## Mountaineers Defeat Early High Friday 7-0

### District 16-B Basketball League Formed In Brownwood October 30th

The organization of District 16-B Basketball League got under way in a meeting at the Brownwood Court House on October 30, with representatives from all the schools in the district present.

Schools in the district will be May, Brookesmith, Santa Anna, Bangs, Early, Zephyr and Blanket. Mr. S. J. Burleson of Zephyr was named Director General for the 1948-'49 season, Mr. Coppage of May was named Athletic Director for District 16-B and Mr. Cullen Perry of Santa Anna was named secretary of the League.

It was decided that the district championship would be determined by playing a double round robin and then a single elimination tournament. If the winner of the tournament and the round robin are not the same team, a three game schedule will be played between the two top teams to determine the district champions.

Officials for each game will be agreed on by the two schools concerned in each game. All officials must come from outside the school districts. The site for the district tournament will be in Brownwood, at the Daniel Baker or Howard Payne Gym, which ever one is available the week-end of February 12. The district championship must be determined by February 19.

Prices for district games were set at 10 cents for students and 25 cents for adults, per session, for the preliminary sessions and 25 cents for students and 50 cents for adults for the final session.

In the district tournament, Williams and Blanket will play in the first game, Santa Anna and Bangs in the second game, Early and Brookesmith in the third game, and May and Zephyr in the fourth game. Winners of the first and second games will play winners of the third and fourth games. The winners of these two games will play to determine the tournament championship.

The League games will be played on Tuesday and Thursday nights. By mutual agreement, the games may be postponed, but must be played before the district tournament.

This League will include girls and boys. Both the girls and boys teams will play the same schedule, with the girls playing the first game on the schedule dates. The games are to start promptly at 7:00 p. m.

The beginning dates for the double round robin was set for December 14. Games before Christmas will be played on December 14, 16 and 21. All teams in the district will play games on these dates.

The complete schedule for the Santa Anna teams will be announced at a later date.

The Santa Anna Mountaineers handed the Early High Longhorns their second straight conference defeat last Friday night at McDonald Field, near Brownwood, when the fast stepping half back, Dewey Dunn, took the ball around his right end from the 10 yard line, in the early minutes of the game, to score the only touchdown for the evening. The final count ended with the Mountaineers leading the Longhorns 7-0.

If the records we have are correct, this is the first time in the past three years the Early High Longhorns have failed to score in a football game. They have one other defeat in District 11-B this year, the Rising Star Wildcats beating them by a score of 31-13 two weeks ago.

The defensive play of both teams was so fierce that hardly any other scoring opportunities were found throughout the game. Early's best chance for a score came late in the last period, when the Longhorn's passing ace, Ira Carter, started a drive by passing to Sudderth from behind his own goal line. Sudderth took the ball on his 20 yard line and carried it to mid-field before being brought down by the Mountaineers. From there they managed, by passing and power plays, to advance the ball up to the 16 yard line as the game ended.

Santa Anna's backfield, composed of Mackey, Dunn, Hartman and Walters, put on a brilliant offensive show, but were never able to make a second touchdown.

The big standout of the whole game was Dick Humphries, left end for the Mountaineers. Dick came as near doing everything right as a player could, shining brightly on both offensive and defense. Moredock and Cobb, both tackles, were only a step behind, being involved in almost every play. All the other Mountaineers played an excellent game also.

### Lyndon Johnson Thanks Voters

Austin, Tex. Nov. 8. Texas new junior United States Senator, Lyndon Johnson of Johnson City, took time out this week to express his "humble gratitude for the faith and loyalty of the hundreds of thousands of Texans" who cast their votes for him in the general election.

The tall, hefty son of a pioneer Texas legislator said, "I just can't find it in my heart to bear any grudge against those who used their money and their voices in an effort to defeat me. I want to serve all the people of Texas—those who are for me and those who were against me—ably as I can as Senator."

Johnson and his wife, Lady Bird, left Austin shortly after election returns made it clear he had won a sweeping two-

one victory at the polls throughout the State. The young Senator and his wife vacationed in El Paso for their first "time off" since 1947, but limited the vacation to only three days so they could continue answering the thousands of letters and telegrams of congratulations received after the election victory.

"Lady Bird and I are very grateful for all the letters our friends have taken time to write," Johnson said, "We want

everybody to continue writing us in Washington, passing along suggestions and criticisms that will help us serve the people of Texas better."

Johnson also urged all Texans to "pray that the men who will lead the nation during the next few years will act with wisdom and courage to keep this country at peace."

State Health Department Letter

Austin, Tex. In a statement on controlling communicable diseases issued by the Texas State Department of Health, Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer states that if every case of suspected communicable disease were seen promptly by the family physician and definitely diagnosed, thousands of susceptible persons would be protected from these disabling diseases.

"The theory that it is a good thing for children to have these catching childhood diseases and get them over with; has long since been proven an error which may actually endanger a child's life," says Dr. Cox. "The longer he can avoid having these diseases, the better it is for him. Every child should be protected by immunization against all diseases where an immunity can be established."

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Prompt diagnosis, isolation and good medical care give the patient the best chance for satisfactory recovery without the serious complications that sometimes

accompany even the milder forms of communicable diseases. Dr. Cox emphasized that obeying the public health laws regarding isolation and quarantine protects not only the patient, but helps to prevent the spread of the disease to other persons.

The State Health Department does everything within its power to protect the health of the people of Texas, but the cooperation of every individual in protecting his own health and that of his community will do more than anything else to successfully check the spread of communicable diseases among our people.

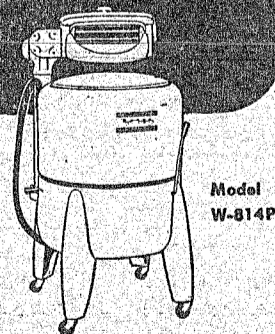

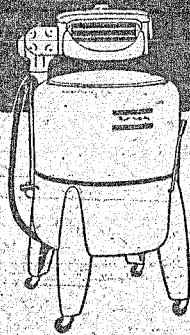
