## Humble Oil Co. Opens New Research Bldg. At Houston Saturday

Houston — America's largest domestic oil producer will formally open a new research center here Saturday to provide better facilities for continuing research into problems of finding and producing oil.

This latest addition to Texas' scientific resources is Humble Oil & Refining Company's Houston Research Center, containing more than 300 laboratories, shops and offices in two buildings on a 15-acre tract in the southwest section of the city.

Humble President Hines H. Baker will formally dedicate the Center at public ceremonies on Saturday morning, Sept. 11, following an open house for employees Friday night. Tours of the center will give the public a chance to see the two "electronic brains," complex laboratory instruments, and other equipment the scientists use in their research work.

The new center will provide some 330 scientists, technicians, and assistants who formerly worked in separate locations with the newest scientific equipment in a single center.

Research in the Houston Center is divided into two phases: exploration research, which seeks to advance the search for new oil reserves to meet our present and future needs; and production research, concerned with the problems of drilling for oil, of developing fields so that the greatest amount of oil will be recovered. Product and refining research is carried on at the company's Baytown Research Center, opened in 1951 to consolidate research activities at Baytown Refinery.

Humble now has almost 600 employees devoting full time to a broad research program which costs between \$5 and \$6 million per year.

Company officials said the new Houston Research Center "is a symbol of the growing importance of research in the Humble Companies, in the oil industry, and in the daily lives of all people in the modern world."

## Inspection Dates Set For Next Auto Inspection Period

Austin — Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, said today that the Public Safety Commission has officially set the dates for the new inspection period for autos under the provision of the State's Motor Vehicle Inspection Act.

Texas motorists must secure the annual inspection of their cars between September 15th, 1954 and April 15th, 1955, according to the Commission Order.

At the same time George Busby, Chief of the DPS Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, said that the inspectors from his office have filed 106 cases against car owners who failed to have their cars checked during the current inspection period. These, he said, are in addition to those cases filed by members of the Texas Highway Patrol and by various local police departments throughout the State.

Unable to give an estimate of the actual number of violations for which arrests have been made during the 1953-'54 period, Busby said that he "believed the figure to be comparatively low" due to the fact that frequent spot checks indicate that Texans have conformed with the law "almost 100 percent."

## Mountaineers to Tangle With Junction Friday

### Post-Korean Vets Have 3 Years To Start GI Bill Training

Post-Korean veterans now have three years from the date of their discharge to start Korea GI Bill training under a new law signed by the President August 20, 1954.

Particularly benefited are the majority of veterans discharged before August 20, 1952. Under the old law, they had to start training before Friday, August 20, 1954; but, since most fall school terms begin after that date, those unable to get in training before the deadline would have lost their entitlement.

The new law, which reestablished their entitlement for another year from separation, permits those with extended deadlines to enroll for the fall term this year.

For veterans discharged after August 20, 1952, the new law allows them to start training within three years of their separation date. Under the old law, they had only two years.

But veterans separated before August 20, 1951, still will not be able to make fall terms. Neither will veterans separated shortly after that date, whose three-year deadlines end before the 1954 school year begins.

Todays new law also adds another year to the wind-up of the Korean GI Bill training program. Training now must come to an end within eight years from date of a veterans separation, or eight years from the end of the present emergency period—which ever comes first.

Another section of the law benefits some disabled veterans who have not been able to begin or complete training under Public Law 16, a special vocational training program for the disabled of World War II and Korea. These veterans get a four-year extension in their deadline for completing training.

### Outlook For Livestock Raisers

College Station — Because more cattle were slaughtered this year, the nation will enter 1955 with fewer cattle than a year ago. The larger marketings are due partly to dry weather and partly to reduced interest in expanding beef cattle herds in some regions, says John G. McHaney, extension economist.

Beef production is running at record levels. Prices for fed cattle are not likely to change much this fall while prices of grass fed cattle can be expected to make the usual seasonal declines. Feeders in areas having feed are in a more favorable position than those in drought areas where feed is short and higher in price.

Since mid-June, more hogs also are being slaughtered than a year ago. Prices for hogs are expected to trend seasonally downward and to continue considerably below the rather high prices of last fall.

Seasonal decreases in prices for lambs have been earlier and greater than usual, with more sheep and lambs slaughtered this summer than last, McHaney reports.

There now appears to be little prospect for any substantial price recovery until the fall marketing season is past, the economist adds.

### PLENTIFUL FOODS LISTED FOR SEPTEMBER

College Station — Beef is featured on September's plentiful foods list. It gets to pranking because supplies are heavy and prices are about the lowest so far this season.

Beef, however, will not be the only major food on the list for at least 15 others are listed by the USDA's Agricultural Marketing Service in the southwest.

Homemakers will find plenty of medium and small eggs; milk and other dairy products; turkeys, hens, broilers and fryers, honey and rice, peanuts and peanut butter, fresh and processed lemons and limes; salad oils and vegetable shortenings when shopping this month.

If the old adage, "Variety is the spice of life" be true, then grocery shoppers this month, by taking advantage of the "best buys", should be able to give the family a pleasing and nutritious variety of good eating.

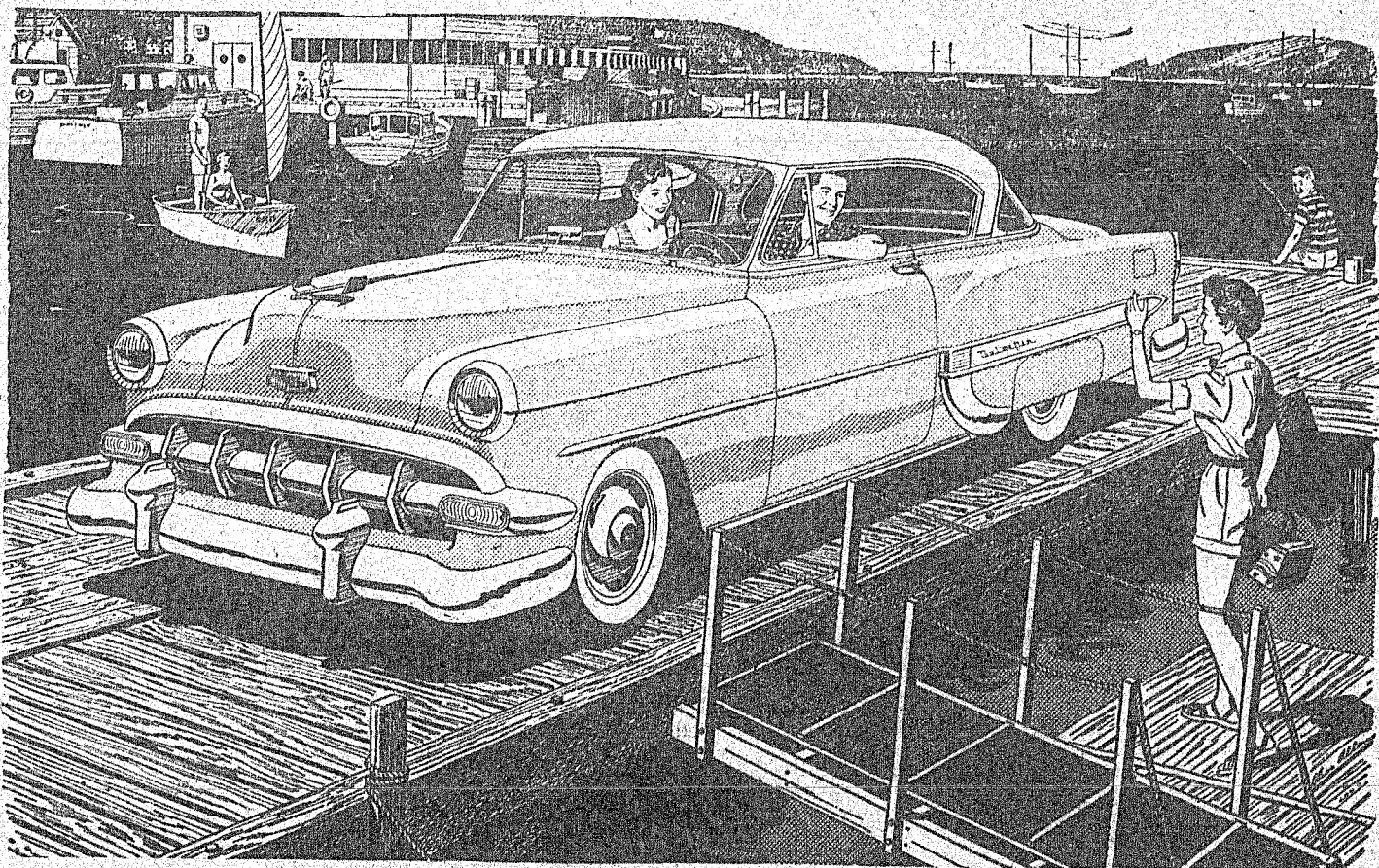

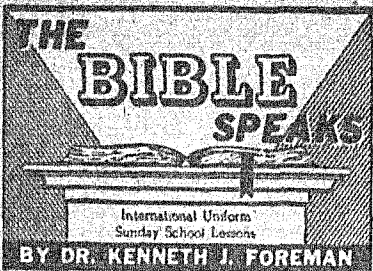

Lesson for September 12, 1954

SUPPOSE the dream of some scientists comes true, and there is built a "space platform" buzzing around the earth, some thousand miles away, like a little moon? Suppose this thing is equipped with telescopic sights and atomic weapons? Such a thing—and it is now technically possible—would give its possessors power over the whole earth such as no conqueror has ever had. The question then would be: What kind of people are running the thing? Do they really take an interest in the human race, or suppose they didn't care, and started blasting away some fine morning just for fun? E. B. White's famous story, "The Morning of the Day They Did It," imagines what would happen then.

**Learning to Belong**  
 That may not be true as prophecy, —a continent, a planet, blown out of existence because two men who do not care anything about it, or anything else, take a notion to blast it. But it is quite true as a picture of human attitudes. Neither soldier nor senator nor common citizen will do anything to help a country or people for whom he feels no special attraction, and he may very easily injure or destroy it without much conscience. In war, this is a picture of how each nation looks at the enemy; in "peace," it is a picture of the lack of social responsibility which plagues every country in the world. "Do what you like with it—it isn't mine," may possibly be all right when you are talking about your neighbor's tomato-plot or automobile. But when you are talking about your neighbor's nation, you are talking about something that is just as much yours as his. We

all begin life as little egotists, each of us the center of his little high-chair universe. By degrees we learn to say "we" about our family, our gang, maybe our town or high school or lodge. But it takes church members a long time—some of them—to say "we" about the church, and even longer for even Christian citizens to say "we" about their country. Having no special feeling for it, they don't care what happens to it, and may even take part in doing it harm, just because they have never learned to belong to it.

**Christian Citizens Needed**  
 The Apostle Paul was a citizen of a great empire, and he was proud of the fact. He believed that every Christian, whether a citizen or not, had certain duties of obedience, responsibility and support, toward the Roman Empire. If this was true in those days, when the government was non-Christian, corrupt and oppressive, when Christians had for the most part no chance whatever in sharing the responsibilities of government, how much more true it is in a democracy! With professed Christians numbering about half the total population, with the vote in our hands and our representatives no farther away than the nearest mail-box, we have even more reason and opportunity to make our presence and our ideas felt, as Christian citizens, than could have been possible in the time of Paul and Nero. Any Christian who is old enough to vote and educated enough to read and write, might well ask himself a few questions to see if he is much of a Christian.

**Quiz for Christian Citizens**

Do you know the names of your senator, your congressman? Did you vote for them? Why? Do you know whether they are Christians by profession? Do you know how they have been voting on important questions? If so, do you find that they have been taking a Christian attitude as reflected in their votes?

Have you ever taken the time and spent the money to write or wire your congressman or senator to let him know how you and your neighbors stand on important matters? Have you felt that international affairs were somehow beyond your scope, or have you realized that bad relationships between nations have always brought death to happy homes? Do you realize that our nation, and others, have developed weapons of such terrible force that to use them can destroy the face of man? Do you have any idea what your congressman and senator, your personal representatives, are thinking and doing?

will assure 100 percent destruction.

Today, most gin trash is burned to control and prevent the spread beyond quarantine barriers of the pink bollworm. However, some methods are being used and studied which may prevent this waste. Composting, sterilization, fumigation, hammer milling, roller milling and the use of special fans or two conventional fans in the pneumatic system of ginning are all possible procedures that have a degree of effectiveness.

Investigations of different types of fans and fan combinations, rollers, beaters, grinders, and heating devices are being carried out by engineers and entomologists at commercial gins in the lower Rio Grande Valley this season. Later work will be done farther north, including the Panhandle where harvesting conditions are quite different.

Gin trash disposal methods must be as simple and inexpensive as possible. But most important, they must take care of large quantities of trash without slowing down gin operation. Finally, they must kill all the pink bollworms in the material. Otherwise, what might be gained by use of this trash would be lost through the destructiveness of the insect.

Findings in these investigations are to be made available to ginners and farmers in Texas as soon as sound and practical conclusions can be achieved.

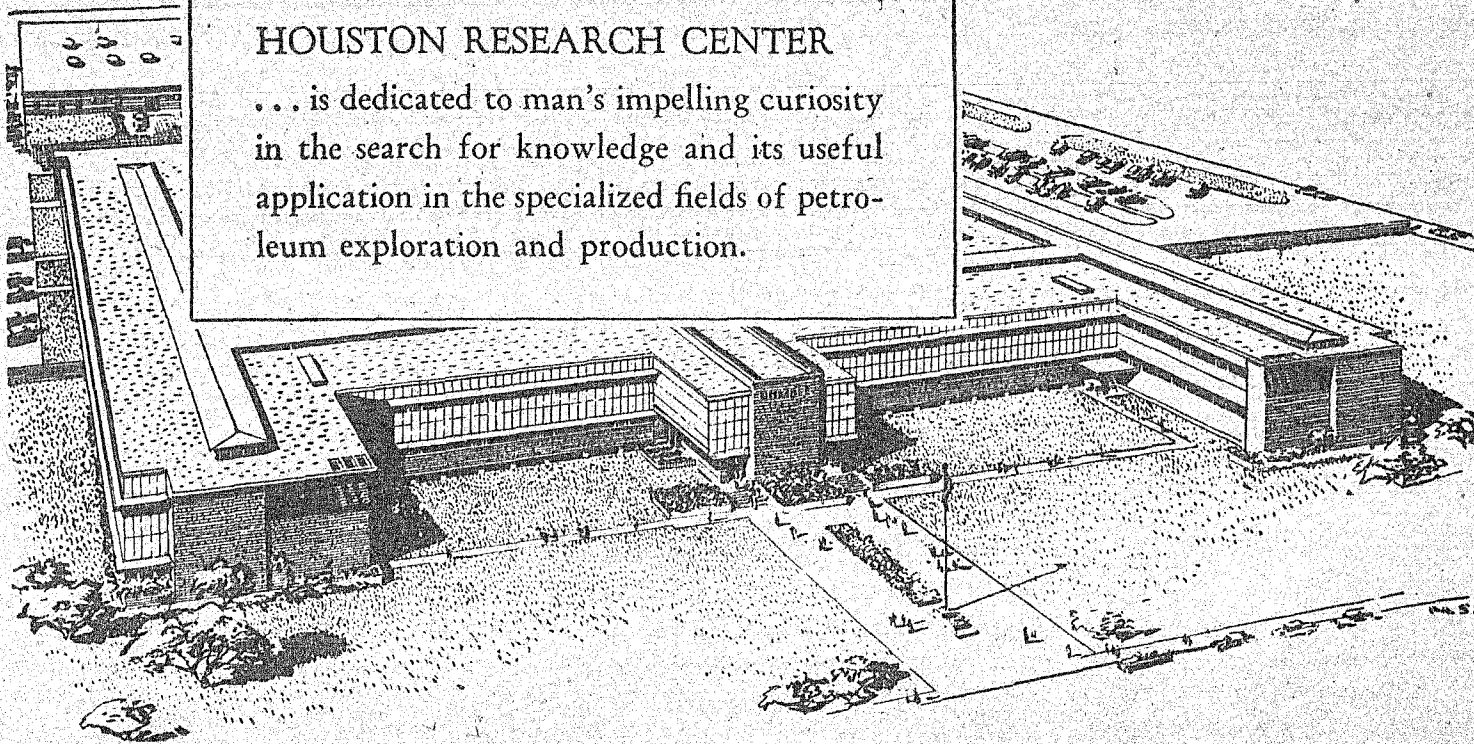

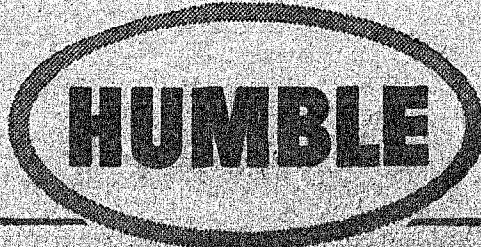

**GIN TRASH RESEARCH**  
 Texas is seeking a solution to a knotty problem — how to keep an insect from robbing farmers of a valuable component of our annual cotton crop.

Gin "trash" — the burrs or hulls of the cotton bolls — could ordinarily be very useful as a soil conditioner, fertilizer or livestock feed. Yet, this trash also harbors one of the greatest threats to our cotton industry, the pink bollworm. The problem

is how to kill the insect larva within the trash and allow the material to be returned to the farm for beneficial use.

Modern gins with elaborate drying and cleaning equipment kill a high percentage of the worms during the ginning process. Tests are now being conducted in Texas to find what process or machine is responsible for the greater part of the kill. Modifications and improvements may be made eventually which

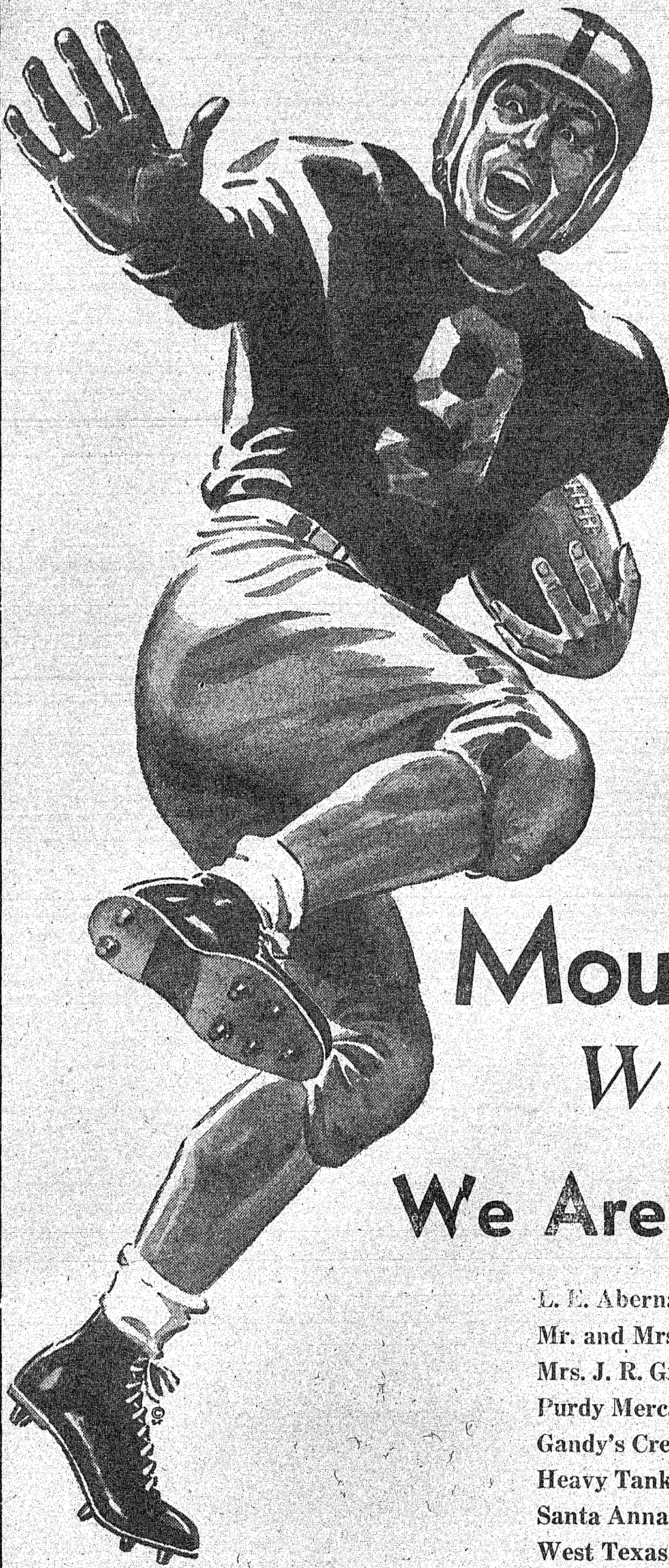
