

During the last five year period osses totaling \$75,851,333 were paid out by fire insurance companies operating in Texas, or more than \$15,000,000 a year. The premiums collected by the companies, according to the report of the State Fire Insurance Department, were \$136,107,000, the average loss ratio of losses to premiums collected being .557. It is of vital importance thereby greatly reducing ex-that we grasp the principles in-volved because the complexity of modern life brings us face to face with difficult problems every day. Our lesson affords principles which are adequate for our guidance in all these problems. The occasion of this teaching was the uncertainty as to the right attitude for Christians to take toward things sacrificed unto idols.

1. The Idol Is Nothing (vv. 1-6). Intelligent people know that an idol is nothing but a piece of tim-ber or stone. They know that there is only one God, the creator and sustainer of all things. Since an idol has no real existence, the eating of such meat is a matter of indifference. It should be borne in mind that the principle stated in this section has reference to things which are, in themselves wrong. Strictly speaking, therefore, this teaching cannot be applied to indulgence in intexicating liquors: To do so would be a perversion of Paul's meaning. The indulgence in intoxicating liquors, the use of tobacco, etc., are things wrong in themselves because they in the human body. The holding of storts in certain corporations and having partnership in illegal business are things that are wrong in themselves. In applying this principle to the use of intoxicating liquor this should be borne in mind. The principle can be applied only to things which are in themselves harmless.
