Most cafes stated they would be ready to comply with the president's request by next Tuesday. In most places menus are planned several days in advance and it is hard to change menus after they are printed and the meals are in the process of being prepared. Generally speaking by next Tuesday it is expected that all homes, cafes and restaurants will observe meatless Tuesdays.

Most of the eating places the country over will observe the poultryless and eggless Thursday this week. There will be lots of places that have meats and eggs on hand that may spoil if not used as soon as possible and may use them this week. However, within a week or two it is expected that every citizen of the United States will observe the president's request for meatless Tuesdays and eggless and poultryless Thursdays.

F. F. A. Awards Again Given By Santa Fe

Works, how and why the money is allocated to the school lunchroom fund, allowing the veterans to cash Terminal Leave Bonds and the position he has taken concerning the bringing of 400,000 displaced persons in Europe to the United States.

Mr. Fisher was a guest of Lion George M. Johnson and after the Club meeting was shown the Veterans Housing Project that the city has worked for here. In a statement to this writer Mr. Fisher said, "This is the best veterans housing program that I have seen. Had every town who had the opportunity, undertook the same program it would relieve the housing shortage in Texas to a great extent."

Attend State Fair

The writer and Mrs. Gregg spent last week-end in Dallas attending the great State Fair of Texas.

We left home Thursday, going by way of Ft. Worth, where we visited over night with our daughter, Queenie and family, going on to Dallas Friday. Editors from over the state started their program Friday afternoon in the Baker hotel and went to the fair grounds Saturday morning, where we were supplied with passes to most of the leading attractions and tickets for luncheon at the big roller ring, prepared and served by the Odessa Chuck Wagon Gang, who evidently know the art of preparing and serving good eats to large crowds.

It was said 1,500 people were expected to appear for the luncheon, and as usual, an overflow showed up, but that western bunch of fine fellows just reached back in the reserve that was still plentiful, and saw to it that all were served and served well.

The State Fair of Texas, held each year at Dallas, must be the largest fair in the world. At least, it is the largest one we have ever attended; and it continues to grow with each show. According to attendance records, the 1946 show was the largest opening ever recorded, with 171,000 and the advertising committees tried to surpass the 1946 opening, but did not expect to pass it to the tune of 40,000. The attendance on the opening day this year was upward of 212,000.

The attractions, exhibits, livestock, agricultural, commercial and industrial, were greater than ever before, and we heard no complaints.

There were said to be 45,000 4-H Club and other rural club members in attendance. A teenager from Mitchell county took first place with his club calf, a Hereford weighing almost 1,000 pounds, which was sold at auction Tuesday to a cafe in Dallas for \$3 per pound, bringing the young 4-Her almost \$3,000.

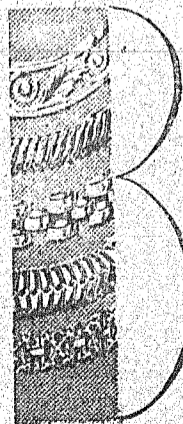
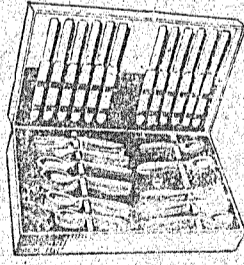

THE BIBLE TODAY International Uniform Sunday School Lesson BY LOUIE D. NEWTON, D.D.

SCRIPTURE: Hebrews 3:1-8; 9-10, Matthew 4:1-11. DEVOTIONAL READING: Philipians 2:1-11.

Apostle of Better Things Lesson for October 12, 1947

THIS lesson opens, Hebrews 3:1-8, with the explanation that Jesus Christ is the minister of better things in that he is the apostle and high priest of our profession, perfectly faithful to him that appointed him.

Called to God an high priest after the order of Melchisedec, Christ, the author of eternal salvation, dealt no longer with symbols, but offered himself as the perfect lamb to take away our sins.



Dr. Newton "And for this cause he is the mediator of the new covenant (testament), that by means of death, for the redemptions of the transgressions that were under the first testament, they which are called might receive the promise of eternal inheritance." Hebrews 9:15.

Jesus and the Bible

JESUS is introduced in Matthew 4:1-4, as he quotes the Old Testament to Satan in the wilderness temptation. Having been reared by a God-fearing mother, Jesus was familiar with the Bible as a child.

What is the best thing any parent can do for his or her child? I would answer without hesitation: Teach them to hide God's words in their hearts in the impressionable years of youth. A Bible verse learned in youth will serve through all life's testing situations.

"I will not forget Thy Word," Psalms 119:16.

He Helps Us Use the Bible

THE better ministry of Jesus is reflected in the fact that, "We have a great high priest, that is passed into the heavens, Jesus the Son of God. . . . For we have not an high priest which cannot be touched with the feeling of our infirmities; but was in all points tempted like as we are, yet without sin. Let us therefore come boldly unto the throne of grace, that we may obtain mercy, and find grace to help in time of need." Hebrews 4:14-16.

Study the example of Jesus in his answers to Satan in the wilderness temptation, and He will teach us when and what to say to Satan. We are not dependent upon our wisdom and words. Our great high priest will supply wisdom and words to match any situation that Satan ever presents.

I think of a story of a junior boy, recently accused of stealing. The boy was the victim of a wicked man who sought to turn circumstantial evidence upon him to cover his own sin. The boy told me that he was innocent. I went with him to the juvenile court. The judge asked him if he was guilty. He looked straight into the eyes of the judge and said:

"Sir, I have not sinned. Who convicted me of this charge?" The man dropped his head, and said: "Your honor, I ask for the privilege of withdrawing the charge."

His Laws in Our Hearts

"I WILL put my laws on their hearts, and upon their minds also will I write them," Hebrews 10:16. Jesus declares, "I do always the things that please him," and he enables us, by his grace, to do the father's will by his indwelling in our hearts. Thus, his will becomes the law of our lives, through the grace of Jesus Christ.

It is impossible for us to keep the law perfectly, but Christ, the better Christ, becomes our righteousness, and then his law is kept by his grace. In the olden times, men claimed to keep the letter of the law, without the spirit, as in the case of Moses. Now, through the offering of Christ, we are enabled to satisfy the spirit of the law.

The Sufficient Christ

THIS lesson should enhearten every trusting child of God, since it makes clear that, "He is able to save unto the uttermost them that draw near unto God through him." Hebrews 7:25.

He is not only able, but yearns to save unto the uttermost. He will save everyone. God has done everything he can do to save every sentient soul on this earth. Those who go to hell do so because they decide to go to hell. It is not the pleasure of God that any should perish, but that all should repent and be saved.
