

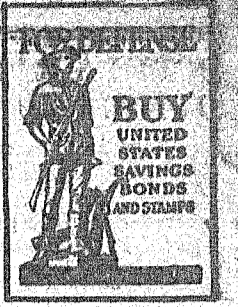

States Oil corporation of Eastland No. 2-B Frank Hudson, offset to the Novice area's largest producer, was running pipe at 3,527 feet last weekend in preparation for completion.

R. M. Coleman of Fort Worth No. 1 Carroll Kingsbery, six miles south of Santa Anna, has been spudded as a 2,300-foot wildcat in Wharton county school land survey.

### Heart o' Texas News Briefs

Only about 400 of Brown county's 2000 farmers have executed farm plan sheets for 1942. This is the last week in which they may execute the plan sheets. Payments under the AAA program may be withheld from those who fail to execute plan sheets.

How many bootleggers are there in Brownwood? J. C. Roy, a state liquor board agent, doesn't know, but he knows there are at least 21, because he has arrested that many during the present month up to the past weekend.

Herman Betis, manager of the Brown County Water Improvement District No. 1 received a telegram from Congressman Charles L. South in Washington indicating that immediate action on the district's application for federal funds to help build a duplicate water filtration and pumping plant was expected.

A revised natural gas service rate, giving the city of Snyder the lowest priced house heating gas it has ever enjoyed has been granted by Comunity Natural Gas Co. The new rate gives Snyder gas customers heating gas at five cents per 100 cubic feet, or 50 cents per 1,000 cubic feet, compared with the old rate of 67½ cents.

Completion of the \$30,000 Fred Stanton Apartment Courts and Steak House in Brady gives that city one of the most modern and up-to-date courts in this section of the country.

Fire ravaged buildings in the central business section of the city of Brownwood Sunday causing damage estimated at nearly \$100,000. Fire started in a building housing McLeLLans department store, and the Austin shoe store with stocks damaged by fire and water. A brisk wind caused smoke damage to adjoining women's apparel store.

Col. Ernest O. Thompson, youngest overseas lieutenant-colonel with the AEF in 1918, spent his last day in army uniform Monday. He will be retired at midnight, and in accordance with custom was given his last day at home. Thompson spent it at his desk as chairman of the Texas railroad commission.

### CURING AND STORING SWEET POTATOES

Curing sweet potatoes in storage houses is the most suitable method, provided there is sufficient volume to justify the expense. Otherwise, says E. A. Miller, agronomist of the A. and M. College Extension Service, banks may be used satisfactorily if they are properly constructed.

The bank should be placed on a well-drained spot, properly ventilated and protected by a shelter or large losses will result. If less than 20 bushels are to be stored the cone-shaped bank may be used, but for larger quantities the bank should be long and narrow with a V-shaped trough inverted and laid in the bottom of the bed.

Supports should be placed beneath the trough so as to hold it about two inches above the ground with the ends extending beyond the bank. Miller says, The ridge of trough should be cut to allow the air drawn into it to pass through the banked potatoes from the bottom. These openings should be covered by hardware cloth to keep out rats. An upright flue extending out of the top of the bank is placed over the inverted trough, with the top covered to keep out moisture. The edges of the flue should be open along its entire length so the air can circulate into it from the potatoes. About four inches of good, clean straw should be placed under and over the potatoes and covered with enough earth, where necessary, to prevent freezing. In cold weather all openings should be closed. A bank five to six feet wide at the bottom, four feet high and 20 feet long will store around 200 bushels.

Miller cautions that sweet potatoes should be handled as carefully as eggs because they bruise easily. Bruises affect their quality and often set up rotting.

### Coleman Co. News Briefs

County School Superintendent W. T. Graves, is one of the 24 Texas public school officials who have just recently been elected to an advisory board for the University of Texas Inter-scholastic League.

Deputy State Superintendent, Claud Mullins, will visit state aid schools in the county the week of December 1.

Coleman County mattress centers will shutdown for the remainder of the year, as soon as present quotas are filled, according to Miss Jean Day, H. D. C. Agent Rockwood and Buffalo centers will close in the near future and Coleman will close as soon as 250 comforts are finished.

A Homes Registration Office to organize adequate housing facilities for national defense workers of the Coleman air school has been established at Coleman under the direction of Johnnie B. Howell, after a conference of Coleman businessmen with T. W. Poore, defense housing advisor of Washington.

Six defendants charged with illegal distribution of literature in Coleman and alleged members of the Jehovah's Witnesses sect were found guilty by a jury in County Judge John O. Harris' county court last week. Three of the defendants were assessed fines of five dollars and costs and three were assessed fines of \$50 and cost each.

Interest in the annual meeting of the Coleman Production Credit Association, to be held at Coleman Feb. 2, has been aroused by M. B. Pardlaw, president, who says that associations are expanding their services to reach more farmers and livestock producers over the state than ever before.

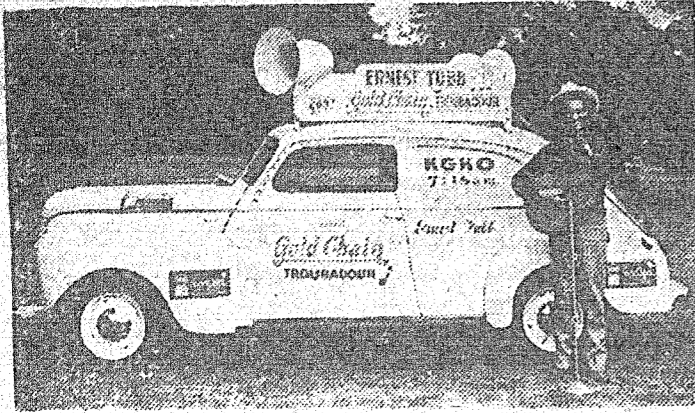

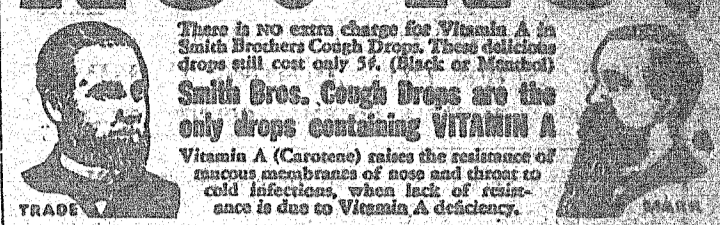

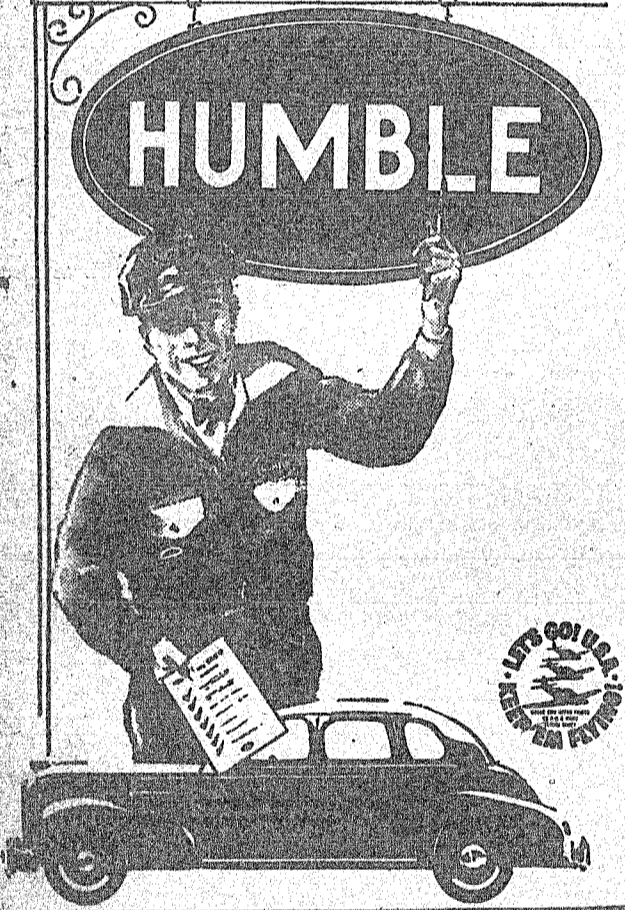
