

35.00 Control Hoppers While They Are Young, Co. Agent

The grasshopper season is just ahead of us says Herman E. Jenkins, County Agriculture Agent, Mr. William J. Spicer of the Bureau of Entomology made a check for grasshoppers last week and found that some of the Mineral Wells Sunday. 10.00 hoppers were hatching, especial-5.00 ly around Valera. The grasshoppers will not hatch very readily until we get rain, but 10:00 they will probably hatch in 25:00 great numbers if we happen to get a few showers.

Jenkins said the time to con-10.00 trol the hoppers is while they 10.00 are young and before they do too much damage to the field crops. The balt mixing station will operate again this year and it will start distributing poison bait any time the infestation of hopper warrants it.

Here are a few things that should be observed by farmers putting out poisoned bait. First, the bait should be broadcast about daylight or before the hoppers leave the ground and get upon the plants.

Second, the bait should not be allowed to dry out: if it does, it should be brought back to the station and remixed. The farmers should not try to rewet the bait because most of the poison will be washed out and concentrated in a small amount of bran.

Third, the poison bait should not be put out in piles or bands. It should be broadcast over the 25.00 entire infested area, forming a thin covering over the ground. S. A. 

To All Water Consumers

At a meeting of the City Commission held Thursday April 8th, a resolution was passed regulating the use of water.

This resolution provides the following rules and regulations.

> (1) After April 15th, 1948, it shall be unlawful to use water for the washing of cars, the sprinkling of lawns or gardens or for any other purpose other than strict domestic use is prohibited.

> (2) That the rates to be charged for water beginning on the Meter Reading date of April 15th, and on bills due June 1st. 1948, will be as follows:

Minimum Rate \$1.75 Allowance 2000 Gallons; Same rate as in now in force

All Over 2000 Gallons At 50c per 1000 Gallons

(3) That any consumer using water for any use other than domestic consumption shall have his service dis-connected without further notice.






