

The all-volunteer army is now a reality. As a consequence, riots and unrest associated with conscription have withered. Nevertheless, the volunteer army is meeting heavy criticism.

The main objection is that attracting young men to the military service costs more than forcing them to it and that the Army is not getting all the recruits that it would like to have.

The points are unquestionably valid, but we would offer a few additional words to set them in perspective. In our opinion, this perspective shows—as long as we are stuck with paying taxes to buy protection—the volunteer military service is the least unfair.

At the outset, no one of understanding supposed that the volunteer idea would work automatically. We have seen very few ideas that do. The most common experience is that ideas have to be worked; they usually do not fulfill themselves. As the Army becomes accustomed to the plan, as it develops the "customers attitude" toward entistees—according them the proper respect, but tithout pampering-you can expect to see an improvement in the quality and numbers of recruits.

As to the added expense, a soldier is entitled to what he is worth; that is the defense service that he renders by training by operational duties, or just by standing by has a marketable value. He is like a policeman on a corner; he may be doing nothing at that moment, but his very presence is a guarantee to the security of those in that vicinity.

The difference between a policeman and a soldier is that one guards the domestic tranquility and the other provides for the common defense against foreign attack.

If the time comes to pass that the American people do not value their property families, and lives, then a policeman earns nothing because he is not protecting anything considered valuable. However, so long as property, families and lives are deemed precious the policeman earns his keep-every cent of it. And the same is true of a soldier.

It is not less inequitable to draft a soldier in order to pay him less than it would be to draft a policeman for the sake of obtaining cheap law-enforcement. Generally speaking, you get what you pay for anyway.

A claim is being made of course that the military service exaggerates its financial needs, that it is wasteful. That was as true of the draft Army as it is of the volunteer Army. If government revenue systems were also placed on a volunteer basis, there might come to be some cure for excessive military. demands. We do not see any practical solution at the moment exceet for persistent vigilance.

When you take all things together, indirect costs along with direct, when you consider troubles avoided (such as public disturbances arising from the draft), the extra expense of the volunteer army is less than what appears on the ledger sheets. No doubt about it though, if people don't want foreign enemies walking on their flower beds, they will have to foot the bill to keep them away. With a voluntary army the soldier's pay is determined by the manpower marketplace. Anything less is unjust.



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
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Cynthia Rolfe Enrolls at ASU


All courses are fully accredited and are offered at lowcost state-supported tuition and fee rates. One course costs \$35.25 and two courses, or six hours, totals \$65.50.

Emergency

Farmers and ranchers in Coleman County who sustained production losses as result of the drought during the period 10-12-73 through 4-29-74 may be eligible. to receive an emergency loan from the Farmers Home Administration.

Those who have not received an emergency toan to assist them in recovering from their loss may apply for such a loan at the Farmers Home Administration county office at 112 North Concho Street Coleman, before close of business March 31, 1975.

These loan applications will be taken under the terms of a new law enacted January 2, 1974. Individual examination will be made of each application to determine date of the disaster occurrence and emergency loan benefits for which the applicant is eligible.

Loans based on qualifying production losses may include funds to reimburse applicants for production expenses, which went into damaged or destroyed crop and livestock enterprises, but not to produce new crops during 1975. Payment terms depend on the purposes for which the loan is used and the applicant's payment ability No loan may exceed the actual loss sustained. The interestrate for these loans is 5 per cent and there will be no principal cancellation.

Local per owners are urged to have their animals vaccinated for rables, and livestock owners would watch their stock carefully for any symtoms of the disease





THE WEST LIVES ON Loans Available IN ROLLING PLAINS

The West lives on in the rolling plains of Texas, maintaining a broad brimmed profile in the land of the Four C's: Coronado, Comanches. Cavalrymen and Cowboys.

The first three are gone, but not the Cowboys, in a region that runs from below Abilene to the Oktahoma border in the Panhandle.

Western bats and boots are verveveryday wear, particularly in the smaller town. Not far from ain highways are the old. established ranches, the Spur. Pitchfork and Matador, below the Caprock in the Dickens area. further east Near Vernon, the W. T. Waggoner spread, and near Dalhart, what remains of the XIT, once the worlds largest.

Rodeoschound. Some are stopoffs on the professional cowboy circuit, others such as the Texas Cowboy Reunionat Stamford, are for amateurs.

Texans who decide to vacation on the plains will find that there is one scenid point which surpasses all others: the 122mile Palo Duro Canyon, 22 miles southeast of Amarillo.

The 1,000 foot deep canyon is the scene each summer of the Panhandle heritage drama 'Texas', in an outdoor amphitheater."

Palo Duro is recommended by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in its new spring publicantion, "Wonderful West Texas Fun and Adventure Map". said J. Fike Godfrey of Abilene. WTCC executive vice president

"An in-Texas vacation, at today's lower speed limits, offers a fine opportunity to enjoy the majestic expanse of the Plains

and Panhandle," said Godfrey.

Below Palo Duro Canyon, State Highway 207 between Claude and Silverton, also passes across Tale Canyon. The Croton Breaks south of Dickens is a colorful region of canyons, butter and creeks., while the new Copper Breaks State Park north of Crowell was dedicated in April.

Abilene, the southernmost of the three largest Plains cities. offers an excellent zoo whose reputation is growing, and Old Abilene Town, a western amustment park on Interstate 20.

Southwest of Abilene, near Buffalo Gap, is Abitene State Park, shaded by oaks and mesquites. It is one of seven state parks on the Plains; Copper Breaks, near Crowell: Lake Arrowhead, Wichita Falls; Lake Brownwood, north of Brownwood. Mackenzie at Lubbock; Palo Duro Canyon; and Fort Griffin, north of Albany.

Lake Brownwood and Hubbard Creek Reservoir near Brekenridge give fishermen and water sport fans plenty of elbow room, as do lakes near Abilene and Coleman and Lake Kemp at Seymour.

In the Panhandle, Lake Meredith, west of Borger, reigns over the fishin' holes as Palo Duro dominates the scenery. Spreading among the cliffs of the Canadian River Valley, it covers 21 600 acres and also is accessible from Amarilla, Stignett, Sanford, Fritch, Dumas and Pampa

The annual rodeo is one of the main events in the county each year, and many local people will attend or take part.


