Mountaineers Take 46-0 Beating From Goldthwaite; Entertain Early Friday

The Mountaineers lost a hard-fought battle to Goldthwaite Friday night 46-0, but the score certainly does not indicate the manner in which the local boys were playing. Several who saw the game commented that the Mountaineers had played their best game of the season to date, but just got the bad breaks.

The Goldthwaite Eagles scored twice in the first period on runs of 62 yards and 12 yards; once in the second period on a 39 yard pass; once in the third period on a 56 yard run; and 3 times in the fourth period on runs of 8 yards, 52 yards and 35 yards. They made four extra points.

The Eagles were jarred loose from the ball seven times during the game with the Mountaineers recovering the fumble four times. The Mountaineers lost the ball two times on fumbles. First downs were 12 for Santa Anna and 14 for the Eagles.

The Mountaineers did not make a scoring threat in the first period, but in the second they drove and passed their way to the Eagle 15-yard line only to lose the ball on downs. Late in the third period they drove to the Eagle 23-yard line and lost the ball on a fumble. On punts and generally on passes, lots of time was given the men handling the ball, showing the local boys were in there trying all the way. They were just out-classed and we think they did real well against a team such as they were facing. Coach Behrens said they were playing the best game they were capable of and that is all you can ask of a team. Of course there is lots of room for improvement and they are working on that this week.

AN EDITORIAL—Charlotte Burney For Co. Treasurer

First let us say that we appreciate the many who have expressed a favorable attitude toward Mrs. Charlotte Burney and to us for the editorial we published last week. We are indeed grateful that so many have assured us they were going to write-in Mrs. Burney's name on the ballot at the General Election.

In the article last week we stated the name had to be spelled correctly for the vote to count. However, since that time a ruling has been received from the Attorney General of Texas which states that write-in names DO NOT have to be spelled correctly, but as long as it can be determined who the voter wants to vote for it must be counted. The way we interpret this is that you can write in Mrs. Burney, Charlotte Burney or just Burney and the vote is suppose to be counted. To be sure the name should be spelled correctly, but it is not absolutely necessary. Just draw a line through the candidate's name for County Treasurer in the Democratic column and in the write-in column on the right hand side of the ballot, under County Treasurer, write in or print Mrs. Burney, Charlotte Burney or Mrs. Charlotte Burney and the vote will be counted.

Some of the opposition to Mrs. Burney has started the rumor circulating that if she were elected she would only be able to serve for a few months and then someone would have to be appointed to replace her, because of her present condition. These rumors are completely false according to a statement which appears in a display advertisement elsewhere in this issue of The Santa Anna News and signed by Dr. Henner, her physician.

We feel that political ambitions have certainly reached a low ebb when one side resorts to tactics such as to invade the privacy of a persons home life, especially the mother of four children who has just gone through the ordeal of the loss of her husband very unexpectedly and who is doing her utmost to have the privilege of carrying on in her husbands place in order to furnish support for herself and children.

To what depts will they go? We feel that the average citizen wants to see justice done in all things. Here is a case where justice has a good chance of slipping by unless the greater part of the citizens of Coleman County will write-in Mrs. Charlotte Burney for County Treasurer at the General Election on Tuesday, November 2.

Right now ask your local merchant to explain their part in the Christmas program. They will be glad to assist you.

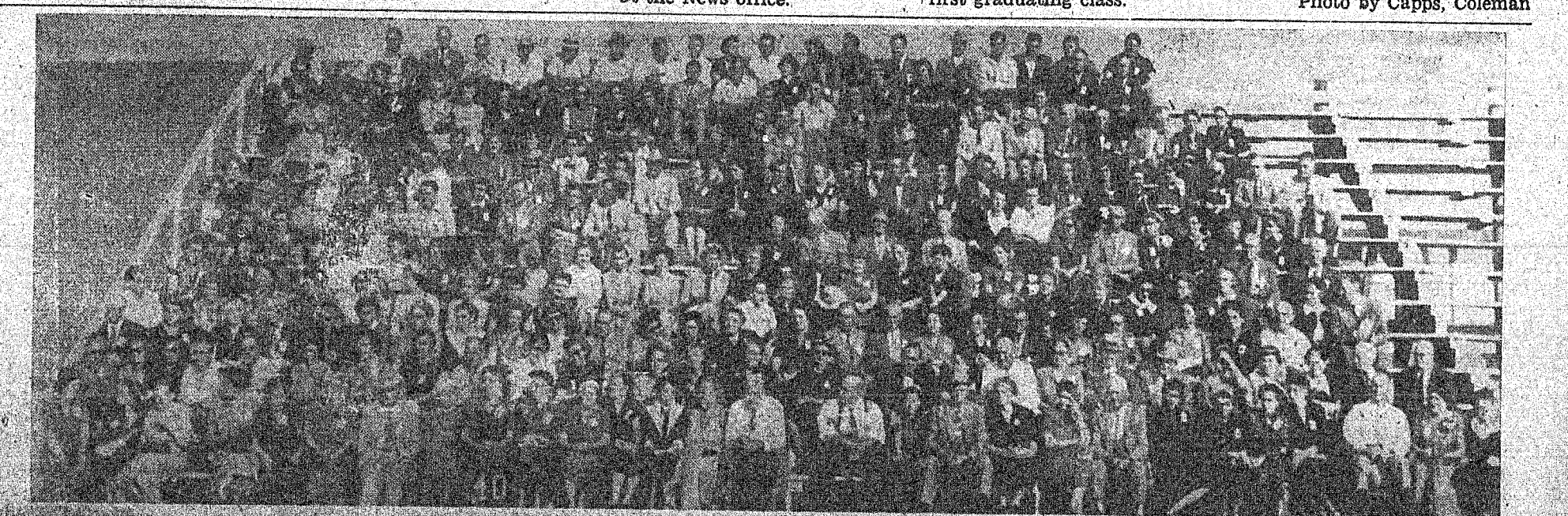
Mrs. Woodward To Be Buried Today

Dropped into Smitty's gas station last week and met his new partner who turned out to be a real talker.

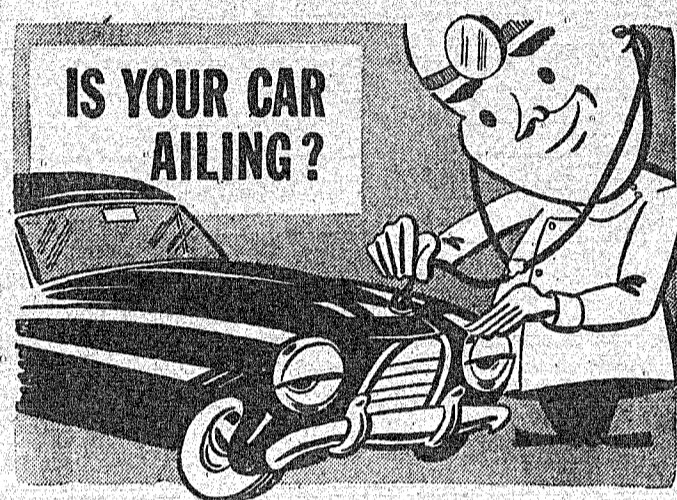

home, and the book of Proverbs has many things to say about homes without ever using the word. (The very word "home" in its full meaning is a Christian discovery.)

Homes Are Needed

The most scientific students of humanity are telling us what Christians knew all the time: that good homes are the foundation of a good community and nation. The chief probation officer of the city of Louisville, Ky., has said that in his experience he has seen delinquent children and youths from every kind of home—rich, poor, educated, illiterate, every kind you can think of, except one. He has never seen juvenile delinquents coming out of homes where the father and mother lived a life of harmony together. Psychiatrists who deal with emotional disorders, those sicknesses of the personality which can be so devastating in middle life, have found that in probing for the causes of disturbance, they always have to inquire into the kind of home in which this person grew up. For security and stability of character and personality, what is most needed are Christian homes. Further, homes are needed for training in that most difficult and "tricky" of all arts, the art of living with other people. We get a successful democracy about as fast as we get citizens who have

been learning democracy as they have lived in their homes growing up—not much faster.

What Makes a Home?

The Proverbs give many valuable hints and directions showing what is needed for successful home life. One thing, spelled out in chapters 6 and 7, is fidelity between husband and wife. Christians know that this is not the whole story. We have all seen "homes" where there was no question of infidelity involved, no ground for divorce as the church sees it, and yet where the marriage was unsuccessful and the home no home at all. For all that, fidelity lies at the base of the successful home. The wife can't cheat the husband, nor the husband the wife, without damaging all their relationships together. As the Proverbs point out, the unfaithful one hurts himself even more than he hurts his partner. Another thing needed is peace. A home that is full of quarrels is not a home but a madhouse. For some reason the Proverbs refer often to quarreling wives, seldom to quarreling husbands. Some one has said that "It takes two to make a quarrel" isn't true. One nagging person can make enough quarrels alone and unassisted, to break up any home. The man who "deserts" his wife, or the other way around, may turn out not to be a deserter but a refugee, as one of them said. A third thing that makes a home, as Prov. 31 shows, is work. Homes do not run themselves. "Goldilocks, Goldilocks, will thou be mine? Thou shalt not wash dishes nor yet feed the swine; But sit upon cushions and sew a fine seam, And feed upon strawberries, sugar and cream." So runs the nursery rhyme. But it is safe to say that Goldilocks and her husband would never make a happy home with that no-work program.

Who Makes a Home?

What the Proverbs say has been tested many thousand times, and is true: the home is made successful by father, mother and children, all of them. One good mother working against a husband who doesn't care and children who never cooperate, can maybe keep the home from the rocks but it will never be what it might have been. We hear so much about "home and mother" that we get the notion that one good mother is all a home needs for success. Many a sad mother could tell you this is not true. Then sometimes sentimental people say that "love" is all that is needed. That is false or true depending on what you mean.

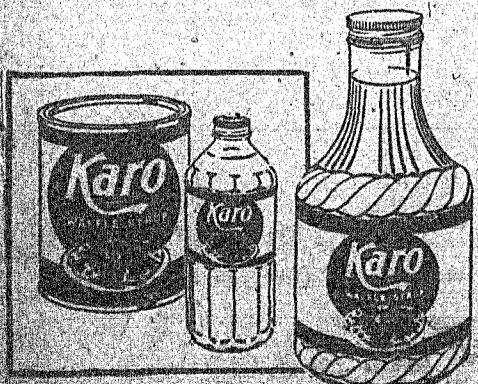

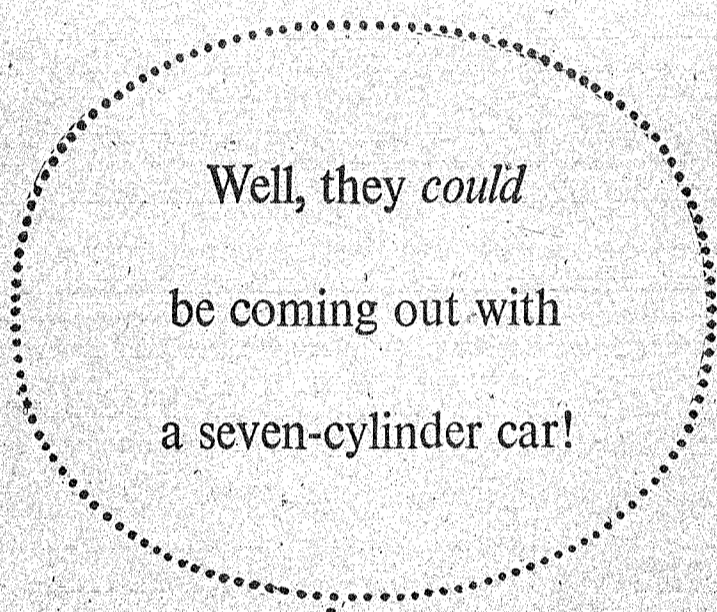
