## Sign Up For Mattresses

Application for participation in the new 1940-41 Cotton Mattress Program are now in the hands of the members of the Home Demonstration Club, the chairman of the committee has announced.

The Cotton Mattress Program is sponsored by the Extension Service the A. A. A. and the Surplus Marketing Association. The Surplus Marketing Association furnishes the cotton and ticking. The AAA certifies eligible families, orders cotton and ticking, etc. The Extension Service through its organizations supervises the taking of applications and the making of the mattresses.

The purpose of the program is to use surplus cotton as well as furnish material for an educational program.

A low-income rural family is any family which had for the latest preceding calendar year a total income of not more than \$500, plus \$50 for each member of the family in excess of four persons, and which (1) lives in the country or (2) lives in a village, town or city, and derived at least one half of its total income during the latest preceding calendar year from Agricultural occupations.

Each eligible family may receive one mattress for each two persons in the family, but not to exceed a total of three mattresses. Where one person constitutes a family under the provisions of this program, such person is eligible to receive one mattress. If the family has already received a mattress or has made application for material to make a mattress under the cotton mattress project or has received a mattress from the Farm Security Administration, or the State Welfare Agency, this is to be included in determining the number of mattresses which the family may receive, under the program.

Applications may be made from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. Saturday, December 14. After Saturday applications may be made at the Agricultural Building in Coleman.

Funeral services for J. P. Vinson were conducted from the First Baptist Church Friday, December 6 with the Rev. H. C. Wingo of Gonzales, officiating, and the Rev. S. R. Smith, Rev. H. C. Bowman and Rev. M. L. Womack assisting.

John Perry Oswald Vinson was born September 22, 1874 in Tishomingo County, Mississippi and died December 3, 1940, making his earthly life 66 years, 2 months and 111 days.

### Heart o' Texas News Briefs

There's an increasing demand in Brady for houses and apartments and other living quarters because of the overflow of newcomers flocking to Brownwood.

Nineteen members of the 1940 Brady high school football squad have been awarded letters for this season, and will receive jackets as soon as they arrive, it was announced.

The State Highway commission Wednesday designated the Brownwood - Richland Springs road as a second class highway.

The Farmers Cooperative Warehouse association of Brown county, which has scrambled for warehouse space all season to store peanuts produced in seven Central Texas counties, has again exhausted its available space and arranged for another warehouse. The additional warehouse will be the sixth—all in May—to be filled with peanuts by the association.

Postal receipts at Brownwood for November totaled \$8,571.92, a gain of 38 percent over receipts for the same month in 1939.

Twenty-five members of the Howard Payne football squad of the past season are eligible for letters, according to a recent announcement.

The three-man medical board which has been giving examinations to National Guardsmen of the Brownwood, Santa Anna, Coleman and Ballinger companies, has disbanded after examining more than 600 men.

Under the sponsorship of the Heart of Texas Post No. 3279 the streets of the downtown section of Brownwood are being decorated for the arrival of the 39th Division.

The Brown County chapter of the American Red Cross secured \$1,480 during the 1940 Roll Call just concluded. This amount is more than double the 1939 drive.

Several hundred former students and friends of Howard Payne College attended the college's annual homecoming program Friday night and Saturday.

Brownwood's exclusive Officers' Club, was opened last week under the management of H. L. Whitaker, formerly of Fort Worth. The club includes a large dance floor, completely equipped kitchen and dining room, reception room, locker room, lounge, fountain etc. Service will be carried out by a trained staff of more than 25 employees.

An additional \$20,000 is needed for purchase of necessary campsite and maneuver area land for Camp Bowie. This money, together with funds previously raised, will clear up Brownwood's part of leasing land for the \$13,000,000 army training center now under construction.

Open competitive examinations for filling several positions at Camp Bowie have been announced by the Civil Service Commission.

Application for a half million dollars in federal aid to Brownwood city schools to take care of the emergency brought about by heavy increase in enrollment as a result of establishment of Camp Bowie there is being prepared under direction of Superintendent E. J. Woodward.

Enrollment in the Brady public schools is the largest in the history of the school system.

Brady's new National Defense Airport, now under construction, will be used for a primary training center for around 200 Air Corps Cadets. Workmen now are busily engaged in the removal of brush and trees, and preparing Brady's new airport as a WPA project. The field will be the finest in this section.

Scientists at the Cornell University (New York) agricultural experiment station are "pasteurizing" soils with electricity to eradicate pests and weed seeds. A soil temperature of 150 degrees Fahrenheit was found sufficient to kill all important disease organisms and most weed seeds.

Thru the week ending October 26, the Port of Houston had exported 130,000 bales of cotton, or nearly one-half of the USA total since August 1. This gave Houston a substantial lead over other ports.

Brazil's 1937 cotton crop, largest in the country's history, was only two-thirds as large as Texas' production for the same year.

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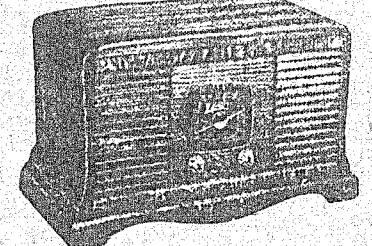

The Rockwood Future Farmer Chapter met in a called meeting last week to elect new parliamentarian, Billy Ashmore, the former parliamentarian, dropped agriculture, necessitating the new election. Candidates were selected from both classes and the run-off was between the high boy in each class. Ted Lovelady became the candidate from the 8-9th grade class and Howard Blackwell from the 10-11th grade class. Howard Blackwell then won the office in the regular election.

In keeping with the previous articles we are presenting the chapter treasurer, William Hodges, this week. William is a junior in high school and is 15. He takes an active interest in the work of the chapter and participates in many of its functions.

For his project program he has a sow for pig production, turkeys for egg production and 5 acres of corn.

He is feeding his 250 pound Poland China sow a ration consisting of threshed higeare, ground corn, maize and cottonseed meal. Part of the pigs he will save and use for projects next year, and part of them he will sell this year.

This spring he is going to raise five acres of Bloody Butcher corn to feed his pigs next year. He is also planning to raise a patch of hybrid corn to see if it is adapted to this section of the country. He is going to produce his own seed, using inbred seed and Bloody Butcher, in order that it may be thoroughly suited to this section, since that has often been the reason for the failure of hybrid corn.

Late in November he bought 20 Bronze turkey hens and 2 toms, using size, body shape, width of breast, and egg production as the basis for his selection. He is feeding them a ration of corn and higeare now to get them in good shape to begin laying early when egg prices are high. About December 15th he will start feeding laying mash and increase his ration in order to force his hens into laying. William has good equipment for producing eggs, among which are self-feeders, shelters, and a heated water trough. He knows a good egg when he sees one, since he has been grading and handling eggs here.

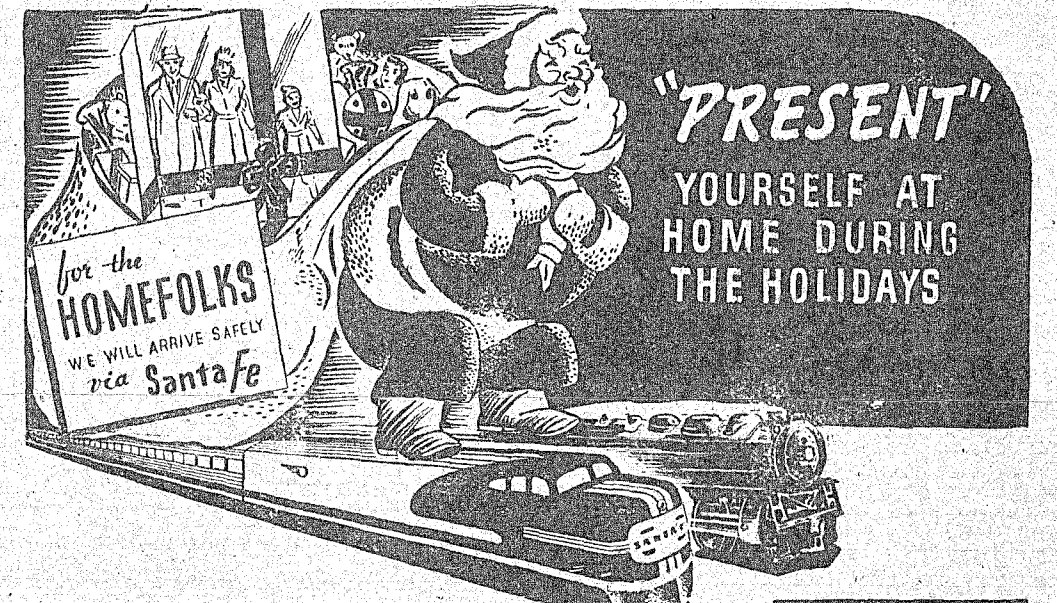
