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

Here's why, says U. S. D. A. Cattle slaughter is running ahead of last year's all time high and stocks of cheddar cheese are the largest in history.

With supplies of these two essential commodities so large, prices should be attractive enough to push consumption to the highest peaks every reached, believes John J. Slaughter of the Agricultural Marketing Service.

Stocks of many foods which were heavy a month ago have increased, and still are listed as plentiful. These include: brollers and fryers, chicken hens and turkeys, milk and other dairy products, rice, salad oils and veg-etable shortenings.

More Questions Than Answers

It is a sort of well-worn saying of preachers that the Bible has the answers to life's questions. But there is one book in the Bible that has more questions than answers: the book of Job. It is one of the greatest books in the world. and it will always appeal to men everywhere, because it puts in a powerful way the very questions that the best people ask. Job himself was one of these "best people." He is called "blameless and upright, one who feared God and turned away from evil." God even speaks of him with some pride. But Job did not have all the answers, though he had most of the questions. His best friends thought, and no doubt he himself used to think, that suffering is always a sign that God is punishing the sufferer. This idea is still a common one. But Job felt there must be something wrong with it, for he fell a victim to disasters he would not have wished on his worst enemy. He lost his fortune (which was in cattle), his workmen, and his family, all within a few days, and finally he lost his

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

The first rule is to provide a clean, sanitary poultry house. Accumulated filth, dust and cobwebs should be elminated before birds are moved in. Then scrub the house with hot water and a strong cleansing agent.

Quarters and equipment should then be disinfected with a chemical disinfectant. For best results, choose a warm day when the temperature in the house is above 70 degrees.

A clean house deserves clean litter. Put down about 3 inches of litter to make a fresh, absorbent bed for the birds' droppings. Add to the litter as the season progresses. Have the litter at least 6 inches deep before cold weather.
