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U. S. ARMY RECRUITING STATION

Many young men of eighteen and nineteen have been asking Set. Hess, local Army recruiter, how they may become an Officer in the Army.

"The opportunities have never been greater," he said. "If young men of eighteen and nineteen enlist in the Army today, they can get a head start. They may be promoted to sergeant or lieutenant before they are twenty-one."

"Many young men ask me what an Officer Candidate School is. They want to know what the requirements are, what you learn, how hard it is, and how long it takes until you graduate."

"The opportunity to go to Officer Candidate School, I tell them, is open to every man in the Army who has had thirteen weeks of basic training. That means that a young man of eighteen who has the ability and leadership can go to school and become a second lieutenant within a year. That's not wishful thinking. It has been done and it is being done."

Set. Hess added: "The choice of Officers Candidates School is up to the individual. There are many schools to pick from and much to learn from them. It's only natural that a man pick the branch in which he is most qualified."

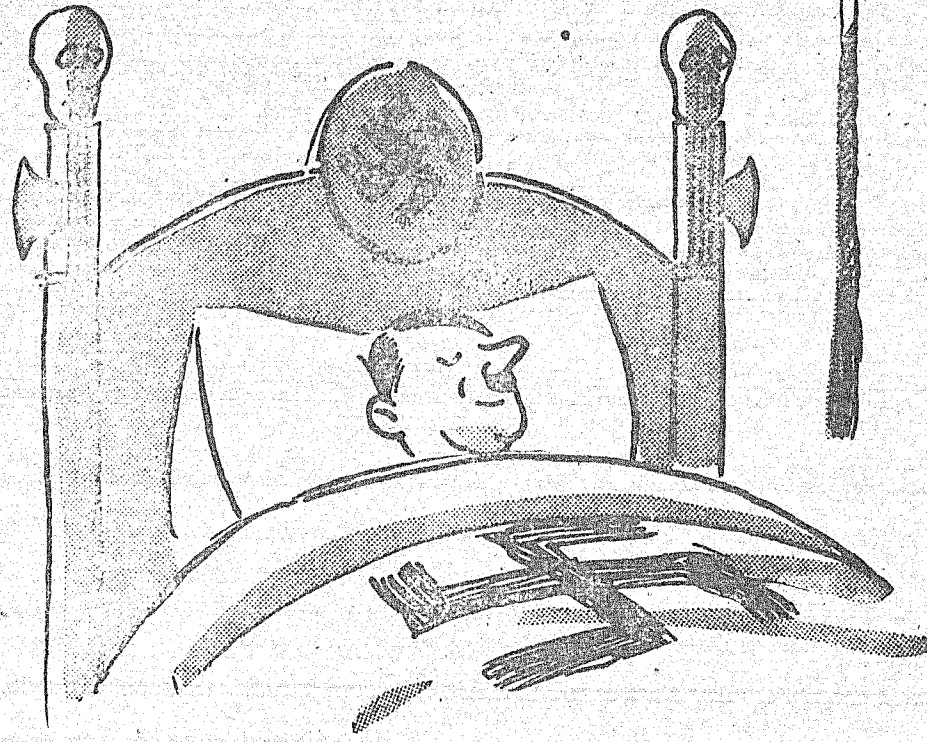
"Opportunities in the Army," he said, "are not confined to Officers Candidate School. A man of eighteen or nineteen has the right of selecting his branch of service. It means that in the Army he may either continue his civilian interests, and skills, or choose to develop new skills."

BE CAREFUL ABOUT FIRES

AUSTIN, Dec. 2. Marvin Hall, State Fire Insurance Commissioner, says winter time brings a seasonal increase in fire hazards. The added dangers of destructive fire creates a need for closer inspections at home.

"A substantial percentage of our fires at home during cold weather," he explained, "result from a few common causes. The most of these we could prevent by being more careful. Our neglect in taking proper precautions during winter has caused unnecessary fire losses."

A leading cause of winter time fire fatalities is the use of kerosene or gasoline to kindle or "quicken" a fire. Gasoline is a

dangerous explosive—too dangerous to keep in the house under any condition. Also, the improper use of kerosene can cause serious fire losses.

A few simple practices in the use of portable oil heating appliances will prevent many home fires. Wicks in such heaters should be kept clean and adjusted to the proper level. Sufficient ventilation is needed to assure proper combustion. Heaters should be kept a safe distance from combustible furnishings and placed where they will not be easily overturned.

Personal carelessness in cold weather frequently results in death. Clothing ignited when a person stands too near an open flame heater or fireplace is one of the common causes of fire fatalities during winter months.

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WAR CONDITIONS INCREASE TUBERCULOSIS

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 2 Emphasizing the importance of cooperating with the national tuberculosis control program, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer today declared that war conditions breed the adverse conditions conducive to an increase in the prevalence of this disease.

The history of tuberculosis throughout the world shows clearly that war brings an increase of this disease in its wake," Dr. Cox declared. "Exposure, malnutrition, fatigue, and physical hardships make it easy for tuberculosis to strike."

While war conditions in the United States do not at present approach those in Europe, Dr. Cox said that serious thought should be given to the fact that tuberculosis deaths in England and Wales increased 12 per cent between 1939 and 1941.

Dr. Cox outlined the symptoms of tuberculosis as ordinarily

being fatigue, poor appetite, digestive disturbances, loss of weight, afternoon or night fever, lingering cough, pleurisy, hemoptysis, night sweats, and anemia. If any one of these symptoms persist, Dr. Cox warned that a physician should be consulted immediately and an examination given to determine whether or not tuberculosis is present. If this disease is diagnosed in its earliest stage, Dr. Cox said that a great percentage of cases can be cured.
