



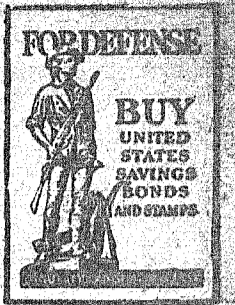

### H. M. BROWN COUNTY TAX OFFICER PASSES

Horace Maynard (Shorty) Brown, 57, county tax assessor-collector of Coleman County, died unexpectedly of a heart attack early Saturday.

He had been ill only a few days, but had suffered from the same ailment before he had just returned from a deer hunt a day or so ago.

Brown was serving his second term as assessor-collector before the office was combined with that of collector, and had served as public weigher of precinct one from 1922 to 1930 inclusive. For four years between 1922 and the time of his death, he was out of politics, operating a service station in Coleman most of that time.

Brown was born in Warren county, Tenn., in 1883. He came to Coleman county from Marlin, Texas, in 1909. He served as deputy grand master of Masonry for several years, and was active in Masonic work for many years.

He was a member of the Church of Christ. He is survived by his wife.

Funeral services were held from the family residence at Coleman at 3 p. m. Sunday with Paul Wallace, Church of Christ minister, officiating. Masonic rites were conducted and members of the Coleman Masonic lodge served as pallbearers. Burial was made in the Coleman Cemetery. J. E. Stevens Company had charge of the arrangements.

### Brownwood Officer Interested In Mystery Developments

Oscar Sanderson, Brownwood city traffic officer, made a trip to Coleman Tuesday night in connection with the mystery death of Charles Ewing, a hotel operator from that city.

That relatives think Mr. Ewing was murdered was indicated by the fact that they paid \$50 for extraction of the bullet that killed him to that ballistics experts could compare the bullet with a weapon found near him.

### FARMERS ARE URGED TO LOOK AHEAD ON MACHINERY NEEDS

Coleman County farmers and ranchers have the land, the equipment, the livestock and feed, and the "know-how" for doing their part in meeting the National Defense food needs, said S. P. Horne, vice-president of the Coleman Production Credit Association, Tuesday.

"Members of our cooperative credit association are working with the Defense Board to help fulfill our country and production goals and at the same time conserve for the individual and national welfare," he said.

"Because of the steel requirements of the armament program," he said, "there will be less farm machinery available. This fact and the desire of farmers to step up production without spending too much new money for equipment makes it important that we fix up all the old machinery we can. Many operators are checking up on their needs for the next several years and getting in their orders for repair parts as soon as possible."

Mr. Horne said that the Coleman Production Credit Association is advancing funds for buying and repairing farm machinery essential to sound production needs.

### U. S. WON'T BACK DOWN SAYS CONNALLY

The chairman of the Senate's Foreign Relations Committee bluntly asserted Tuesday that if Japan wants war "she will find out we have a navy in the Pacific that can shoot and shoot straight."

### Heart o' Texas News Briefs

Beginning Monday of this week, it will be a violation of the law to offer for sale in the city of Brownwood meats that have not been inspected and approved as fit for human consumption, which constitutes the city's new meat ordinance.

Candlelight capping exercises for 12 nurses at Brady Hospital, were held Saturday night at 8 o'clock in the Brady High School auditorium. Dr. John A. MacMillan, minister of the First Presbyterian Church, was the main speaker.

Brady's Christmas parade will be staged December 12 by an Abilene fireworks and decoration company under the direction of the Brady C. of C.

The amount of peanuts stored in warehouses at May of the Farmers Coop. Warehouse association this year was less than half the amount stored last year, according to recent figures. Over \$40,000 worth of peanuts were stored at May this year.

### Coleman Co. News Briefs

December 21 has been set as the wedding date of Miss Roberta Ricketts of Dallas and Coleman and E. P. Shelton, principal of Coleman High School. Miss Ricketts has been connected with the Coleman County Farm Security Administration office for two years.

Home Demonstration Club women of Coleman County will play an important part in the two-day poultry show to be held Dec. 5 and 6 in Santa Anna. They will show how to kill and clean a turkey, how to cook and carve a turkey, and will give a demonstration on the value of eggs. This part of the program will begin at 2 p. m. Saturday, Dec. 6.

Construction of a gymnasium building to house four handball courts was started at Coleman Flying School last week. This building, in addition to the present recreation hall, will provide quarters for indoor sports during leisure hours. At the same time an outside area is being hard-surfaced for three tennis courts and basketball court.

All of the Farm Security Administration borrowers in Coleman County held a meeting at City Park, Coleman Wednesday of this week. The meeting included a basket dinner. Over 100 families attended.

Total of 18,562 bales of cotton had been ginned in Coleman County up until November 14 of this year, according to Ernest Weaver, cotton statistician for the county. That figure compares with the 17,363 bales of cotton that had been ginned in the county up to the same date a year ago.

One hundred new cadets making up the third increment for Coleman Flying School will arrive by Dec. 18 and will start classes on December 20. This will bring up the total cadets at the flying school to about 150. As this third class arrives the first class that started training seven weeks ago will go to basic training school either at Brady, San Angelo or San Antonio.

C. M. Ewing, 52, of Coleman, who had been working the Bobo mines five miles of George town, lost his life Sunday, by the accidental discharge of his revolver, the bullet entering his chest, penetrating his left lung and lodging in the spine. The body was discovered by his brother, Floyd, also of Coleman, after a search of two days. Legend has it that Ewing's life is the 72nd to be lost while searching for gold reportedly buried in the area by Sam Bass, Jesse James and other notorious early day bandits.

Editorial

IT IS TIME WE STOPPED mincing words in this labor crisis. Those who strike against defense must be called what they are—saboteurs. This is a war of production. It is the performance of industry which will finally decide it. Hitler is fast organizing the entire continent of Europe into a great slave empire to feed the Nazi military machine. The democracies must outstrip him to survive. Here in our own country we have greater resources than any other power. We have the coal, the oil, and the other basic materials in abundance. We have the greatest electric power and transportation systems on earth. We have the great factories which can produce the instruments of war and peace alike in an ever-increasing stream. We have a type of industrial management which is not equaled for initiative, resourcefulness, daring, efficiency. But all of this will be worthless if labor is determined to sabotage production. Labor has no just grievance which cannot be cured by arbitration. In no nation on earth has so elaborate a governmental machine been established to protect the worker against exploitation. In no nation on earth does labor get so large a share of the fruits of industry. Yet labor strikes—at a time when the very system which has given it so much is in mortal danger! Look at the record of the big labor unions. All you have to do is to glance over a newspaper. Strikes are continually threatened or called in basic industries. The President

of the United States and other high government officials are flagrantly, callously defied. The findings of unprejudiced mediation boards have been refused and ignored. The drive for a labor dictatorship, with a handful of labor leaders playing the role of dictators, goes on in the face of a critical national emergency. Industry, on the other hand, has accepted every decision made by a mediation or arbitration Board. Most of these decisions have placed heavy financial burdens upon industries—burdens which, in these times of fast-rising taxes and all other costs, are extremely serious. But industry has pledged itself to do everything in its power for defense, and industry is carrying out that pledge. How much longer will labor blindly follow ruthless, self-seeking leaders who think nothing of endangering the very existence of their country? The man on the street is fed up with attempts to push our country around not only by foreign nations, but now by men at home who refuse arbitration and thereby give the greatest possible aid to our enemies by blocking our own defense.

NEEDLESS WASTE

There is enough scrapiron in the form of old automobiles, farm implements, cast-off cook stoves and other addments of wasteful and extravagant people scattered around this country to fight and win half a dozen wars.

Partly in consequence of this prodigal throw-away habit of the American people, the country is facing an ever-tightening restriction on the use of metals. It has taken strict priority regulations to divert sufficient quantities from peace time uses to the needs of the nation's war economy.

Five states, we are told, have already taken steps to stop the waste of iron in annually-issued automobile license plates. Only new cars will get new tags, all the old ones will carry the old tags, with various devices attached to indicate that the license fee has been paid for the current year. That is the way it used to be in Texas, if you can remember back that far. You kept the same number

plates year after year and were given a smaller metal plate to show that the annual fee had been paid. The state could save many dollars a year, even though convic labor makes its plates by going to the old system. A small metal disk clipped to the number plate would be all the annual tag necessary.

California expects to save over \$100,000 this year by fastening cover strips over the old plates. That means that much metal can be diverted to other purposes. Not a great deal, measured by the metal needs of a government in the throes of national defense, but it might be enough to build a destroyer or two.

We Americans throw away enough food stuffs and usable articles every year to maintain the average European. Before these squally times are over we may have to revise our habits, which would be all to the good.

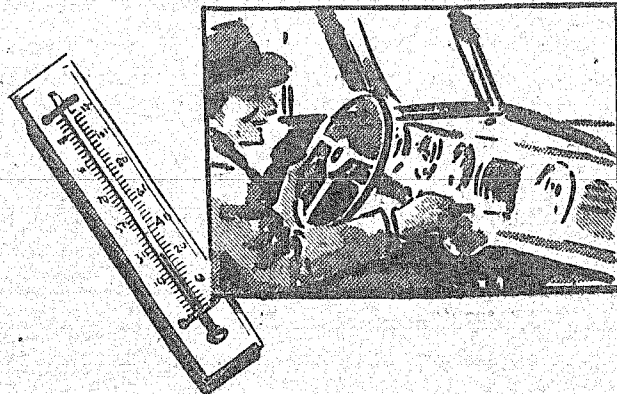

### THIS WEEK IN DEFENSE

Information Released by the Government and Reviewed by the National Defense Advisory Committee of the National Editorial Association.

#### The Week in Defense—

The White House announced a U. S. Army contingent has been sent to Dutch Guiana in South America to cooperate with Netherlands forces in protecting mines there which furnish more than 60 percent of the bauxite supply to the U. S. aluminum industry. The move had the approval of Brazil, whose forces will patrol the Guiana-Brazilian border.

#### Foreign Relations

Following conferences with envoys of Britain, China, Australia and the Netherlands and then representatives of Japan, the State Department announced it had presented Japan with a plan dealing with the Far Eastern situation, based on U. S. policy previously announced.

#### Army Progress

War Secretary Stimson told his press conference the Army "has shown wonderful progress" in the current maneuvers in the Carolinas. He said reports from the British in Egypt and Libya have testified to the excellent performance of American equipment being used there.

#### The Navy

Navy Secretary Knox told his press conference there has been a 15 percent drop in Navy enlistments since the torpedoing of Navy ships in the North Atlantic. The Navy needs 13,000 volunteers a month now and beginning next July will need 15,000 a month.

#### Prices

Labor Secretary Perkins reported the cost of goods purchased by wage earners and lower-salaried workers in large cities increased 1.2 percent from mid-September to mid-October. She said a survey of 18 staple foods in 19 cities showed food prices also rose moderately during the first half of November.

Price Administrator Henderson announced prices of wooden household furniture were no longer going up. Manufacturers of more than 50 percent of all writing paper, book and printing paper, except newsprint, have indicated they will not raise prices further.

#### Priorities

OPM ordered a 10 percent cut in production by large manufacturers of vacuum cleaners for household use; a two-thirds cut in production of lead and tin foil for decorative purposes and for tobacco, chewing gum, beverages, confections, films, and similar articles.

#### Priority Unemployment

Army and Navy contracts totaling \$31,577,090 have been awarded in areas where OPM found unemployment caused by shortage of materials for non-

defense work. He said ten areas, including 75 plants and one entire industry, have been certified as eligible for the special awards.

Lend-lease aid has steadily increased from \$1,000,000 in March to a present total of more than one billion dollars. Production of dry silk must be increased 40 to 50 percent to meet the total of 200,000,000 pounds required for shipment to Britain. Secretary of State Hull announced a lend-lease agreement with Iceland.

#### Defense Expenditures and Taxes

By the middle of next year defense expenditures will probably be running at an annual rate of somewhat more than 15 billion dollars above the middle of the current year. Additional taxation must be imposed and further restraints (to consumer spending) must be imposed. Further taxation will first tap the corporate excess profits and the middle and upper individual income brackets.

#### Labor Disputes

UMW President John L. Lewis agreed to submit the captive mine dispute to the arbitration of a board composed of himself, Benjamin Fairless, President of the U. S. Steel Corporation and Dr. John R. Steelman, who resigned his position as Director of the U. S. Conciliation Service to represent the public on the board. All the mines resumed operations and the board began meetings in New York.

#### TEXAS SHIPS MANY EGGS

Believing that the rest of the nation needed a chance at some of their good eggs, Texans shipped six times as many carloads of eggs out of the state in October as they did in October, 1940, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Shipments increased from 120 carloads last October to 720 carloads in October, 1941. This includes in both cases, shell, frozen and dried eggs, reduced to shell equivalents.

Dressed poultry shipments maintained their normal October pace, the Bureau reported.

Five carloads of chickens and four of turkeys were shipped from Texas points during October, as compared with nine cars of chickens shipped in October, 1940. There were no car lots of turkeys shipped last October.

### DOMESTIC COTTON CONSUMPTION NOW AT PEAK

Although domestic cotton consumption is at an all-time high, the tremendous carry-over makes it more and more evident that foreign markets are essential to stabilize the cotton industry of the South, Dr. A. B. Cox, director of the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research, declares.

Consumption of cotton in this country will reach 10,800,000 bales, a record by 1,300,000 bales, Dr. Cox predicts on the basis of present rate of use. Current estimates on exports are that 1,200,000 bales will be sent out of this country under provisions export subsidy provided by the SCA. This will mean that the carry-over next August will be reduced by 1,000,000 bales to 11,100,000, Dr. Cox reports.

This year's crop is exceptionally low-grade, the economist declares, ginnings through October showing only 10.6 percent of the crop trier middling, compared with 16.6 last year. Staple length averages longer than average, although the staple 1-1/16 inch and longer show a decline.

American prices are relatively far above foreign growths of cotton in world markets. Brazilian, usually 97 per cent of American price, is a little over 40 per cent of it now.

Concluding his report, published in the Bureau's Monthly Review, Dr. Cox writes:

"The well-being of the South demands foreign markets for at least three to five million bales of cotton annually, at least, until more profitable enterprises are available to take its place. It is none too soon for the nation to lay plans to re-gain these markets and the South must take the lead in showing how it can be done constructively."

#### What'll They Think Up Next?

The U. S. Forest Service has developed a machine that will plant around 8,000 trees or shrubs a day. It will be used in future shelterbelt plantings of the Prairie States Forestry Project.

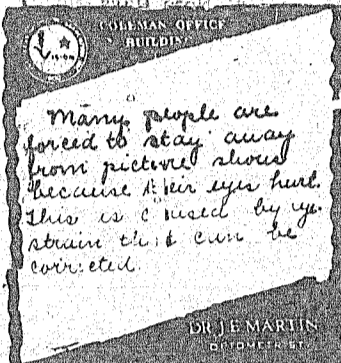
M. R. Bentley, agricultural engineer of the Texas A. and M. Extension Service, is representing Texas at a farm machinery and equipment repair conference in Chicago December 4-5. "Prompt repair and maintain-

ance of farm machinery and machinery and equipment has always been a good farming practice," Bentley pointed out, "but this time it looks as if farmers will have to keep their equipment in working order or do without."

Defense requirements have reduced the materials for new farm machinery to about two-thirds of that used in 1941. The shortage will extend to such farm items as bolts, nails, pipes wire and bar and sheet steel. Every effort will be made to keep up the supply of repair parts.

The U. S. Department of Agriculture and the state extension services have launched a farm machinery repair program to help farmers meet the double challenge of an equipment shortage on one hand and increased agricultural production under the Food for Freedom campaign on the other.

SEED TREATMENT FOR WEEVIL CONTROL ON FARMS

The first and most important factor in successful control of weevils in stored seed is a bin, or fumigation chamber, built so tightly that the gas will not flow away. Suitable temperature and a sufficient quantity of fumigant complete the preparation for the job.

According to Cameron Siddall entomologist of the A. and M. College Extension Service, double walls, floors with building paper between, one wall consisting of tightly matched lumber, makes an ideal fumigating bin. Grain piled on the floor or on the ground may be fumigated with reasonable success by covering with a tarpaulin and throwing dirt on the edges.

Barrels and boxes can be used for small amounts.

The temperature should be 75 degrees or higher. Carbon disulphide, otherwise known as high life, is the best fumigant for farm use. But Siddall cautions that all lights and fires should be kept away from the liquid and its fumes as it is inflammable and explosive. Four to 20 pounds of the liquid per thousand cubic feet of bin space should be used, the quantity varying with the tightness of the container and temperature. For smaller containers these quantities can be used:

Half gallon jar, one quarter teaspoon; gallon syrup bucket one half teaspoonful; 25 pound lard can, five teaspoonfuls, and 50 gallon barrel, one ounce.

A mixture of three parts of volume of ethylene dichloride with one part carbon tetrachloride is free from fire hazard under ordinary conditions. It can be used as a substitute for

carbon disulphide under circumstances where the latter cannot be used.

The seed should be put in first and for larger containers several gunny sacks placed on top, the carbon disulphide poured over them and the lid fastened. For smaller containers the liquid can be poured directly over the top of the seed. It also may be placed in shallow pans atop the seed, as the gas being heavier than air it settles downward. Seeds for planting should be kept in the tight, closer container 24 hours, if for food, 48 hours. Then ventilated thoroughly. Weevils may also be killed by placing seeds in a bag in cold water and heating to 140 degrees, and then drying quickly, or heating dry three or four hours at 135 degrees. Germination will not be injured.

During August egg production in the United States reached a record high of 12.25 eggs per laying hen.

#### CREATED CRISIS USED TO PROMOTE SOCIALISM

lines, for they fall in the same category as the non-existent oil shortage.

Promoters of socialized power for the past decade, have used different subterfuges to promote political control of the electric industry including flood and irrigation projects inasmuch as they had popular support and could be used to "cover up" the real objective.

Now it looks as if they're adopting a new angle. Under the claims of "power shortages" none of which has ever put in its scheduled appearance, they are trying to divert defense funds for the purpose of duplicating an electric system already serving the country adequately and prepared to expand as the need arises.

What is the truth of the matter. Not one really serious power shortage has occurred except perhaps, in the TVA area where drought played havoc with the water-power theories of the socialist-politicians and after they had taken over the private companies. Even in the defense "boom towns" where industrial development for military purposes has taken place at an incredible speed, power is being quietly and efficiently provided.

More than 90 per cent of that power comes from private utilities.

In short, while a few politicians cry "shortage" to promote government ownership of the industry, the private utilities are going ahead and doing the work. While the utilities are subjected to every known form of political vilification, they are spending the money to build for tomorrow without expense to taxpayers—probably the only defense industry to do so.

The purpose behind these periodic denunciations of private industry is obvious—to destroy the faith of the people in the private enterprise system, and to mislead the people to the point where they will accept widespread socialization of industry, according to the News Review.

"The politicians who denounce industry loudest and oftenest," it is stated, "are the politicians who are most lustful for more power, more authority, more pork barrels. They are attempting to use this emergency to destroy from within, the American system which the arms program is designed to defend, to protect, and to perpetuate."

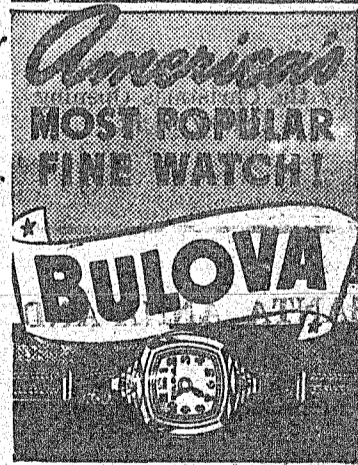

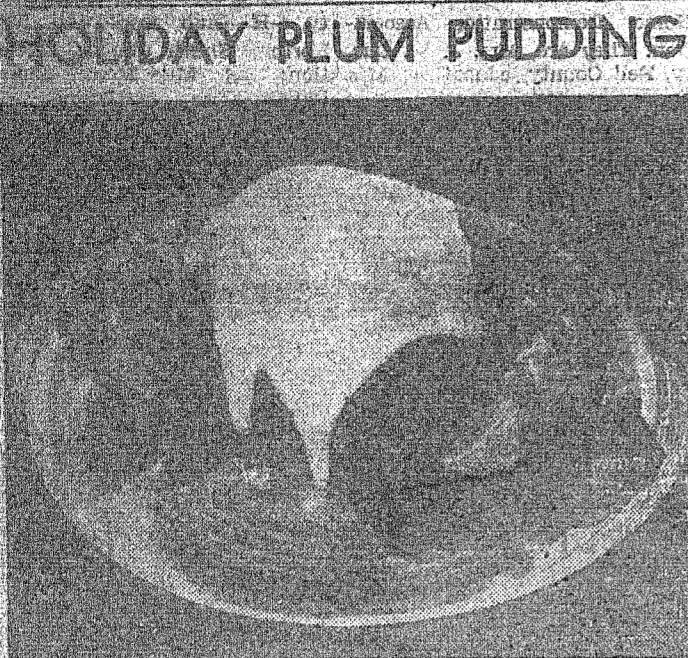

1 1/2 cups currants  
1/2 cup chopped candied orange peel  
1/2 cup chopped candied citron  
1/2 cup chopped candied lemon peel  
1 lemon  
6 lumps sugar  
1/2 cup pineapple juice  
1 1/2 cups sifted flour  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon salt  
1 1/2 cups dry bread crumbs  
1 cup brown sugar  
1/2 pound chopped suet  
4 eggs  
1/2 cup grape juice

Mix together the almonds, raisins, currants, orange peel, citron and lemon peel. Saturate sugar lumps with oil from lemon by crushing the lumps with the lemon. Dissolve in pineapple juice. Sift flour with spices and salt. Mix with fruit and add bread crumbs and brown sugar. Beat eggs until light; add grape juice and pineapple juice in which sugar has dissolved. Add to dry ingredients. Mix thoroughly. Moisten center of a large linen napkin, grease lightly and rub with flour. Mold pudding into a ball and tie lightly into the greased napkin. Immerse in rapidly boiling water, suspending the pudding so it does not rest on the bottom of the kettle. Keep water boiling, adding boiling water as it becomes necessary. Boil 5 hours. Serve with Hard Sauce.

1/2 cup butter  
1 1/2 cups confectioners' sugar  
1 teaspoon flavoring extract  
Cream butter until light and fluffy. Add sugar and beat well together. Add flavoring.
