### District 16-B Basketball League Formed In Brownwood October 30th

(I Samuel 9:1-10) Some people still this notion about prophets in the Bible, as if they had been gypsy fortune-tellers, tea-leaf readers or astrolo-They were nothing of the sort.

It is not possible to open the Bible to Dr. Foreman

the books of the prophets and read history-in-advance, finding out when the next war is coming and when the end of the world is scheduled.

If we could really use the prophets of the Bible in this way, then any reader of these books could write history accurately in advance; but no one has done this

Hired Man and Aristocrat

THE genuine prophets, whose. writings make up so much of the Bible, are something far loftier than mere fortune-tellers. They are authentic voices of God. Because of the way they spoke, the timeless truth of what they said, they are God's spokesmen to our own times as well as to their own, and to all

The Bible prophets were not "professionals." They had no churches to support them. No regular meetings were arranged for them. You never would have read in the Jerusalem Journal, if there had been such a newspaper, that the Rev. Dr. Isaiah would preach at the temple at 11 a. m. and there would be spemusic. Few ever knew when or where a prophet might

No one knew beforehand where a prophet might come from. Amos, for example, was a hired man from a sheep-ranch. Micah was a smalltown preacher. Isaiah was a highly cultured citizen of the capital, intimate with all the important people. Ezekiel was a trained priest, loving ritual and pageantry. Jeremiah was a lonely, hunted man, living often in jails. Daniel was a member of a king's council, wealthy and famous

### State Health **Department Letter**

on controlling communicable diseases issued by the Texas State Department of Health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer states that if every case of suspected communicable disease were seen promptly by the family physican and definately diagonsed, thousands of susceptible persons would be protected from these disabling diseases.

"The theory that it is a good thing for children to have these catching childhood diseases and get them over with; has long since been proven an error which may actually endanger a child's life," says Dr. Cox. "The longer he can avoid having these diseases, the better it is for him. Every child should be protected by immunization against all diseases where an immunity can be established."




