Year's Program Is Announced By Farm Agency

An increase in appropriations for farm operating credit for the fiscal year that began July 1, was announced today by L. J. Cappelman, State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, through John H. Curry, County Supervisor.

The amount of operating loans in Texas is \$6,940,000.00; a 20 percent increase over last year's funds. "We expect to provide these loans to 2500 more families this year than last," Mr. Cappelman said.

The agency is also authorized to insure farm real estate loans made by private lenders. For direct farm ownership loan in the State it has \$100,000.00, which is the same as last year.

Direct or insured farm purchase loans are available to qualified farmers, tenants, sharecroppers, and veterans who can find sound-value farms, and who can't get the credit they need anywhere else. "Loans are made or insured only on farms that will pay out in terms of their long-range earning capacity," Mr. Curry, County Supervisor, said, "rather than at today's relatively high farm prices."

The Farmers Home Administration also has funds for water facility loans in the 17 Western States. Texas will participate in loans for water facilities in the amount of \$170,000.00.

Changes recently made in the insured mortgage program are designed to broaden opportunities for family-type farmers to become farm owners. Lenders now get 3 percent interest instead of 2½ percent. Borrowers pay 4 percent interest on both direct and insured loans, with the 1 percent difference in insured loans going to the Farmers Home Administration for insurance charges and administration expenses. The agency services the loan without extra cost to the borrower or the credit institution.

Lenders now have an assured market for the mortgages to the Government after seven years, and be paid in full. It is felt that these revisions in the Bankhead-Jones Farm Tenant Act will provide a greater incentive to private lenders to help farmers buy farms.

As formerly, all types of loans will be accompanied by supervision in good farm practices, and veterans will continue to receive preference.

Holder, Eubank Thorpe Appointed FHA Committee

Appointment of Luther A. Holder, Coleman, Texas, to a three year term on the Farmers Home Administration county committee for Coleman County was announced today by L. J. Cappelman, State Director.

Mr. Holder succeeds Mr. Neal D. Van Dalsem, Jr., whose term expired June 30. Also on the committee are Mr. Ozro Eubank, Santa Anna, Texas, and Mr. R. Clyde Thate, Burket, Texas. A committee of three serves in each agricultural county throughout the nation in which the agency makes farm ownership and operating loans. Appointments are scheduled so that a committee always has two experienced members.

The Coleman county committee has an important place in making supervised credit available to local farmers, according to Mr. John H. Curry, County Supervisor.

Before any money can be borrowed through the agency an applicant must have the approval of the county committee. In the case of farm ownership loans, the farm to be purchased, enlarged or improved must also be approved by the committee. "The members' know agricultural conditions in the county, are often familiar with the farm the applicant plans to operate," Mr. Curry explained.

In addition to approving loans the committee cooperates with the county supervisor in overall administration of the program in the county. Periodically they review the progress of borrowers to determine whether they have reached a financial position that would enable them to refinance their loans through private lenders. The First Baptist Church reports a good revival and Vacation Bible School that closed Sunday. The total number attending the Bible school was 144, and there were good crowds attending every night service of the revival. There were 11 new members added to the church, 7 of these coming by letter from other Baptist Churches, 5 additions by baptism, and 1 conversion that will unite with the church later. Fenton Wins Only Contested County Race; Hardy Also Elected

Mr. and Mrs. Zilbert Stout and Gary of East Moline, Ill., and Mr. Walter Arthur of Green Bay, Wis., returned to their homes last week after visiting several days with their cousin and niece, Mrs. Doug Moore and family.

The incumbent for sheriff of Coleman County, H. F. Fenton, Jr. won over two opponents on the only contested race for county office in the first primary election Saturday. Fenton received 3,341 votes with O'Brien getting 391 votes and Gould (write-in candidate) getting 86 votes.

Earl Hardy was elected commissioner, Precinct 2, Coleman County by a vote of 583 to 398 cast for the incumbent, Carl B. Ashmore and 63 votes cast for Henry Simmons (write-in candidate).

Coke Stevenson and Lyndon Johnson will be in the run-off race for United States Senator. The total count is unofficial as of this writing, but Stevenson is leading with George Peddy of Houston being third man in the race. The only other run-off race reported to this office is between O'Neal Dendy, incumbent for District Attorney, 119th Judicial District, and W. A. Johnson. Dendy received a total of 8,970 votes with Johnson receiving 3,868 votes. The incumbent's three opponents polled a total of 10,576 votes.

O. C. Fisher, Congressman from the 21st District won over his two opponents by more than 8,000 votes. The latest reports available are Monday night reports with several counties incomplete. Fisher had a total of 33,040 votes with C. L. South of Coleman polling 13,173 votes and Howell Cobb of Brady polling 10,717 votes.

Governor Beauford H. Fester was renominated as governor of the State of Texas over seven opponents with Roger Evans of Dennison and Casso March of Waco being second and third on the number of votes cast.

W. R. (Bill) Chambers of May was elected as State Representative over two opponents. The exact count Mr. Chambers received is not available to this office. His two opponents were William A. Russell and Joe Bailey Swanner of Brownwood.

In the two Santa Anna boxes candidates polled the following number of votes: Coke Stevenson 307; Lyndon Johnson 249; George Peddy 41 for United States Senator. For Congressman, 21st District: Fisher 315; South 199; Cobb 119. For Governor: Fester 349; Evans 102; March 192. For Lieutenant Governor: Spillers 488; Walker 131. For State Representative: Chambers 342; Russell 138; Swanner 232. For District Attorney, 119th Judicial District: Dendy 353; Johnson 155; Hall 38; Hanz 72. For Sheriff: Fenton 530; O'Brien 65; Gould 26. For Commissioner, Precinct 2: Hardy 364; Ashmore 211; Simmons 51.

The second primary election will be held Saturday, August 28.

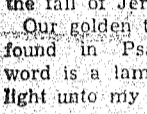


SCRIPTURE: Jeremiah 33:15, 26-31; 43:1-4
DEVOTIONAL READING: Psalms 91

Baruch, The Scribe

Lesson for August 1, 1948

BARUCH, whose name means "blessed," was the grandson of Maaeciah, governor of the city under Josiah (II Chronicles 34:8), and his father, Neriah, appears to have been an official during the reign of Jehoiakim. He was a trusted friend of Jeremiah (Jeremiah 32: 6-15 and 43:5-6). Tradition holds that Baruch was carried to Babylon, where he wrote the apocryphal "Book of Baruch," and died in 574 B.C., twelve years after the fall of Jerusalem.

Our golden text for this lesson is found in Psalms 119:105. "Thy word is a lamp unto my feet, and light unto my path."

OUR BIBLE WHEN Jeremiah called Baruch, the son of Neriah, and Baruch wrote from the mouth of Jeremiah all the words of the Lord, which he had spoken unto him, upon a roll of a book. And Jeremiah commanded Baruch, saying, I am shut up; I cannot go into the house of the Lord. Therefore go thou, and read in the roll, which thou hast written from my mouth, the words of the Lord in the ears of the people in the fast-day, and also thou shalt read them in the ears of all Judah that come out of the cities," Jeremiah 36:4-8.

How did we get our Bible? Through this simple process of God speaking through his appointed prophet, and by the faithful work of men like Baruch who served as scribes.

THIS SCRIBE OF LONG AGO IN the introductory paragraph I sketched briefly the story of Baruch. He was a trained man, trusted and beloved. This he had to be, else God would not have approved Jeremiah's selection of Baruch to copy what he was saying for God. And not only was he selected to write down what God was saying, through his prophet, but he was used to proclaim the words of God to the people in the Lord's house. Baruch was amanuensis, reader and distributor of the Bible—a distinguished role, indeed. Let us today be gladly ready to read the Bible to others, and to distribute and circulate the Scriptures wherever we may. Here I pause to pay tribute to the American Bible Society and all others, including the Gideons, who help to make the Bible known to all men everywhere.

A MAN ON WHOM GOD COUNTED THUS we see that Baruch was a man on whom God counted. His work was done well, and we read that, "When they heard all the words, they were afraid both one and other, and said unto Baruch, We will surely tell the king of all these words."

Young people will do well to ponder this incident. In the varied contacts of young Christians in this modern day, we may be used of the Holy Spirit in making known the words of God in countless ways. Thus, like Baruch, you may be used of God to make known his will unto all mankind.

BARUCH, A COURAGEOUS SCRIBE THE full context reveals the fact that Baruch exhibited courage as well as faithfulness in his service as scribe to Jeremiah. It was not an easy task. Nor will it be easy to fill our posts as couriers of the Good News. But it was a rewarding experience for Baruch. He served his day and generation according to the will of God.

Mr. Henry Ford, Sr., believed in having a copy of the Bible near at hand wherever he might sit down in his home. I heard him say once that he had a Bible on every table in his home. "I do this in order that I may reach over and spend a few minutes with the Lord whenever I may sit down. And I always cherish the hope that others will find it a lamp unto their feet and a light along their daily pathway."

Let us give thanks for Baruch—the trusted friend who served Jeremiah, and thus served God.

H. L. R. No. 23 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes for certain purposes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; providing for submission to the qualified electors and for the necessary proclamation by the Governor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section VIII of the Constitution be amended so as to read as follows: 'Section 1. From and after January 1, 1951, no State ad valorem tax shall be levied upon any property within the State for general revenue purposes. From and after January 1, 1951, the several counties of the State are authorized to levy ad valorem taxes upon all property within their respective boundaries for county purposes, except the first Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) value of residential homesteads, not to exceed thirty cents (30c) on each One-Hundred-Dollar (\$100) valuation, in addition to the ad valorem taxes authorized by the Constitution of this State, provided the revenue derived therefrom shall be used for construction and maintenance of Farm to Market Roads or for Flood Control, except as herein otherwise provided. Provided that in those counties or political subdivisions thereof, the State shall have granted, the State Automatic Tax Board shall continue to levy the full amount of such donation, or until all legal obligations heretofore authorized by the law granting such donation or donations shall have been fully discharged, whichever shall first occur; provided that if such donation to any such county or political subdivision is for less than the full amount of State ad valorem taxes so levied, the portion of such taxes containing over and above such donation shall be retained by said county or subdivision.'

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment" and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment" and the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations; and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that no ad valorem tax shall be levied for State general revenue purposes after January 1, 1951, and authorizing the several counties to levy additional ad valorem taxes, providing for a Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) residential homestead exemption, and providing for tax levies in counties having tax donations." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. In counties and other subdivisions in which the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 35 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by the State shall be exempt from all taxation for all purposes.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 4, 5, and 14 be added to Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas to read as follows: 'Section 4. Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by the State shall be exempt from all taxation for all purposes. Provided, however, the assessor of this State shall not be affected unless House Joint Resolution No. 4 is adopted by the people and in no event shall this Resolution go into effect until January 1, 1951.'

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon the following words: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment exempting Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads from all State taxes."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

H. J. R. No. 30 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another Section to be designated as "Section 60" to authorize the Governor of the State to provide insurance for county employees; providing for the Governor's proclamation; and submission to the elector.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the State Constitution be and the same is hereby amended by adding thereto another Section following Section 59, to be designated "Section 60" to read as follows: 'Section 60. The Legislature shall have the power to pass such laws as may be necessary to enable all counties of this State to provide Workmen's Compensation Insurance, including the right to provide their own insurance, for all county employees as in its judgment is necessary or required; and the Legislature shall provide suitable laws for the administration of such insurance in the counties of this State and for the payment of the costs, charges and premiums on such policies of insurance and the benefits to be paid thereunder.'

The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the date fixed by law for the General Election in November, A. D. 1948, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon "FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment providing Workmen's Compensation Insurance for county employees." Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

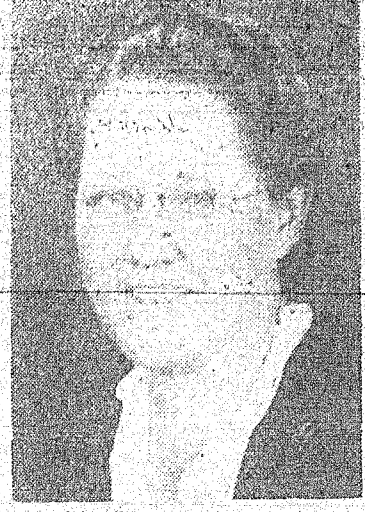

Farm Safety Week, July 25-31

The fifth observance of Farm Safety Week, July 25-31, finds the Texas farm accident picture growing increasingly darker, according to George Clarke, Texas director of the Texas Safety Association.

Most of the gloom is the result of an upsurge in the number of farm residents killed or injured in motor vehicle accidents, Clarke said. The motor vehicle accident total for rural areas for the first five months of this year was 6634, as compared with 3852 for 1947, which showed a six per cent increase over the previous year.

This indicates that farm people must be more careful on their way, to and from markets, while pleasure riding, or while crossing the highways," said Clarke. "It is true that more farmers are driving cars than ever before, but that only emphasizes the need for greater caution, courtesy and common sense. Farm Safety Week should encourage farm people to brush up on their driving habits, as well as to check up on their own working and living habits and hazards around their farms."

Highlights of the Texas farm accident picture are:

If the present trend continues, 1,036 residents of Texas farms have met or are slated for death as the result of accidents of kinds during 1948.

A disabling injury will strike some farm resident approximately every two hours in Texas during the balance of the year unless extra precautions are taken.

Inflationary-scarred Texans will dig deep into their pocket to pay \$35 per farm resident in the State for farm accidents this year, including fire, motor vehicle and property damage. The added cost will be reflected in increased insurance rates, extra taxes and in business lost because of death.

State Dept. Of Health Letter

With the report of 77 new cases of chicken pox, 11 cases of diphtheria, 320 cases of measles, 75 cases of polio, and 199 cases of whooping cough occurring in the state, in the week between July 10-17, Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, has made an appeal to all parents to have their children undergo a thorough physical examination before entering school next month.

The appeal was made to coincide with the announcements of

the various opening dates of schools throughout the state.

"It is a medically established fact that a child's health has a direct bearing on his progress in school," the health officer said. "It is no longer sufficient to provide the child with books and new fall clothing. Today we realize the health factor must be considered if the child is to reach his optimum level." Dr. Cox said that since the child spends most of his time indoors with large groups of children, it is imperative that he be immunized against communicable diseases when such protection is possible. The spread of such diseases is facilitated in congested classrooms.

He said the examination should include a dental check-up and inspection of the eyes, ears, nose and throat. The best health insurance for any child is constant supervision by the family physician and dentist.

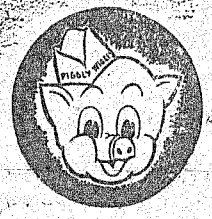
