C of C Fair Booth Planned at Meet

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce met Monday afternoon to make plans for the organization's booth at the County Fair on Saturday, September 28. The booth is to feature a continuous slide presentation of points of interest in Santa Anna.

Also discussed at the meeting is the continuing membership drive and projects and goals for the group in the coming months.

Directors present at the meeting included Rob Cheaney, president; Earl Simmons, executive secretary and manager; Norman Walters and Barbara Kingsbery. Also present was Dick Chaffin.

HS Renovation Progressing Well

Construction is almost complete on the upstairs portion of the high school building, and students and teachers will begin moving into the library and at least three upstairs classrooms this week.

The major remodeling project still lacks completion of the chemistry lab, offices and downstairs classrooms.

Work is also going well on the new homemaking building, and plans are being completed for the new physical education building.

Classes have been held in the vocational agriculture building, junior high, band hall and old agriculture building. The entire project should be completed within a few weeks.

Among the major changes are rearrangement of offices for school administrators and complete rebuilding of the laboratory. No improvements will be made on the auditorium due to lack of funds. A new heating and air conditioning system has been installed.

County Fair Saturday

Jimmy C. Newman, well-known recording star and entertainer, will headline the entertainment at the Coleman County Fair next Saturday at Coleman. He has many top hits in the Country-Western field and draws large audiences at all of his performances.

Rufus Thibodeaux, a cajun fiddler, will also be on the program. He has appeared on the grand Ole Opry for the past five

years and was with Bob Wills for a number of years. The main show will start at 7 p.m.

Other entertainment during the day will include a barbership quartet from Abilene, the Bluegrass Kinfolks group from Tuscola, a polka band from Fredericksburg and a local Western band.

WOMEN'S DIVISION

Activities get underway during the morning with the gates opening at 9 a.m. Entries in the women's division must be at the recreation building by 9:15 so that judging can begin at 10 a.m. The women's exhibits will be open to the public starting at 12 noon.

Several county groups will have food booths in operation all during the day. There will be no main meal as in past years.

HORSE SHOW

A youth horse show is also slated for that day at the rodeo arena. Classes for registered and grade mares and geldings will be judged beginning at 9 a.m. that morning. Competition will be divided into two age groups, and trophies and ribbons awarded winners.

Roger Blackmon, County Extension Agent, is taking entries for the show which must be turned in by 8:30 a.m. Saturday morning.

SPECIAL ATTRACTIONS

There will be carnival rides for children at the fair grounds on Saturday, and over 40 booths and exhibits from county businesses, clubs and organizations.

During the afternoon there will be a grandparents brag contest, bubblegum blowing contest and freckles contest. These contests will be announced during the day at the Women's building.

PRIZES TO BE GIVEN

The tickets for the Fair will be \$1.50 for adults and 50 cents for children. All adult tickets will be placed in a drawing for a free beef donated by the Coleman County Cowbelles organization and a deepfreeze given by the Coleman Go-Gitters group. The winner must be present to win the prizes.

A full-day's activities will be held for all attending, and several thousand people attend the Fair each year. Many local people will be exhibiting arts and crafts in the women's division and helping on committees.

Local people are urged to take part in the Fair this year and enjoy a day of good family entertainment.

GATE INFORMATION

Ralph Arnold, chairman of ticket sales and gates, has announced that the east gate will be open at 7 a.m. Saturday morning for exhibitors to take their items. An unloading area will be reserved at the south end of the recreation building for exhibitors to unload. The south gate will be the main entrance for Fair goers, but in case of rain, the east gate will be the only one used for Fair traffic. Horse show entries will use the north gate at the rodeo grounds.

Coach Gene Williams had high praise for the team and special praise for the offensive line composed of David Robinett, John Rendon, Lee Wristen, Timmy Benge, Mark Turney, Steve Beal and Paul Martin, who opened the holes for the backfield. Jay Weathers and Albert DeLeon, backfield players, also did a good job during the game. Jody Day was another standout in the game.

The Lometa score came early in the first quarter, and then the Mounties were sparked to score again and again.

A large portion of the 1974 calf crop has not been sold due to a depressed market. The question is whether to sell lightweight calves on the depressed market or hold and sell at heavier weights. Due to the recent rainfall, moisture conditions should provide good to excellent small grain grazing through the fall and early winter. The program on October 1 will cover all phases of wintering yearlings including cost factors.


The Sophomore Class of Santa Anna High School elected officers at a recent meeting. Salvador Salazar was chosen president of the group.



The local mission gift this Saturday will help make possible better dormitories for this school in the heart of "the green hell".



In the event such a request is received, a public hearing will be scheduled and adequate notice will be publicized about the date and location of the hearing.
