



FOR RAILWAY COMPANIES to meet labor's demand for a \$900,000,000 increase in wages, an extra hundred dollars er car would have to be tacked on the 700,000,000 cars of freight moved by the American railways, and \$200,000,000 net earnings of the entire American railway system would have to be kicked in to meet the \$900,000,000 wage demand. The public can hardly meet a raise from \$129.89 to \$229.89 per car for freight, and the stockholders probably want a bit of dividends on their investments in railways. The wage problem must be worked out by something other than

a strongarm handover method.

SYNDICALISM brought dissruption to post-war Germany, and very largely created the Nazi dictatorship. It corrupted and paralyzed France and led to her defeat. It is this kind of syndicalism which some ruthless and ambitious labor leaders plan for the United States. They operate under threats of what will happen if their demands are refused. Their aim is plain-syndicalism, a labor monopoly which will be more powerful than the government and deny non-union men the right to work, even to live.
