



THUMBNAIL HISTORY OF U. C. ARMY DIVISIONS

FIRST DIVISION

Organized from Regular Army troops in June. 1917; arrived in France same month under command of Maj. Gen. W. L. Sibert. October 23, 1917, Battery C. 6th Field Artillery east of Bathlemont fired first American shot in World War. Took first German prisoner captured by Americans, and suffered first combatant losses November 3, 1917. During operations the Division took 6.661 prisoners. Its casualties totaled 26.332. Served of Occupation near Coblenz and returned to U.S. late in August, 1919. Its insignia is red figure on clive drab.

SECOND DIVISION



THIRD DIVISION

Organized from Regular Army troops in November, 1917, at Camp Greene, N. C., commanded by Maj. Gen. Joseph T. Dickman. Went to France in April. 1918, and served its entire time—86 days—in active battle areas. Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel and Meuse-Argonne. It advanced 41 kilometers against enemy resistance and captured 2,240 prisoners and great quantities of artillery and machine guns. Its insignia is three white stripes disgonally resistance.

SELECT NEXT YEAR'S BREEDING TURKEYS

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 23 Texas turkey growers should select breeders for next year before all of their better birds have been sold.

"It is only by selecting breed ers now," says Geo. P. McCarthy poultryman for the A. and M. College Extension Service, "that we can maintain the improvement which has been so pronounced during the past five or six years.' Turkey hens which are show-

ing heavy fleshing, especially across the breast and thighs, and have developed fat and feathered out well, including pin feathers, should be kept back as breeders, McCarthy explains. Producers should also be giving serious thought to buying toms o head up next year's breeding

flocks. There is an excellent supply of good quality toms in Texas, especially in the broadbreast bronze strain, which may be bought from R. O. P. breeders. Growers buying hens or toms communiques should see that they are pullorum-tested before putting them into breeding flocks.

Under R. O. P. breeding practice all hens are trap nested, and a complete record is kpt on eggs produced, their fertility and hatchability. Only toms from hens which laid at least 50 eggs least 72 per cent of all eggs set Extension Service has kept rec-vice as given elsewhere. Nolan ords of all individual turkeys Eargh. 1c.
