This Week in Our Town

Brady Retains the Region Title; York and Speck Placed

Brady's Bulldogs, champions of the recent District 8 interscholastic meet at Brownwood, repeated Saturday as first place winners in the regional track and field meet at Abilene. They scored 30.6 points, as compared with 14 for Sweetwater, their nearest rival.

Points scored by other teams were: Moran 13, Robert Lee 10.8, Mineral Wells 9.2, Aspermont 8, Eden 7, Baird 6, Santa Anna 6, Williams 5, Alexander 5, Ovalo 5, San Angelo 3, Hico 3, Clyde 3, Breckenridge 2.7, Goldthwaite 2.5, Strawn 2, Colorado City 2, Rochester 2, Old Glory 1, Tuscola 1, Menard 1, May 1, Talpa 1, Snyder 1, Melvin 1 and Dunn 2.

Verna Grady of Williams was the only Brown county athlete to win a first place. He upset some of the favorites by coming in first in the 440-yard dash with time of 53.5 seconds.

Norris McWilliams of May ran fourth in the mile run, which was won by Taylor of Eden with a 4:53 mark. Petty of Brady was second and Jolley of Robert Lee, third.

Brady's first-string mile relay team, which did not compete in the district meet, won first at the regional in 3:35.3. San Angelo was second; Santa Anna, third, and Mineral Wells, fourth. Santa Anna won the event in the District 8 meet and the Mineral Wells quartet finished first in the recent Oil Belt meet.

Other places won by representatives of District 8 follow.

Miles McInnis, Brady—first in high hurdles (15.6); third in low hurdles.

Beecher Huff, Brady—first in 100-yard dash (10.2); second in 220-yard dash.

Aubrey Shaw, Brady—first in javelin throw (168.8); third in high hurdles.

Adrian Speck, Santa Anna—fourth in 440-yard dash.

Murry Summers, Talpa—fourth in 880-yard run.

Charles York, Santa Anna—second in broad jump.

Robert Saylor, Melvin—tied for third with four others in high jump.

Raymond McKee, Brady—tied for third with four others in high jump.

James Cornelius, Goldthwaite—tied for second with Kendrick of Benjamin in pole vault.

A. C. Odell, Hico—second in shot put.

Although J. B. Montgomery of Moran shattered all high school marks in Texas with a haul of 56 feet, 1 inch in the shot put, he will not receive credit for a new regional record because the iron ball was weighed after the meet and found to be seven ounces shy of the required 12 pounds.

All Region 2 records remained intact. The shot put record mark of 53 feet, 7 inches was set by Jack Price of Santa Anna in 1936. Montgomery's throw bettered the states record by 2 feet, 4 1/2 inches and lacked 1 foot, 9 inches, matching the national interscholastic mark.

Montgomery accounted for all of Moran's points, with first places in the shot and discus and second in the javelin throw. He was high point man of the meet.

Oil Briefs

States Oil corporation No. 1 V. N. Owens, Novice field test that was deepened to the Ellenburger and plugged back to Gardiner sand, has been completed in the upper zone for 31 barrels of oil daily. The test is in the NE 1/4 of section 23-2-T&N survey.

Robertson & Bradford of Haskell No. 1 J. P. Morris is estimated at 7,500,000 cubic feet of gas per day, with a small amount of oil, but remains shut in awaiting gauge. The test is three quarters mile east of previous production, and is in section 176-2-G&H survey.

LOCAL FFA TEAM WINS FIRST PLACE IN STATE JUDGING CONTEST

In the state judging contest held at A&M College Monday, the soil conservation team of the Santa Anna-FFA chapter, competing with near 150 teams of the state, were first place winners in that division and O. L. Cheaney Jr., was high-point individual, announced A. D. Pettit, vocational-agriculture teacher.

The team is composed of Tom Bill Guthrie, Gay Arrant and Cheaney. Floyd Shelton went as alternate.

Of a possible 900 points for an individual, O. L. scored 830 in the judging contest. Score for the team was 2380 points as compared with 2344 for Tolar and 2327 for Whitesboro, second and third place winners.

Each chapter was allowed to enter a three-man team in each of three of the ten judging events, but the soil conservation team was the only entry from Santa Anna.

Approximately 3500 boys were in College Station for the contest.

Coleman Co. News Briefs

Organization of the 11th boy's 4-H club in Coleman county was accomplished last week by County Agent D. D. Steele. The club is located in the Anderson community. Its members plan to feed hogs, calves and poultry.

For the third consecutive time, the Coleman Goat Ropers last week defeated the Cisco Goat Ropers in an inter-city match at Coleman. The Coleman team roped 17 goats in an average of 16.36 seconds while Cisco roped 13 goats at an average of 20.07 seconds.

Funeral services for Geo. H. Lynch, 68, stockfarmer of the Anderson community, were held Sunday from the Stevens Funeral Chapel at Coleman. Paul Wallace, minister of the Church of Christ of that city, officiated. Interment was in Mt. View cemetery. Mr. Lynch had been a resident of Coleman county for about 50 years. Survivors include his widow, the former L. A. Anker, one daughter, Mrs. Margaret Simpson of Dallas, a brother, S. Lynch of Boerne and a sister, Mrs. Willie Davis of Austin.

Recent rains have shown many weaknesses in soil and water conservation practices throughout the county. D. D. Steele, county agent, declared. "The heavy loss of soil and water indicated clearly the need for more adequate methods in curbing the ravages of run-off water and the subsequent loss of soil and water. Many fields which have been encoured instead of being terraced have suffered great loss of soil and water," the county agent stated.

For the winner of the sponsored contest which will be staged this year by the Coleman Rodeo Association, there will be a \$150 black and white saddle that has just been made by Bennett Nance of the J. H. Nance & Son, saddle makers. It is the award of the Coleman County State Bank. Engraved on the horn, a solid sterling silver plate, are these words: "Compliments of the Coleman County State Bank 1940". The seat, trimmings, leathers and stirrup are all white and the remainder is black with the exception of the lining around the edges.

The Coleman Electric Cooperative now has 618 miles of energized line and is planning a total of about 500 more miles. The cooperative has mapped for 150 or 175 miles of extensions within the limits of present lines, and it is planned to build these by July 1.

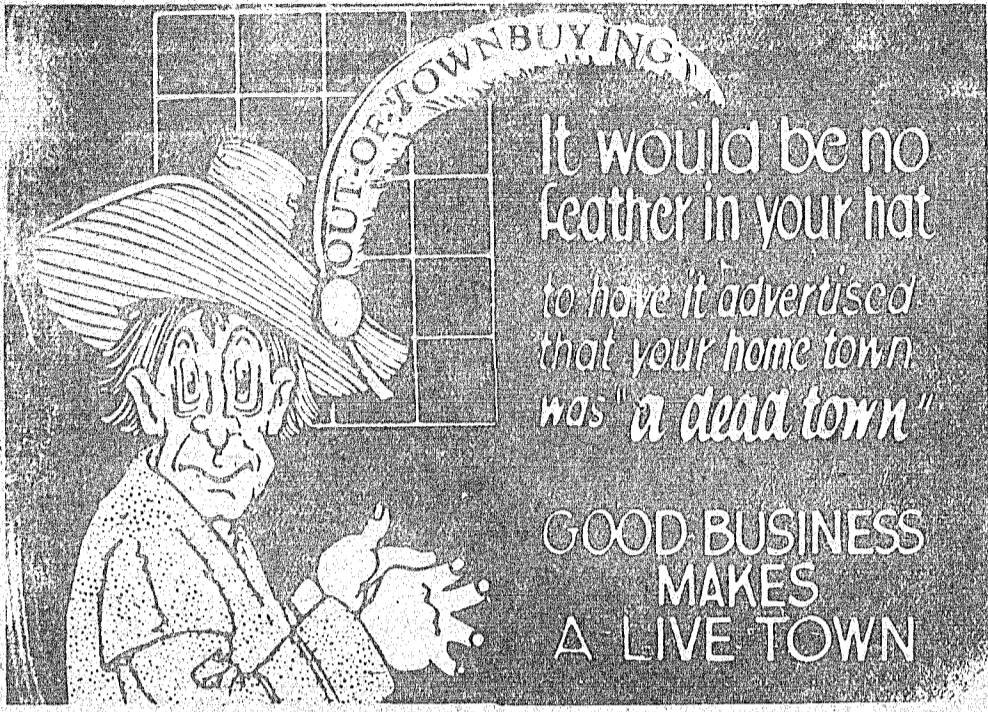
