





Mr Griffin pointed out that poultry raiser himself can apply "For instance," he suggests, "the entire flock should be sprayed with a solution of a reliable antiseptic inhalant diluted according to directions, so the birds will inhale the medicated vapers. If a condition of roup has developed, the affected portions may be washed and irrigated with this antiseptic inhalant. Digestive disturbances also accompany colds many times, and to overcome this condition the poultry raiser may use a reliable point to remember in treating colds, since both need attention to get the birds back into good physicial condition so they can lay regularly and earn a profit for you," Mr Griffin said.
