ANOTHER GOOD RAIN

Another good rain fell generally all over Texas Monday night. It measured three-fourth of an inch here in town and reports indicate that more fell in nearby places. This will help the gardens here in town and the farmers and ranchers grazing lands and fields have received enough rain to help them considerably.

RAIL STRIKE CALLED OFF

The rail strike that was scheduled to take place at 6:00 o'clock Tuesday morning was called off Monday night. Had the United States not stepped in and took over the railroads the nation would have suffered untold hardships within a few days.

The three unions who would not be satisfied with a 15 1/2 cent an hour increase in pay had the nation wondering just what was going to happen to us.

After days of trying to settle the strike plans peacefully, and not getting anywhere, the government decided to take over.

First, the President of the United States proclaimed seizure of all of the roads in the name of the government to avert a nation-wide tragedy.

Second, Secretary of the Army, Royall was turned down on his personal request to the union leader to keep their men at work.

Finally, Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough, the same judge who has proved to be the legal nemesis of John L. Lewis, issued a restraining order telling the union chiefs to cancel the strike order and to do nothing to encourage a walkout.

After the court order was served the union leaders held a meeting and voted to rescind the strike order.

Why something is not done to prevent all these strikes and unsettled conditions in our nation is more than the writer can understand. Every time some big union official take a notion that his men are not getting enough pay to live on they want to call a strike and demand higher wages. Most of the time they are successful in getting them. Then the price of the commodities they manufacture are raised higher so you and I will have to pay the wages of strikers. It seems to be going in a circle and the little fellows are the ones who have to take it on the back.

The United States should show these unions that they are bigger than the (unions) they are. If things go on in the future as they have in the past, it want be many years before the necessities of life will be so high that the little purchasers will have to do without, because they will not have money to buy what they need to live on. This writer does not have a solution to the problem, unless it would be electing men to represent us in our congress, that will show a willingness to fight the ever rising cost of the necessities of life.

Regatta At Lake Brownwood, Sun.

The 14th annual Lake Brownwood Regatta, which this year includes a bathing beauty contest as well as thrilling races by some of the nation's top speedboat drivers, will be held Sunday, May 16, under the sponsorship of the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Darrell Wilson, general chairman for the regatta, said entries have been received from leading drivers in Texas, Oklahoma, Arizona, Louisiana, and California.

Many of the hydroplane and runabout drivers competing at Lake Brownwood will be holders of national championships won at the National Outboard Championship Races here last September.

The races will get under way at 1 p. m. and will be held at the course near the dam at the district park. The Lake Brownwood course is considered by racing drivers to be one of the best in the nation, as the water is sheltered from the wind on these sides.

It is also one of the best from the standpoint of spectators because the bluffs overlooking the lake provide an unobstructed view.

The bathing beauty contest will be held at 3 p. m. to determine the Regatta Queen. The lucky young lady winning the contest will represent Brownwood at the Bandera Stampede and other events later in the summer.

Admission prices are fifty cents for adults, twenty-five cents for children; just half those charged at most Southwestern regattas.

State Dept. Of Health Letter

Seasonal advice to vacationists concerning the proper precautions to be used in water sports was released from the State

Health Department today by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer.

Lakes and ponds of unknown depth, and streams of unfamiliar currents are often the site of picnics and excursions, and the usual lifeguard supervision associated with bathing beaches

and commercial swimming pools is, of course, not available in such places.

"Swimming and water sports are beneficial to good health provided one's physical condition justifies this of exercise," Dr. Cox asserted. "Nevertheless, they possess dangerous possibilities if the rules of safety are disregarded through carelessness or thoughtlessness."

The State Health Officer outlined the following simple rules for bathing and swimming safely: at least one hour should elapse after a meal before entering the water; upon the first indication of fatigue, come ashore, and don't re-enter the water; if chilled, leave the water immediately; do not enter the water when overheated; learn to float; this is important; never attempt to rock a boat in a spirit of fun; and never swim in water that may be polluted.

"Outdoor excursions, picnics, and swimming parties contribute much to a healthy, happy, normal life," Dr. Cox said. "It is by no means advisable to eliminate these pleasures from our summer
