## Miss Hogue Will Explain Cookery

### Stick Horse Contest Big Success

Friday afternoon, August 22, at 5 o'clock the Wild Cowboys and Cowgirls between the ages of six and twelve years, started the Annual Santa Anna Recreation Department Stick Horse Rodeo parade on the sidewalks of Santa Anna.

Their horses were of first-class stock found in broom and mop handles. The official cart was made by the manager and announcer, Jerry Fulton, which horsepower was supplied by Donald Ray Howard, he being hitched to the official cart. This followed the colorful flag bearer, E. J. Brand. Then the prettiest of all cowgirls, who handled their spirited horses with great finesse. The clown, Novel Densman Jr., and Max Eskridge gave their best to make the parade one that will be long remembered in the annals of Rodeo parades. Sixteen cowgirls and forty cowboys participated.

The one casualty was when a horse lost his head and the quick thinking of his rider restored his head in record-breaking time and finished the parade. The first event being tie-down roping with 20 cowboys competing. Spectators said that without a doubt the calves were the meanest to handle they had ever seen. Winners in this was a tie of 22 seconds between Jim Tom Simpson and James Goodwin.

Then came the thrilling rides of all rides, bronc riding. Ten cowboys signed up for this important feature. John Frankrick on Ten Minutes to Midnight, won first in 20 seconds.

One of the fastest of all steer riding was 8 seconds given to I. O. Bibbes riding on Last Chance. Twelve entries in this event.

The important part of pick-up boys was played by Novel Densman Jr., and Willard Allen who through their skillful riding kept many cowboys from going lame.

Winners of the two age group of the Girls' Flag race were Lajanna and Elaine Burgett, sisters. Time for this was 27 seconds. Really fast riding for girls with their long curls flying in the breeze. The crowd gave the girls a real Rodeo hand. Sixteen girls entered this colorful event. The girls received Rodeo boutonnieres.

The last event listed on the program was the hazardous bull dogging. Fifteen boys entered this with Donald Ray Howard, placing first who handled his steed with deftness and assurance. One of our oldest oil timers in bull dogging came thru without a scratch. So ends another featured event of the Recreation Department until next Rodeo.

A lump-sum contract for the construction and completion of additional access roads at Camp Bowie has been awarded to Allhands — Beilay Inc., and Allhands — Swatzell Inc., of Dallas. It was announced by Col. Edwin V. Dunstan, constructing quartermaster, Eighth Construction Zone, Fort Sam Houston. The contract amounts to \$111,447.50. It was reported that the work, scheduled to begin immediately, will include emergency construction and reconstruction of county roads in a leased maneuver area in Brown and Mills counties. Honorable mention goes to Mrs. P. H. Williams with 82 and Jerry Fulton and Jess Williams with 80 each.

There were only 33 replies this week a disappointingly low number for such a contest.

The misspelled words were all simple with the exception of a few. The errors most frequently missed were Gibb—Gibbs, Sturgis—Sturges, Counties—County's, and — and, wares—wears, Repellant—Repellent, an Airmister—an Airmaster, make makes, drink—drinks, Griffin—Griffin's, Product—Products, need—needs, tabacco—tobacco, Carefully—Careful, Rexal—Rexall.

This week and next should see the number of folks entering the contest materially increased. Several held back because they didn't want to rewrite all the misspelled words last week, and more would have entered had they known they could just mark the errors on the page and send it in. Do that if you wish—just mark a line through the error and mark correct letter at the end of the line, or write the word correctly in the ad space or on the margin, just so it is clear the way you think the word is spelled. And put your name on the page or correction sheet. We had one page, grading 78, that had no name on it or the envelope in which it was received.

**NUTRITION CONFERENCE**

Texas' follow-up meeting to the National Nutrition Conference for Defense, called last spring in Washington by President Roosevelt, has been set tentatively for October 13-15 in Austin by the steering committee of the Texas State Nutrition Committee.

Hundreds of professional and lay workers interested in translating knowledge of nutrition into an every-day reality for all Texas families are expected to attend the Texas Nutrition Conference. Purposes of the meeting will be to determine the nutrition situation in Texas and consider its influence in the lives of the people, to review and to make plans for helping Texans obtain and eat the right food.

Mildred Horton, vice director of the A. & M. College Extension Service, and chairman of the state committee, will head the conference program committee.

Members of the steering committee, who met last week in Dallas, were told that low-cost diets recently worked out by members of the state committee are being used by Texas public assistance families seeking to have better meals for less money.

**MORE MATTRESSES MADE**

Recent reports from Washington state that 2,833,080 mattresses and 705,000 comforts have been made in 46 states under the Department of Agriculture's cotton-mattress program. Mildred Horton of the Extension Service and R. T. Price of the Triple-A report that 463,250 mattresses had been delivered to Texas families on August 1. Comfort deliveries were set at 78,048.

**USE OF COTTON STAMPS IS CLEARLY OUTLINED**

L. J. Cappelman, Regional Director, Surplus Marketing Administration, United States Department of Agriculture, today pointed out the importance of retail merchants determining which articles may or may not be sold for cotton stamps. "Only articles made of 100% cotton grown, processed and manufactured entirely within the United States," he said, "may be sold for cotton stamps." He said, "Any retail merchant redeeming cotton stamps for which non-cotton articles have been sold, makes a false claim against the United States Treasury and is subject to fine and imprisonment."

"All cotton articles," he said, "which contain elastic, functioning as fasteners, bands, gussets or inserts for the purpose of making the article fit more closely at the sleeves, legs or waist, and all cotton articles containing embroidery functioning as trimming, may be sold for cotton stamps. Articles and products such as clothes lines, plow lines and osnaburg fabrics, made of spinnable cotton waste which is the product of lint cotton grown and processed in the United States may also be exchanged for cotton stamps."

**Ineligible Articles**

Mr. Cappelman continued, "Articles and products containing in addition to cotton such non-cotton materials as rayon, wool and silk or elastic (except when functioning as fasteners) as integral components of the fabric, may not be exchanged for cotton stamps. A nd cotton articles that are combined with non-cotton material such as metal stays, bone strips, rollers attachments, frames, leather, leatherette, paper, springs, etc., cannot be sold for cotton stamps. Also, cotton articles that are impregnated or coated with plastics or water-proofing and fire proofing compounds, etc. are ineligible. Because lint, etc. is not lint cotton or cotton waste articles and products containing linters cannot be sold for cotton stamps."

It was suggested by Mr. Cappelman that retailers plainly mark articles and products which are eligible, so they can be sure that non-stamp items are not sold for cotton stamps.

**Editorial**

**THE COMPETITIVE SYSTEM** of food merchandising protects the consumer. That sounds fine and as long as the wage level for unskilled and unorganized labor remains low it is fine for the consumer. But the same co-operative system applied to buying from the producer keeps the farmer one step above Chinese coolie labor. When Texas cabbage brings the grower \$8 and sells to the consumer at \$80, as has frequently happened, something is rotten—not the cabbage, but in the "buy cheap, regardless of grower cost in order to undersell the other fellow" program we have been consistently following the past twenty years.

**FOR RAILWAY COMPANIES** to meet labor's demand for a \$900,000,000 increase in wages, an extra hundred dollars per car would have to be tacked on the 700,000,000 cars of freight moved by the American railways, and \$200,000,000 net earnings of the entire American railway system would have to be kicked in to meet the \$900,000,000 wage demand. The public can hardly meet a raise from \$129.89 to \$229.89 per car for freight, and the stockholders probably want a bit of dividends on their investments in railways. The wage problem must be worked out by something other than a strongarm handover method.

**SYNDICALISM** brought disruption to post-war Germany, and very largely created the Nazi dictatorship. It corrupted and paralyzed France and led to her defeat. It is this kind of syndicalism which some ruthless and ambitious labor leaders plan for the United States. They operate under threats of what will happen if their demands are refused. Their aim is plain—syndicalism, a labor monopoly which will be more powerful than the government and deny non-union men the right to work, even to live. The Herrin incident would be daily attractions until non-unionists were killed out, man woman and child.

**SCHOOL STARTS** again in a few more days. For the past few months all of the boys and girls have been enjoying a welcome vacation. Along with them are a number of boys who have been enjoying a year-long vacation, spending too much time in unwholesome surroundings. They have not attended school, haun the alleys by day and the streets by night. Observation has shown some unmindful of property rights of others. Some are developing slowly a Barrows complex. Other range the gamut of hoodlum-racketeer scales, and are a constant menace to the peace and happiness of their families. If Coleman County has a truant officer he can do a lot of good by seeing that professional school dodgers bac kto school. Those boys are worth saving!

**IT IS CLEAR CERTAIN POWERFUL LABOR LEADERS** have but one aim in mind, and that is to make it impossible for any man to earn a living unless he joins a labor union and increases the power of the leader. These leaders are driving toward labor monopoly—and toward personal dictatorship over every working man and woman in this nation. And to gain their ends they will use any means available. They will call strikes in defense industries, apparently not caring a whit that the country's security and safety are imperiled. They will rig labor elections so that the ordinary union man i s virtually voiceless. Occasionally they stoop to violence and terrorism. They make use of that most terrible weapon—the black list. Their obvious purpose is to put the fear of God into workers and employers, so that they will knuckle under. The callous disregard certain labor leaders have shown for our government and national security in time of crisis indicates the way the wind blows. They make totally unjustified and impossible demand on industry on an "or else" basis. Their methods are not much different from those of Al Capone in his heydey. A labor monopoly is a serious problem. If this condition goes on the nation will be helpless and a few fat-salaried labor leaders will rule the country as Hitler rules the Reich. Nothing will be done without their permission—and on their terms. These are the syndicalistic tactics that did so much to destroy France. When the Constitution says a man can work where, when and for what he wills, why should racketeers be permitted to change the law?

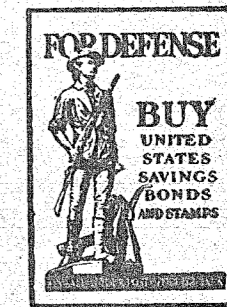

## FALL GARDENING NOTES

From Home Dem. Agent

Don't limit a garden to greens and beans, but include such a variety of good garden vegetables as to make the job interesting and afford the family the greatest measure of health. To give winter meals that tantalizing taste of something fresh from the garden, every fall gardening should strive for crisp radishes, juicy baby beets and sweet carrots, leafy tender greens, spinach, lettuce and Chinese cabbage.

Do get the garden soil ready by cleaning up and burning all the old stalks and trash from the summer garden, thus destroying insects and fungus pests. Then spread fertilizer over the garden plot and plow under to a depth of about five inches. Get about one-fourth more seed for the fall garden than for spring gardens, because germination of seed at this season is not as good as earlier. Seeds with a hard coating or hull may be soaked overnight in luke-warm water to aid in germination.

Choose varieties of vegetables that will either mature before frost, or will withstand light frosts. From August 15 to 30 pinto beans and refugee beans may be planted successfully; Thomas Laxton English peas from now until the first of September; Scarlet Globe radishes and Shogoin Turnips are good stand-bys; Danvers Half Long Carrots and Detroit Dark Red

Beets should be in the ground by September 15. Call your Home Demonstration office for a bulletin giving varieties and varieties.

Garden seed may be sown next year, and it's an easy matter now to pick out some of the best fruits or vegetables to save the seeds. Seeds should be washed thoroughly and stored in a dry, cool place in cotton sacks or containers that will let low air to penetrate, and place in a cool dark storage room.
