Coleman County FFA Boys Place In Top Places At Dallas Livestock Show

Billy Ray Weathers of the Shield Community exhibited the Reserve Champion lamb at the Dallas FFA Livestock Show this week. This same lamb was also the Champion lamb in the Fine Wool Division. It is unusual for a lamb in the fine wool division to place so high when in competition with all other classes of muttons. The lamb was sold to Swift and Co. for \$1.00 per pound.

Billy Ray also showed 2 Southdown lambs in the Southdown division which placed 27th and 28th.

Glen Brog of Talpa showed the Grand Champion lamb of the Dallas Show. Glen's lamb was of the Southdown class. This lamb sold for \$5.00 per pound.

Both the Grand Champion and the Reserve Champion lambs were bred by Coleman County breeders. The Grand Champion was bred by Mr. Glenn Mitchell, Supt. of schools at Talpa. The Reserve Champion was bred by Mr. Lester Newman, who lives north of Santa Anna.

Tommie Newman of Santa Anna showed two lambs which placed in 3rd and 4th places in the fine wool division, and a Suffolk, which placed 7th in that division. Tommie sold all 3 of his lambs for 31 cents per pound.

Kenneth Wood of Santa Anna showed a steer in the middle weight Angus division, which placed in 4th place and sold for 40 cents per pound.

Andy Dale Young of Burkett showed the Champion Short Horn Steer.

Santa Anna, Talpa and Burkett were the only FFA Chapters from Coleman County represented at the Dallas Livestock Show. None of the Coleman County animals were sifted from the show.

Farm Bureau Kick-off Meeting Oct. 21, Coleman

Coleman County Farm Bureau solicitors and team captains will meet at the Breeder-Feeder Barn in Coleman at 7:00 p. m. Thursday evening, October 21, for the kick-off meeting which will launch the Farm Bureau membership drive for 1100 members in this county during state-wide Farm Organization Week, October 21-28. Emory Brown, president of the county organization has announced.

Two radios will be in readiness to bring workers the network address of J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, which will be heard over the Texas Quality Network (time not definite). President Hammond will speak to some 10,000 workers assembled in approximately 200 Texas Counties who will participate in the state-wide drive for members during Farm Organization Week. Coleman County's goal is 1100 members. The state goal is 60,000 members.

Also heard during the 30-minute broadcast Thursday evening will be Frank Taylor, State vice-president; Raymond McElrath, Coleman Director, District 7; W. R. Tilson, Meadow, Texas, Director, District 2; and Loy Borrow, Director, District 3.

Oil Industry Cited At Local Lions Meeting

The oil industry was credited with major contributions to the rapidity of civilization's progress during the past century by Rev. Clyde W. Pittman, pastor of the First Methodist Church. Speaking before the Lions Club this week, Rev. Pittman stated that "man's standard of living has progressed farther in the past hundred years than in the preceding two thousand years, and no other single industrial development has contributed more to this great progress than has petroleum."

"Oil is the most versatile and useful of all commodities known to man," Rev. Pittman said, in an "Oil Progress Day" report to the community. "It has always meant medicine, kerosene, gasoline and motive power. But now, through petroleum research, on which the oil industry spends a hundred million dollars yearly, it furnishes us heat, specialized lubricants, soaps and cleaners, insecticides, synthetic rubber, fertilizers, disinfectants, anti-freeze compounds, food preservatives, plastics, explosives and thousands of other essential products. In all more than 1,200 products are made from oil in one form or another. Less than a dozen such products were made from oil 25 years ago, and this exemplifies the progressive nature of our nation's oil companies."

The Santa Anna Mountaineers romped over the May Tigers Friday night on the local gridiron to the tune of 44-0 to win their third conference game. Every man on the local squad participated in the game, with the second and third teams scoring a tally in the third quarter.

Santa Anna made 3 first downs while May made only one. May had three passes intercepted, two of them turning into Mountaineer touchdowns. R. L. Mackey intercepted both touchdown passes and ran one of them about 70 yards, the other 65 yards. Dewey Dunn also intercepted one of their passes.

The May Tigers gained only 13 yards rushing during the first quarter and lost 34 yards attempting ground plays. On the opening kick-off at the half-time, the Tigers kicked to the Mountaineers. R. D. Hartman took the ball and scampered 85 yards to pay dirt. The score at half-time was 26-0 for the local team.

The Mountaineers had a tough schedule for the first four games of the season. They had started off with a conference game to open the season, and have now played four games, all of them being conference games. They won over Baird by a score of 7-6, lost to Rising Star by a score of 13-0, won over Cross Plains by a score of 20-0, and won over May by a score of 44-0. This week the boys take a much needed rest.

Next week the Mountaineers play their first non-conference game. This game will be played on the local field against the Lakeview Chiefs. The Lakeview team is a class A team.

Life and Law

Lesson for October 17, 1948

YOU, friend reader, probably know less about what is in the books of Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers and Deuteronomy than any other part of the Bible. These are the sections mostly filled with laws—'Thou shalt... Thou shalt not.' You either skip these entirely or you say to yourself, 'Well, that has nothing to do with me.' If so, you have been missing one of the most interesting sections of the Bible.

Some of these old laws are dead, but even a mummy can be interesting. Call them dead if you like; you still can learn a great deal about the times and the minds and the customs of those far-off days by reading the laws which governed people's daily lives.

But it is hardly fair to call them dead. Rather, they have been honorably retired. That is to say, they were admirable laws in their time and place, and God's will was learned through them.

The Living Soul of Law

THERE are two ways of looking at any law, or you might say there are two sides of every law, the inside and the outside, the soul and the body as it were. The body, the outside, is the letter of the law; the inside or soul of the law is the spirit or principle of the law.

The body of the law, like the body of a man, dies; it is not intended to live on and on. But the soul of the law (if it has one, some don't) lives forever.

Take, for instance, that law in Lev. 19:9, 10. The body of it, the letter, says: Do not be efficient in getting in your crops. Leave some wheat in the field. Leave some grapes on the vine.

Today that sounds rather stupid, on the face of it, and no good farmer would pay attention to it. But look at the spirit of that law: the wheat and the grapes were to be left for "the poor and the stranger." There was then no Red Cross, no bureau of displaced persons, no traveler's aid, no family service, no social security, none of our many modern agencies for the underprivileged. Those who had property were bidden to have a care for those who had none.

The duty of society to see that no one starves, the duty of all to help those in need, that is the living soul of this law, and it still breathes in laws of the 20th century—laws of old age assistance, maternity assistance, pension plans and so forth.

The living soul of the Old Testament laws can be expressed this way: The love of justice and the justice of love. The best and wisest laws today are those which give this same spirit its fullest and most practical form.

Jesus' Last Word

THE Jews figured out that there were in all 613 separate commandments in all the laws combined. They used to have interesting debates as to which of all the 613 commandments was the most important.

They came to Jesus with that well-worn question. Jesus quoted only two laws, one from Deut. 6:5 and the other from Lev. 19:18. Love God, love your neighbor, he said. All the other laws depend on these two.

To this day, Christian thinkers are not entirely agreed as to just how far Old Testament laws may be binding on Christians. But all are agreed on two points: The basic principle of these laws is always good, and that fundamental principle is love.

Love Is Not Repealed

THIS is what Christians mean when they say that the laws of God are eternal. We do not mean that every law between the covers of the Bible can and should be used as the law of our land today.

What we do mean is that the spirit of these laws is immortal, and the spirit is love, and love never has been repealed.

Show me a law which encourages and helps men to deal fairly with one another and to live together in peace, and I will show you a good law. Every law that helps you love your neighbor is a good law; indeed there is something divine about it, for God is Love.

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You may not be a missing heir, but you may be missing social security benefits. Abilene, Texas—Coyita Griffin of Santa Anna is one of the more than 50 members of the McMurry college band which has already begun a strenuous schedule.

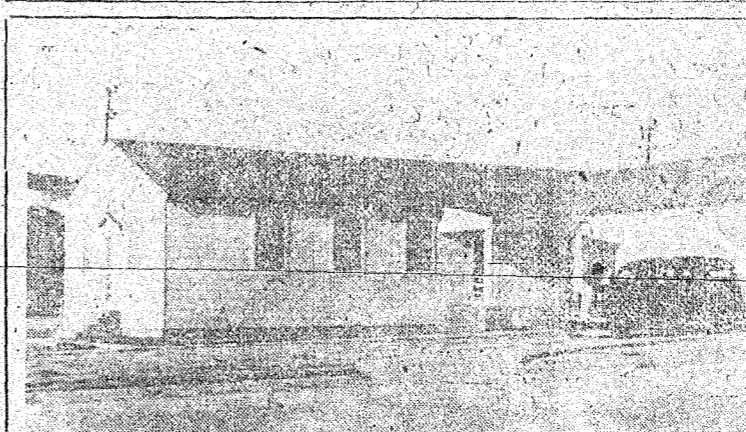

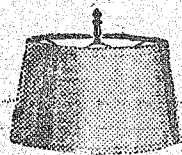
