closes completely.

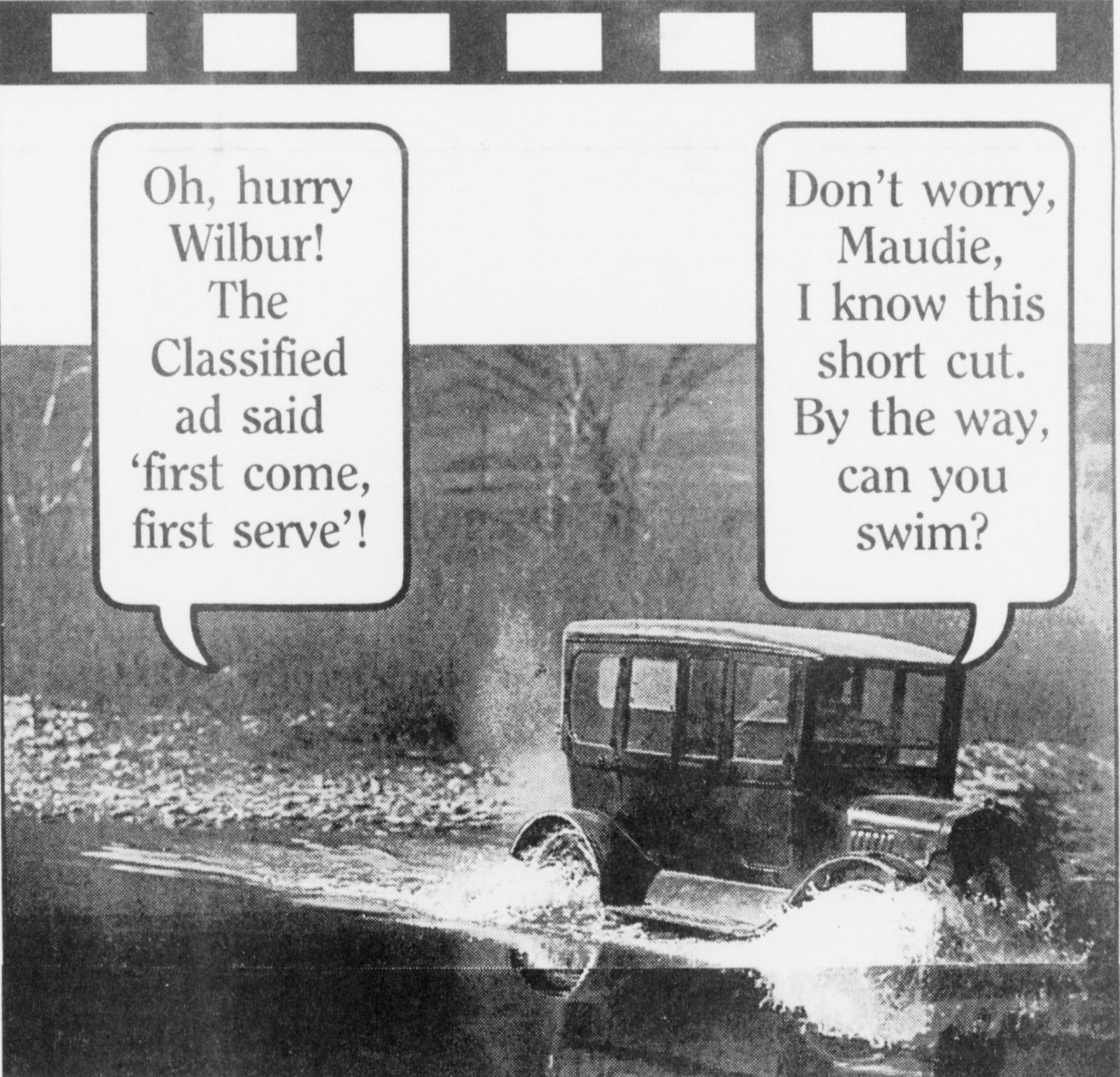

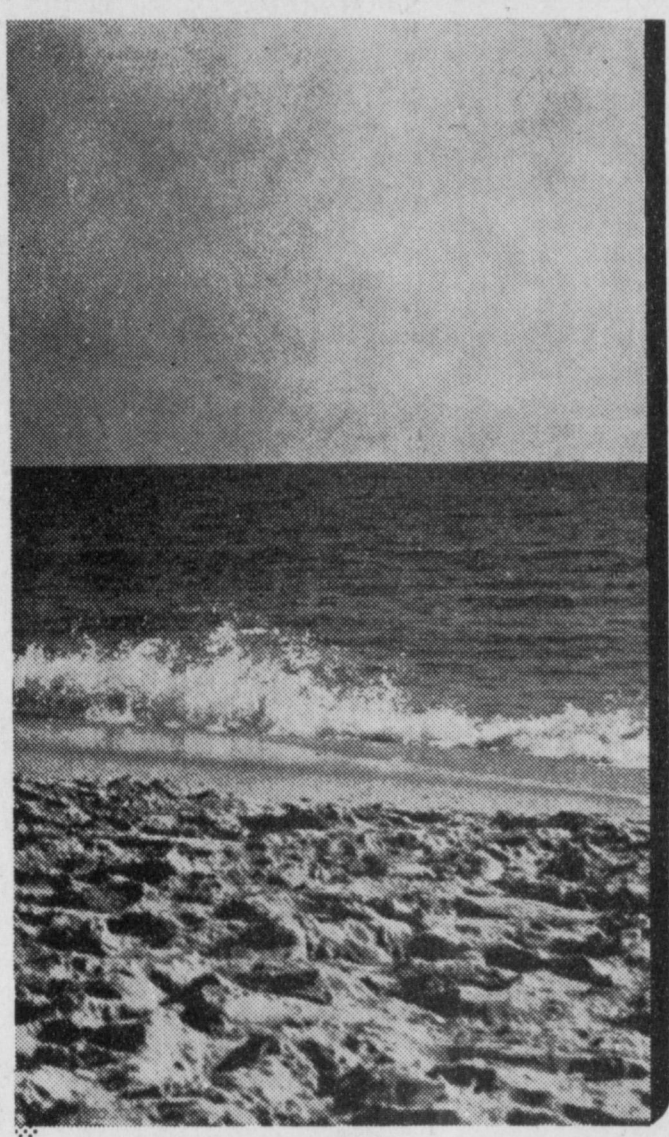

Cotton Ginners Attend Schools

Three Cotton Ginners Schools
will be held in Texas and New
Mexico this year, but seats are
filling quickly, says Fred Johnson,
executive vice president of the
National Cotton Ginners
Association (NCGA), Memphis.
Course level I will be offered at
the Texas A&M Research &
Extension Center, Corpus Christi,
Tx. May 11-13. Levels I, II and II
will be offered at the Southwest
Cotton/Ginning Lab, Las Cruces,
NM, July 13-15; and levels I and II
at the South Plains Ginning
Research Lab, Lubbock, Tx, July
20-22.

The schools, begun 6 years ago,
are sponsored by NCGA, NCC,
USDA, state Extension services,
Cotton Incorporated, ginner
associations and gin manufacturers.
The level I course covers
maintenance of gin and gin
auxiliary equipment, air use and
drying, electrical systems and gin
safety. The level II course offers
advanced training in these areas as
well as pneumatics and waste
collection, and gin management
tips.

Level III students will receive a
review of ginning system functions
and information on gin air systems,
drying and moisture restoration

systems, management of seed
cotton unloading systems, bale
presses and hydraulic systems, and
cottonseed handling systems.

NCGA also is offering a cotton
ginners certification program.
Requirements for the optional
program include completion of all
three instruction levels or
equivalent experience, the Red
Cross standard first aid course
certification, written recom-
mendation from an established
ginner and satisfactory performance
on a comprehensive written
examination covering practical
aspects of gin operation.

"The ginner schools provide a
unique forum whereby ginners and
gin employees can sharpen their
skills with first-rate instruction
from leading gin engineers," said
Keith Pendergrass, NCGA
President, Wellman, Tx.
"Likewise, the certification
program, with its additional
requirements, will help raise our
industry's level of professionalism"

Certification applicants must be
members of NCGA and must take
additional course work that will be
offered at future schools. For more

What is Memorial Day?

A long time ago, between
the years of 1861-1865,
there was a war between the
states called the Civil War.
Soldiers of the North,
known as the Union, fought
soldiers of the South, known
as the Confederacy. Unfor-
tunately, many soldiers were
killed.
Shortly after the war, a
druggist named Henry C.
Welles, of Waterloo, N.Y.,
suggested that the soldiers
who died in the Civil War
should be remembered.
He proposed the idea of
decorating their graves with
flowers. This tradition was
known as "Decoration Day."
Years later, after the U.S.

had fought other wars,
Memorial Day became a
day for honoring and
remembering lives that
were lost in all military
conflicts.
The first state to legalize
Memorial Day as a holi-
day was New York, in
1873. Today it is a national
holiday.
Many other nations also
have days when they re-
member and honor the dead.
One interesting difference
between the American ce-
lebration and the oldest festi-
val known: Ancient people
believed that just before a
New Year, the dead left their
graves to visit the living.

every-one asked to wear white. From 4 to 6 p.m. the students gathered wood for the annual bon fire in the New City Park.

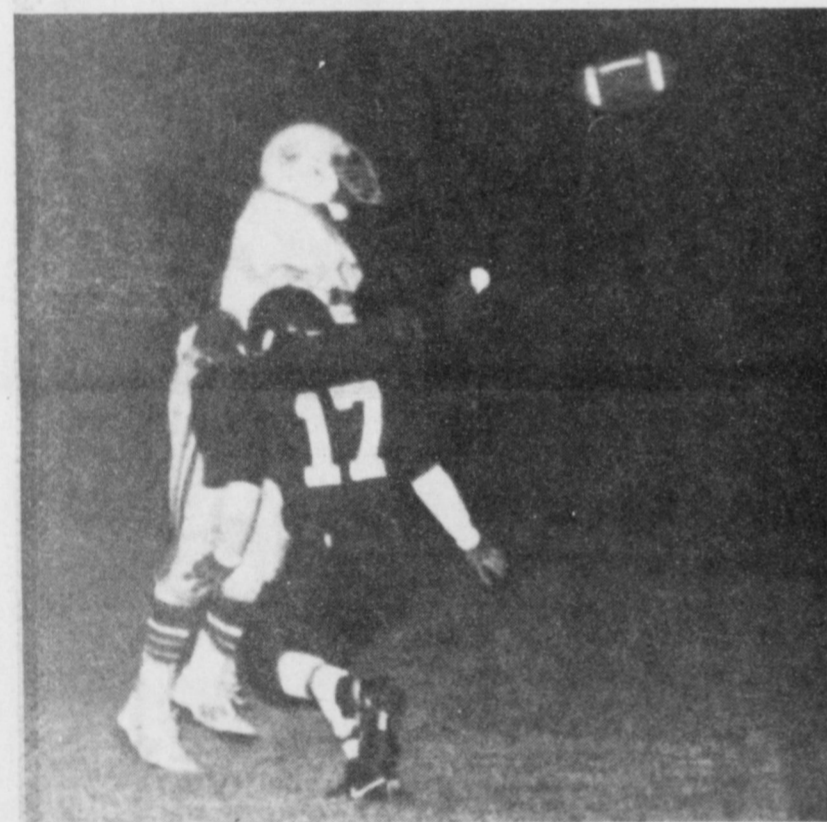

Next week, the Longhorns travel to Whitharal to begin district play. Game time is set for 7:30 p.m.

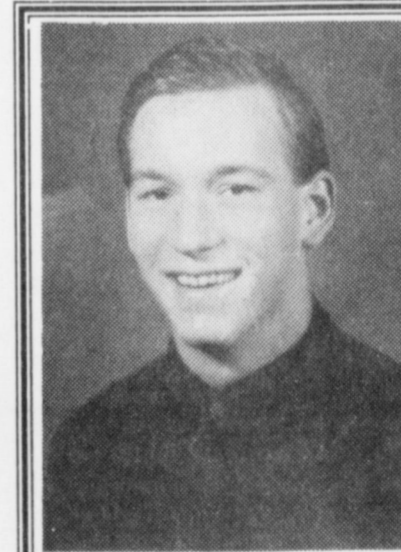
