### FIRE SAFETY RULES

Due to the number of lives lost in hotel fires within the last year the National Board of Fire Underwriters has listed 10 rules that should be studied by each person, whether you plan to be staying in a hotel, or just staying at home. These rules would apply in any apartment of office building the same way as they would in a hotel.

Read these rules carefully. They may save your life and the lives of others.

1. Upon arriving at your hotel room, investigate all possible means of emergency exit.
2. Read carefully any instructions to guest posted in room.
3. Be as careful in a hotel as you would be in your own home. Do not smoke in bed.
4. If you detect smoke or evidence of fire give immediate information to the management.
5. Close transom door at once.
6. Take time to plan your exit.
7. Feel the door before you open it. If it does not feel hot, open it slightly. Hold head away, brace door with foot. Put hand across opening to test heat of air.
8. If hallway appears safe, use the already planned exit.
9. If hallway is not safe, stop up any opening or cracks by which smoke may enter, using wet towels, sheets, blankets, mattresses, etc.
10. Open window slightly and stay near it. Keep calm, avoid hysteria. Do not jump out. Many lives have been saved by closing doors and transoms, blocking all openings for hot air and gases from hallway, and calmly awaiting rescue.

It is important to know how to turn in the fire alarm. Here it is a very simple matter. Pick up any telephone, tell the operator your name and where the fire is. The operator will take care of the rest.

Should you happen to discover a fire the first thing to do is to notify the Fire Department. Don't give a fire a head start by trying to fight it yourself. (Call the Fire Department, then use your first-aid fire appliances. If the fire is in a building that houses people, as soon as you have notified the fire department, get the people out, if possible.

**PAVING LOSS**  
There has been several commenting on the condition of the paving that has been recently put down in Santa Anna and some seem to think that it is a loss to the owners who paid to have it put down. This is all a mistaken idea. According to the secretary of the Chamber of Commerce all this paving will be reworked and put back in first class condition. The losses in Santa Anna were very light according to the loss reported by other cities in West Texas. Most of the damage has been caused by the severe cold spell we had last week.

Damage has been reported in the thousands of dollars in Ozona, Comstock area, Mason and Fredricksburg area, Ballinger area, San Angelo, and other places in West Texas. The damage in Santa Anna was caused by the fact that the paving was just put down and had not had time to cure before the cold came. This made soft places in the pavement and it pulverized easily. The more traffic that goes over these roads before they are fixed will cause damage to them, and plans are being made now for the repair of these streets.

## Texas Farm To Market Roads Lead Nation

Farm-to-market roads in Texas are further advanced than any other state highway program according to Tom K. Eplen, Abilene attorney and president of the Texas Good Roads association.

Eplen's report is contained in a release by Thomas H. MacDonald of the Public Roads administration. Texas is listed in the top three highway departments in number of miles involved in the contracts.

Texas let contracts for 685 projects costing \$52,500,000 on 4,650 miles of roadway in 1946. Most of these were for farm-to-market roads, MacDonald said.

## Red Cross Home Nursing School In Progress

Marvin L., a young bachelor, was being attended during his siege of chronic asthma by his cousin, Mrs. Ellen Harkins. Despite her sincere efforts to do as much as possible to make Marvin comfortable, young and energetic Ellen was frequently criticized by Marvin for "getting on his nerves."

Not what Ellen was doing, but how she was doing it distressed her cousin. Ellen's intentions were good, but in her anxiety to serve Marvin well, she often rushed around the sick room, bumping furniture, banging her leather heels on the hardwood floor, and pouring out a stream of loud chatter.

Had Ellen taken a Red Cross course in Home Nursing, many of the amenities of sickroom etiquette would have been explained to her. She would have known that the home nurse whose presence in the sickroom is welcomed by the patient, is the one who throttles down on her speed, and puts a muffler on her voice.

Noise, hurry, and confusion are quite distressing to a sick person, even though he may not be seriously ill. A good investment for Ellen would be a pair of rubber heels. Nor should Ellen go to the opposite extreme and whisper in the presence of the patient, which would also prove annoying. Marvin might be alarmed and suspicious if he hears Ellen whispering to others. He would fear that he is being deceived about his condition.

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

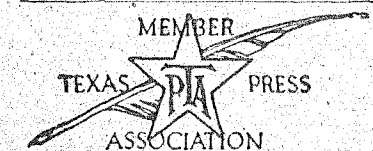

### Improved Uniform International SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

By HAROLD L. LUNDQUIST, D. D. Of The Moody Bible Institute of Chicago. Released by Western Newspaper Union.

#### Lesson for January 19

#### JESUS INTERVIEWED BY NICODEMUS

LESSON TEXT—John 3:1-11, 16, 17. MEMORY SELECTION—Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God.—John 3:3.

How does one become a Christian? This was the question of Nicodemus, and it is the question in the hearts and minds of thousands in every generation. The answer is clear and definite.

The only entrance into the Christian life is by the door of the new birth. Regeneration is the act of God whereby the divine nature is imparted to the believing sinner, and he becomes the child of God. He who has not entered by this way has not entered at all. He is still dead in trespasses and sins, without God and without hope (Eph. 2:1, 12).

The Pharisees who looked for the coming of the Messiah as a secular conqueror wondered at this new spiritual leader. It was probably as much on their behalf as his own that Nicodemus came to inquire of Jesus. In answering his questions Jesus reveals the necessity, the nature, and the method of regeneration.

#### I. The New Birth—a Necessity (vv. 1-7).

Our Lord's visitor was a man of distinction and standing in the community, but Jesus was not unduly impressed by the dignity and high station of his visitor, nor by the visitor's courteous acknowledgment of his own position as a great teacher. With decisive boldness Jesus declares that this man, a cultured and distinguished ruler of the Jews, must be born again, if he is to see the kingdom of God.

God is no respecter of persons. The doctor of divinity must be born again just as much as the illiterate fisherman. D. L. Moody once said that he was thankful it was to such a man as Nicodemus that Jesus presented the necessity of the new birth, or men would have said that only the down-and-outer needed to be saved.

Two reasons are given by our Lord for the "must" of verse 7: (1) The kingdom of God is a spiritual kingdom and cannot be entered by way of our human nature; and (2) "that which is born of the flesh is flesh" and is radically and essentially bad. To learn why that is true read Jeremiah 13:23 and Galatians 5:19-21.

Scripture on this point is almost diametrically opposed to much of the teachings in our schools and colleges. But God's Word is right; let us follow it.

#### II. The New Birth—a Mystery (vv. 8-11).

God has graciously revealed to us "all things that pertain unto life and godliness, through the knowledge" of Christ (II Pet. 1:3). But it is true—and we say quite appropriately true—that he has some things hidden in his own blessed counsels. We know the experience of the new birth. We see the blessed results of regeneration. But what actually takes place is a divine mystery, not fathomable by human reason. Those who insist that all spiritual truth be put through the little norm of their intelligence will never understand it or receive its blessing (I Cor. 2:14).

The striking illustration of the life-giving and energizing wind used by our Lord is most illuminating. Wind is unseen, but the results of its movement are evident. Even so the spiritual rebirth of men is an enigma to the worldly man, but even he can see its results in godly living.

We know that regeneration is not only a possibility, but an actuality, a fact; in truth, the greatest of all facts.

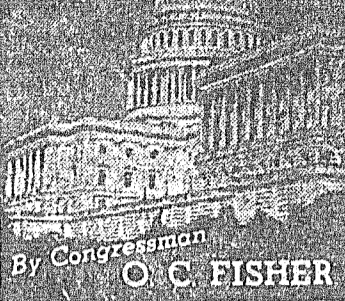
#### III. The New Birth—a Reality (vv. 16, 17).

Just as there was healing and life in a look at the uplifted serpent in the wilderness (Num. 21:8), so there is life for a look at the Crucified One. Faith receives God's perfect provision for sin.

Verse 16 may well be regarded as the greatest sentence in the greatest Book in the world. It presents the whole plan of salvation—its source, its ground, its recipients, its condition, and its result.

This glorious salvation is for all men—"whosoever"—but some reject it. Notice that God does not

### Our WASHINGTON Letter



By Congressman O. C. FISHER

With the new congress marking time until committees are set up and organization work completed, things are quite on Capitol Hill.

President Truman's message was well received. He stole some Republican thunder by calling for a balanced budget and economy in government spending. On the subject of labor legislation he was constructive and made some very sound recommendations designed to outlaw jurisdictional strikes and secondary boycotts. Both of these evils were prohibited in the Case Bill which the President vetoed last year. There are many other evils that must be coped with, however, if the power of labor czars is controlled and a workable formula set up for industrial peace.

If everything the President recommended were enacted into law tomorrow, John L. Lewis could still do the same things he has done in the past.

One of the worst features of our present system is the destructive effect of industry-wide strikes. That creates a vicious monopoly over human labor and the damage to the public is as bad or worse than big business monopoly. There is new legislation pending, which seeks to outlaw that evil. I am sup-

porting that proposal.

Moreover, legislation to give the government the power to secure injunctions in case of grave emergencies is in the mill and should be passed. A law to that effect would remove any question about the authority of the courts in cases such as the recent one involving John L. Lewis and the United Mine Workers.

It now appears certain that labor legislation will be first on the agenda for the new Congress to act upon. On Tuesday evening of this week Congressman Case of South Dakota and I debated the need for legislation on this subject with two labor representatives, over the Mutual Broadcasting Company's American Forum of the Air. I shall have more to report from time to time on the progress we are able to make in the new Congress in the enactment of laws that will be fair to both management and labor and at the same time give the public the protection it deserves.

There was some relief to the taxpayer suggested in the announcement that in November

the total number on the federal payroll was reduced by 111,000. The total on December 1 being 2,330,467. However, much remains to be done in that direction if we are to reduce the public debt and balance the budget. At present the annual payroll in the executive branch of the government is six and a fourth billion dollars. This is one and a half billion more than the entire government spent for all purposes in 1933.

**ORDINANCE NO. 150**  
**AN ORDINANCE REGULATING THE EXCAVATING OF STREETS IN THE CITY OF SANTA ANNA, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY FOR ITS VIOLATION.**

Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Santa Anna, Texas.

**SECTION 1**

That on and after the effective date of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to excavate in or across, any street within the city limits of the City of Santa Anna, without first making and filing a written applica-

tion with the City Secretary, stating in said application the location, nature, extent and purpose of such proposed excavation, and the approximate date when such work will begin and the length of time required to complete it, and shall file with such application a bond with two or more good and sufficient sureties, to be approved by the City Secretary, in an amount of not less than double the estimated cost of restoring said street to as good condition as before such excavation. Said bond shall be payable to the City of Santa Anna, and provide that if the applicant fails to so restore said street the sureties thereon shall be liable for the cost of restoring same. Upon the approval of said bond the City Secretary shall issue to such applicant a permit authorizing the excavation of such street. Nothing herein shall require the city or any contractor of the city, constructing or repairing any street within the city limits of the city of Santa Anna,

Texas, to obtain a permit.

**SECTION 2**

Any person, or persons, who violates any provision of this ordinance within the corporate limits of the City of Santa Anna, Texas, shall be punished by a fine not exceeding \$100.00.

**SECTION 3**

All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 4**

If any section, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this ordinance shall be adjudged invalid or should be held unconstitutional, the same shall not effect the validity of this ordinance as a whole, or any part of its provision, other than the part of such provision so decided to be invalid.
