Only 1,332 poll tax receipts had been issued in McCulloch county up to Wednesday night of last week at the office of J. C. Moffatt, tax assessor-collector.

Recent cold weather probably had little effect on fruit and pecan trees other than to kill some insects. Dr. C. L. Smith of Brownwood agricultural head, began experiment station said.

Nearly one-seventh of all the turkeys shipped from Texas points during last year were shipped out of Brownwood, according to Brownwood and State poultry shipment figures.

While Brownwood was shipping some 80 carloads, the State as a whole shipped 607 carloads of turkeys. Texas poultry shipments gained 41.5 per cent over 1938. Egg shipments dropped from 24 to 11 cars.
