

Trafic Accidents Injure More Than **Football Players**

Football fans suffer even more than the players, says Thomas N. Boate, special service director of the National Conservation Bu-

According to statistics compiled by the accident prevention division of the Association of Casualty and Surety Executives, there are more deaths and injuries to spectators in traffic accidents going to and from the games and from other causes, than to the brawny young athletes out on the gridiron.

Big Games Coming
The most heavily attended games lie in the weeks just ahead, Mr. Boate says, but they need not be marred by tragedy if the fans will exercise precau-

"Allow plenty of time to get to the game," he suggests. "Don't join the mad rush to be first out of the stadium after it's over. If you are drinking, don't drive let someone else take the wheel. Q. When should my growing pul-lets be moved to the laying house?

A. Usually it is best to put the pullets into the laying house when their production is between 5 and 10 per

Q. What is considered a desirable weaning weight for pigs?

A. Weaning weights are important. Recent records from the Ralston Purina Company's Research Farm at Gray Summit, Mo., show continued increase in the weaning weights of spring-farrowed pigs. The pigs from the 1946 farrowing averaged 49.6 pounds each at the age of nine weeks. These gilts and sows are on a two-litter-a-year program.

Q. Is 2-4D, the hormone weed killer, harmful to animals?

A. Extensive tests indicate that A. Extensive tests indicate that animals coming in contact with weeds sprayed with 2-4D suffer no ill effects. Pure 2-4D is not poisonous by the usual standards. Some 2-4D preparations containing toxic impurities have appeared on the market, however, so be sure your supply comes from a reputable man-ufacturer.

Q. How much feeder space do growing turkeys need?

A They need about six inches per bird. Thus, a 5 ft. feeder will take care of 20 growing turkeys to market

Q. What is the proper age for breeding rabbits?

A. A young doe should not be bred before 7 or 8 months of age. Many breeders determine breeding time by weight and maintain that young does (medium or heavy breeds) should not be bred at less than 8½ pounds. Bucks may be used for breeding at 7 or 8 months of age, depending on the degree of develop-

God is truth, and therefore any kind of lie is evidence of godless-Satan is the father of lies (John 8:44) and the father of all Leta Gay preceded him in death.

I. The Prohibition of Lying (Exod.

This "thou shalt not" of God has to do primarity with perjury; that

This is one of the worst forms of lying, because it may result in the Falfurrias, and Mrs. Artie Berry one against whom it is practiced losing his liberty, his life or his property, or the destruction of his good

It is obvious, however, that the commandment covers all forms of of Santa Anna. lying, whether in business, in social contacts, in the home, or in the church. We might do well to consider what the Bible has to say about whisperers, talebearers, backbiters and others (see Lev. 19:16; II Cor. 12:20).

II. The Purpose of Lying (Prov.

Sometimes as one hears the continuous stream of lies which flow From the lips of some men, one is apt to feel that it is just a bad habit of careless talking which has become a part of the life.

There is, however, a real purpose behind the lies of men, and that is to deceive in order to get gain or advantage, or to cover up hatred.
How much of all this there is in

the world today—yes, and in the church. Those who profess to be the followers of Christ use the devices of the devil in their relations with fellow members of the church. Christian workers who wish to ap-(pear greater than they are, or to Book greater than others, use deceit and lying. With what results? III. The Punishment of Lying

(Prov. 26:26-28; Matt. 26:75). One lie leads to, in fact calls for, another, and soon the liar has cligged a pit so big that he stumbles and falls into it. He is like one who starts a great stone rolling, and lo, it rolls back on him and crushes bim. Yes, in due time he is shown up before the entire congregation

Then, too, the lie does harm to others. No matter what its nature a half truth, or a truth used to deceive, or an outright falsehood-It bears awful fruit in the life of the one toward whom it is directest, or whose name is involved (v. 28). Once started, it is often impossible to stop. One cannot ever catch up with a lie.

But there is also a horrible and bitter fruitage of lies in the life and the heart of the liar. Lies do "come home to roost," and they rnake the heart and life of anyone who has a vestige of decency and honor left, miserably unhappy. Conmider Peter (Matt. 26:75).

It is of the utmost importance that we stress before children and young people the awful results of lying, as well as its sinfulness. Lying and deceit are so commonly accepted In our day that many regard it as all right-if you don't get caught. But the fact is, you always do get caught by God-yes, and by your

Sadly enough, the constant lying of the world seems to have infected the minds and hearts of Christians. Instead of being cleansed from this worldly defilement they carry its awful tendencies into the church.



Roads Ammendant To be Voted on Nov 5

Endorsement of the good roads constitutional amendment to be voted upon in the November 5 election was announced at the meeting of the State Board of Education Monday, August 19.

The good roads amendment prohibits the diversion of gasoline taxes and motor vehicle registration fees to non highway purposes, with the exception of one fourth of the gas tax which will continue to be allocated to the Available Free School Fund

In adopting a resolution supporting the amendment, the board stated that there are 6,000 school buses in operation in the state of Texas, traveling fifty million miles each year and transporting 300,000 school children at an annual cost of seven

"Operation over unimproved roads add to the cost of upkeep and reduces the life of a bus, the Board of Education pointed cut, "construction of hard surfaced school bus routes assured by the good roads amendment will reduce the annual cost of school transportation by an estimated \$1,500,000."

"This amendment," the board explained, "will provide for a constitutional guarantee of that one fourth of the gas tax."

The state Board of Education is one of 20 state organiations which have already pledged support of the good roads amend-
