Big Spring Man For Associate Justice Of The Court Of Civil Appeals

Seeking advancement from a district court bench he has occupied for ten years, Cecil C. Collings has announced his candidacy for associate justice of the Court of Civil Appeals, 11th judicial district, (Eastland).

Collings already has started a tour of the 23-county district, and said he plans to visit all points in behalf of his candidacy before the July Democratic primary.

The Big Spring judge is presenting a record of public service that dates back 20 years. He has been a resident of Big Spring since March, 1928. In 1934 he was elected district attorney of the 70th judicial district, and then was elevated to the district bench in 1938. He was re-elected in 1942 and in 1946.

Born at Chalk Mountain, Erath county (he thus is a native of the appellate district), September 28, 1899, Collings attended public school at Glen Rose and was graduated from high school there. He attended Meridian Junior College and then the University of Texas, interrupting his education at the latter school to serve a term as county judge of Somervell county. He then returned to the University, from which he obtained his law degree in 1927.

He went to Abilene, where he formed a partnership with Charles Coombes and practiced law for a brief period before moving to Big Spring.

Street Markers To Arrive Soon

Urgent Need For Cancer Contributions

An urgent call for "delayed contributions" to the American Cancer Society's fund campaign in Texas was made this week by former governor W. P. Hobby, state chairman of the cancer control drive.

"There are people in Texas," the chairman said, "who have decided to give to this all-important drive, but have put off their contributions. I want to urge them to wait no longer."

"Although 55 counties have gone over their goal, we are still about 25 per cent short of the money needed to insure an adequate and increased program of education, research, and service in the coming year."

"In every county I am sure there are people who still want to give. If they can't find their county chairman, I hope they will immediately send the gift to state headquarters in Houston."

"The former governor said that comparatively few people have donated to the total of \$341,101 as far received. When cancer control means so much to so many people, Mr. Hobby added, this is a difficult fact to understand."

Workers will continue their efforts, the chairman added, until the goal has been gained. "Because this is the only way in which the ambitious Texas Division program can be realized."

Mr. Hobby reminded workers that 60 per cent of all money collected is used in Texas for facilities which will soon cover all of the state's counties; and that 25 per cent is used in research projects which he is convinced will someday determine the cause and cure for the cancer.

State Dept. Of Health Letter

Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, has issued a warning to parents that this is the season for an increase in dysentery, diarrhea, and summer complaints.

The chief cause of these ailments is the use of contaminated milk, or food, allowing the child to get overheated or exhausted, excessive sun, or the babies formula, and improper amount of food.

Dr. Cox said all foods should be fresh and clean, and leftovers should be properly refrigerated to prevent spoilage.

Dr. Cox urged extreme care in the preparation of a feeding formula for infants. He said it should be prescribed by a physician, and that cleanliness and refrigeration were absolute essentials. Babies should be fed at regular intervals and on a definite schedule, since their stomach and bowels can be easily upset if fed irregularly or whenever they are fretful or restless.

The State Health Officer declared that dysentery is transmitted by flies and every home should be well-screened and free of flies.

"If dysentery or diarrhea develops, consult your physician at once," Dr. Cox advised. "This so-called summer complaint can be very serious menace to your baby's health if not arrested at the very start."

Veterans News

The Veterans Administration has revised its contract requirements to provide a further control over tuition rates charged by many private schools for training veterans under the GI Bill.

The change, effective July 1, 1948, is being made in an attempt to correct the elimination of tuition charges that have been uncovered in recent months.

With the new contract standards, VA hopes to make certain that the federal government is not paying for more than the veteran actually receives during his training.

VA emphasized that the new contract requirements affect only the following institutions

whose enrollments consist mostly of veterans: (1) schools established since the passage of the GI Bill, and (2) schools whose charges increased materially since the GI Bill program began.

No change was made in VA's policy of accepting charges made by other private profit schools not affected by the new ruling.

Veterans Administration has eliminated nearly two-thirds of the number of forms used to process veterans' benefits in the past 21 months.

Since the VA forms reduction program went into effect on June 30, 1946, the number in use dropped from 49,844 to 7,603 by April 1, 1948, an average decrease of about 580 forms a month.

VA estimates that the minimum number of forms required for effective operations will be between \$3,500 and \$4,000.

In addition to form reduction, the VA program has been designed to (1) improve administrative procedures through standardization, consolidation and revision of forms, and (2) reduce printing and binding costs by careful layout and design specifications.

"Make Safety Our No. 1 Crop" 4-H Slogan For 1948

"Make Safety Our No. 1 Crop." That's the 1948 slogan of 4-H Club boys and girls throughout the nation to help reduce the annual toll of 18,000 deaths and 1 1/2 million injuries on farms due to accidents.

Many members are taking active part in the National 4-H Farm Safety award program, which is being continued in Texas under the direction of the Extension Service for the sixth consecutive year.

Among the members' activities to safeguard their families against accidents are removing or correcting hazards on their farmsteads. Their safety mea-

sures include nailing down loose boards in homes and barns; covering open wells and water tanks; properly storing tools; exercising care in operating machinery on farms and automobiles on highways, to mention only a few.

As incentives for superior records in farm safety work awards again offered this year by General Motors. They comprise sterling silver medals to five winners in each county, and a merit plaque to the state championship county. Each state's champion will receive a trip to Chicago 4-H Club Congress next November. Eight state winners selected to receive national honors will each receive a \$200.00 college scholarship.

Last year's state winner in Texas was John Luther Byars, Lakeview.

There were 135 counties winners in 1947.

Howard county was named to receive the 1947 merit plaque.

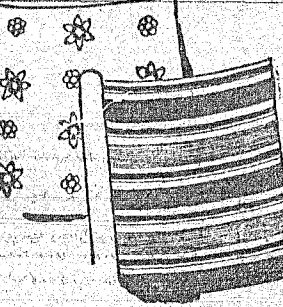

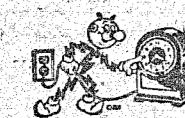

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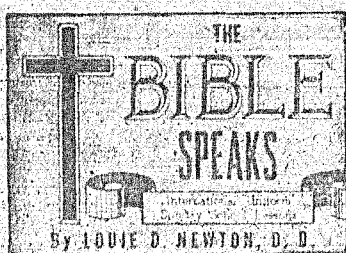

Esther's Zeal For Her People

Lesson for June 13, 1948

GEORGE MEREDITH has a line that runs like this: "God's rarest blessing is, after all, a good woman." In this study of Esther, you may wish to think of her primarily as a courageous woman—most people do, I guess. But back of her courage was a solid goodness, else she would never have been able to say, "And if I perish, I perish."

One must read the Book of Esther, of course to have any grasp of this great story. It requires but a few minutes, and every reader will be richly rewarded. I have a lawyer friend, a prodigious reader, who tells me that once each month for the past 50 years, he has read the Book of Esther.

A QUEEN WHO WAS BRAVE

DETHEL, we heard, was a brave queen, but not more brave than Esther. There is a verse in Hebrews 11 which serves admirably to introduce the first story of Esther's life—the courage "The Lord is my helper."

When she was a young girl, she was taken to the palace of Shushan, where reigned Ahasuerus. His kingdom extended from India even unto Ethiopia. The queen, Vashti, refused to come before him when he had made a feast. As a result of this refusal, she was deposed and a new queen was chosen. There was in the court a Jew, Mordecai, who had been brought there from Jerusalem. He had in his care the daughter of his uncle, a beautiful maiden, named Esther. Mordecai saw here a great opportunity, and he brought her before the king. She was chosen. This brief sketch accounts for her position.

A QUEEN WHO HELPED HER PEOPLE

HAMAN, who was next to the king in authority, discovering that Mordecai was a Jew and was not worshipping as Haman had commanded, caused a decree to be issued which would put to death all the Jews in the kingdom. Mordecai, learning of this decree, sent word secretly to Esther, urging her to intercede on behalf of her people to the king.

Here is the heart of the story. Space does not permit a detailed recital. It is sufficient to say that Esther, though still in her early twenties, managed this delicate situation with such skill that the gallows which Haman had built for Mordecai turned out to be the instrument of death for Haman and his sons. Instead of the Jews being slaughtered, those who had planned the death of all the Jews lay dead.

ESTHER RISKED ALL AND WON ALL

IF EVER there was a perfect illustration of staking one's all on one great moment, Esther provides such illustration. "Who knoweth whether thou art not come to the kingdom for such a time as this?" said Mordecai as he bolstered her nerve.

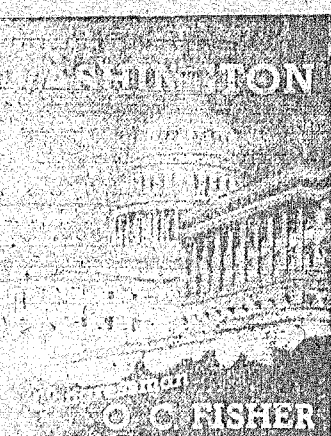
It is such a challenge as young people may be facing today. Obviously, the moment now confronting us calls for great faith and great sacrifice if this world is to be saved from utter destruction. It may be that this situation calls for hitherto unknown tactics. And let us pray God there is somewhere an Esther.

THE MESSAGE OF ESTHER

WHICH leads me on to suggest that racial hatred was never more bitter than at this moment. Unless the winds of God blow, unless some mighty manifestation of divine intervention is granted, the world will break up on the rocks of prejudice and selfishness and ambition and all the forms and fashions of sin.

"God moves in a mysterious way, his wonders to perform." Let us pray that we may early witness some mighty stroke of his mercy and deliverance, ere the night let down.

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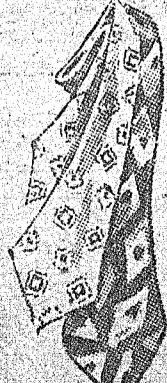
