The meeting was well attended locally and others nearby, and not so near were represented and some were present from Lubbock.

The business session, presided over by O. R. Boenicke, president was held in the church, when much business was attended to and a fine report of the years work was given by Miss Lou Featherston, secretary and treasurer of the organization.

Exactly \$800 was received during the little more than 10 months of the organizations work in 1948. The money has made possible a new mesh fence surrounding the cemetery, painting the posts and the tool house, the purchase of a nice mower for \$216.00, other tools, supplies and the hiring of labor.

The cemetery now presents a very nice appearance, and all graves and lots are worked alike.

Directors of the Association are O. R. Boenicke, Miss Lou Featherston, W. E. Haynes, Lige Lancaster, and W. T. Martin.

The Trickham Cemetery is one of the oldest in this part of the country, and persons lie buried there, who were killed by the Indians.

Following the business session, a bountiful dinner for which the Trickham women are noted, was served in the nice lunch room at the school house, where old acquaintances were renewed and new ones made.

The next annual meeting of the Association will be held the second Tuesday in April, 1950, when a permanent date will be set.

F. C. Williams Is Appointed B'wood Mgr. For Banner

Announcement was made this week that Mr. F. C. Williams has been named manager of the Brownwood plant and distribution area of Coleman and Comanche Counties for Banner Creameries.

Mr. Williams will assume his new duties on March 1. For the past two years he has been milk production superintendent for the Banner Creamery. During this time he has been instrumental in establishing several milk producing farm systems in the area.

From his position, Williams will remain active in working with dairymen in this area, in helping to sponsor milk-production farms. In the past year, he pointed out, Coleman County produced about \$175,000 in grade A milk, a sizeable increase over 1947.

"There is no reason, as a county dairy program develops, that this figure cannot be increased by two or three times. Brown and Comanche Counties produced nearly \$500,000," he stressed.

"The Coleman County farmer and businessman needs to be closer together, and the Coleman County milk producer needs to be protected within the county," Williams emphasized.

A native of Coleman County, Williams has lived in both Santa Anna and Coleman for the past several years. Before joining the Banner Company, he was with the West Texas Utilities Company for several years.

At present Mr. Williams, with his family are living in Santa Anna, but will move to Brownwood soon. He has purchased a home at 2005 Fourth St. there.

Santa Anna To Meet Hermleigh At Abilene Friday

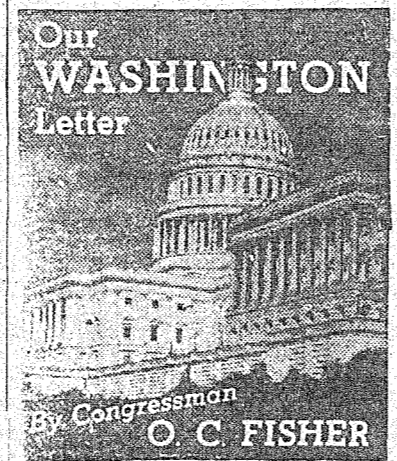
The Santa Anna Mountaineers won the district championship when they defeated Zephyr last Wednesday night at Brownwood by a score of 36-19. This is the first time in the history of the Santa Anna Schools (so far as this writer knows) that Santa Anna has won a district championship.

The local boys will meet Hermleigh at 2 p. m. Friday afternoon in Abilene, in the Region 2 basketball tournament. The winner of this tournament at Abilene will go to the State meet in Austin next week-end.

There are fourteen teams in the Abilene tournament; with Burkett and Santa Anna apparently being the strongest teams in the tournament.

The teams entered in this tournament are Coahoma, Gustine, Evant, Tuscola, Pearl, Lipan, Ozona, Eula, Mertzon, Santa Anna, Hermleigh, O'Brien, Melvin, and Burkett.

Santa Anna beat Burkett Tuesday night by two points, the score being 30-28.



Anyone who doubts the decisive role air power will play in any future war would have been disillusioned at the air show held at nearby Anderws Field last week.

Eflore an audience which included President Truman, members of the cabinet, and members of the House and Senate Armed Services Committee, the Army Air Forces put on the biggest show of its kind ever held.

It was a parade of power and speed, featuring the jet driven B-47 which streaks along at nearly the speed of sound—more than 600 miles per hour. (The speed of sound at sea level is 760 miles an hour.) The F-86, holder of the official world's speed record, 670 MPH—was shown, as were a half-dozen other jet models.

The exhibit also included the Air Force's two biggest bombers, the B-36 with the longest range and greatest speed load capacity of any bomber in the world, and the YB-49 eight-jet bomber, making its first flight to the eastern seaboard for review. A formation of B-29s, which bombed Tokyo and dropped the atomic bombs, flew in from a base in South Dakota. This plane is now considered obsolescent and is being replaced by the faster, longer-range B-36s and B-50s.

The show reminded us of the importance of long-range planning for future air plane progress. Every plane that was used in the recent war was on the drawing boards before Pearl Harbor. The B-29, for example, which went into large-scale production and was first used in 1944, was begun in 1937.

Now, less than four years after the war's end, every plane used during World War II is today considered out of date.

News From Our State Capitol

TO REQUEST THE RAILROAD COMMISSION TO FURNISH CERTAIN INFORMATION

Mr. Chambers offered the following resolution:

H. C. R. No. 18.

Whereas, The State of Texas, vast in area and rich in natural resources, is peopled by an industrious, intelligent and patriotic citizenship. It enjoys an equitable climate and a favorable geographic location. Because of these advantages, within recent years it has been the scene of a great and valuable industrial growth, by means of which her citizens are afforded profitable employment, her business enterprises an opportunity for profitable growth, and those who own her lands a favorable market for their products; and

Whereas, The Key to Texas industrial prosperity is her possession of most of the nation's reserves of natural gas, which, in addition to being the world's most desirable fuel, is the source of innumerable chemical products which play so large a part in the industrial world of today and will be even more important in the future. Due to the availability of these tremendous quantities of natural gas, a great petro-chemical industry has been developed within the State of Texas, and other and greater industries are planned for the future; and

Whereas, The natural gas reserves of this State, vast and rich as they are, are not inexhaustible and the American Gas Association and the American Petroleum Institute estimate that our reserves are approximately 90 trillion cubic feet. Our present production is a little over 4 trillion cubic feet per year, an amount that will exhaust our supply in twenty years, and there are pending now before the Federal Power Commission applications to export to other states many additional hundreds of millions of cubic feet each day; and

Whereas, The Federal Power Commission has almost without

exception granted certificates to all applicants who desire to build interstate gas pipe lines if they are able to show they have dedicated to their exclusive use enough gas to supply their customers for twenty years. Distant states, most of which have large enough supplies of coal to last them for hundreds of years, are thus enable to offer industries the priceless advantage of Texas' natural gas with which to build and expand their industries, while at the same time they reduce the supply of gas ultimately available to Texas manufacturers; and

Whereas, Texas has little water power, and less coal. Natural gas is the only fuel we have on which to base an industry economy. The foreseeable life of its gas reserves is short indeed unless the State takes steps now to assure our people, and the industries that we have and seek, of a supply of this irreplaceable and exhaustible fuel; and

Whereas, Texas has exhausted a large part of her original stores of natural gas, much of it having been wontonly flared and burned, and most of the rest of it has brought only a pittance to the landowners and the producers. The present enormous demand for gas to be dedicated to the use of persons and industries in other states has, within recent months, greatly increased the price paid for gas to producers who have outlets to the new pipe lines, but many inequities now exist which may require the Legislature to pass laws requiring natural gas to be paid for at a posted price; and

Whereas, In order that Texans may be assured of a reserve of gas for the benefit of our people for years to come, and that the owners and producers of gas may be assured of a fair price for this most valuable product; and

Whereas, Experience has taught the wisdom of proration of oil that the supply may be conserved and that reasonable prices may be sustained; now

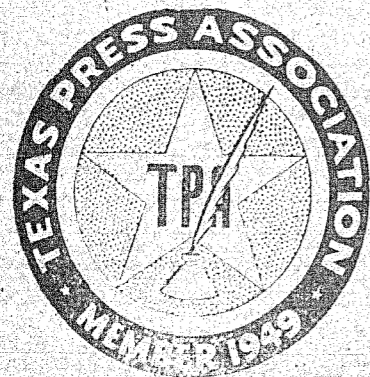

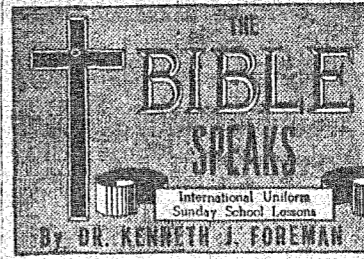

Ideal World

Lesson for February 27, 1949

ANY MAN with a revolutionary new idea has to try to explain it. Jesus was no exception. As a young teacher of religion, he had to answer the question which older teachers were bound to put to him: If your teaching is new, how can it be true? And if it is true, what can be new about it? This was a fair question. The Sermon on the Mount is Jesus' answer to it. The main theme of that sermon is the kingdom of God, an ancient phrase but with new meanings as Jesus used it. We can say "The Ideal World" and mean just the same thing.

The Right People JESUS EMPHASIZES, above all, the kind of people who belong to God's Ideal World. This would be surprising to some modern planners. Communists think that if you can once get a world in which every one has enough to eat and drink and wear, a world where nobody is poor (or everybody is as poor as everybody else, which is all the same thing), you will have the perfect world. Jesus would know this is nonsense.

But the fact is that even after you got your perfect social system, with perfect politics and perfect distribution of wealth, even a perfect climate and soil, you would still be nowhere near the Ideal World unless you improved your people.

The wrong kind of people will spoil the best kind of system. So we find Jesus talking not about systems but about people.

Is This You? WHAT WE call the "peattitudes" (Matt. 5:7-12) is Jesus' eight point program for the citizens of the Ideal World. The right people are happy people, to begin with. (The word translated "Blessed" is a regular Greek word for "happy.") But the main difference between different kinds of people is not that some want to be happy while others do not; rather it is that they are made happy by different kinds of things.

Jesus' ideal people are humble, not proud; they see their sins and are sorry for them; they are "meek"—that is, they are not in a hurry to demand their own rights; they do not merely admire goodness, they are positively hungry for it; they are merciful, not careless or cruel; they are pure in heart and not only in speech and act; they are not mere peace-wishers or peace-lovers (who isn't?) but peacemakers; they are people who are brave enough to do what is right not only when it is comfortable and popular but even when it brings them slander and suffering.

Salt DO YOU really want an ideal world? The best way to begin is to learn how to be a citizen of such a world. Jesus used two interesting simple words to describe the kind of people he means. You are salt, he said,—you are light. Salt and light are old-fashioned things but they have never gone out of date. No one has invented a good substitute for either one.

So there is no substitute for a really good Christian. Living here and now, like citizens of the ideal world to come, Christians are both salt and light.

Salt because they give a taste to otherwise flat or bitter life. Salt because they keep human society from going rotten. This world is in a bad enough mess as it is; but what it would be if all the Christians were removed from it at once, one hates to think.

Light AND LIGHT! Like salt, light ought not to be too noticeable. A glaring light is bad on the eyes, as too much salt is bad on the tongue. So a Christian is not supposed to rub his 'goodness in on

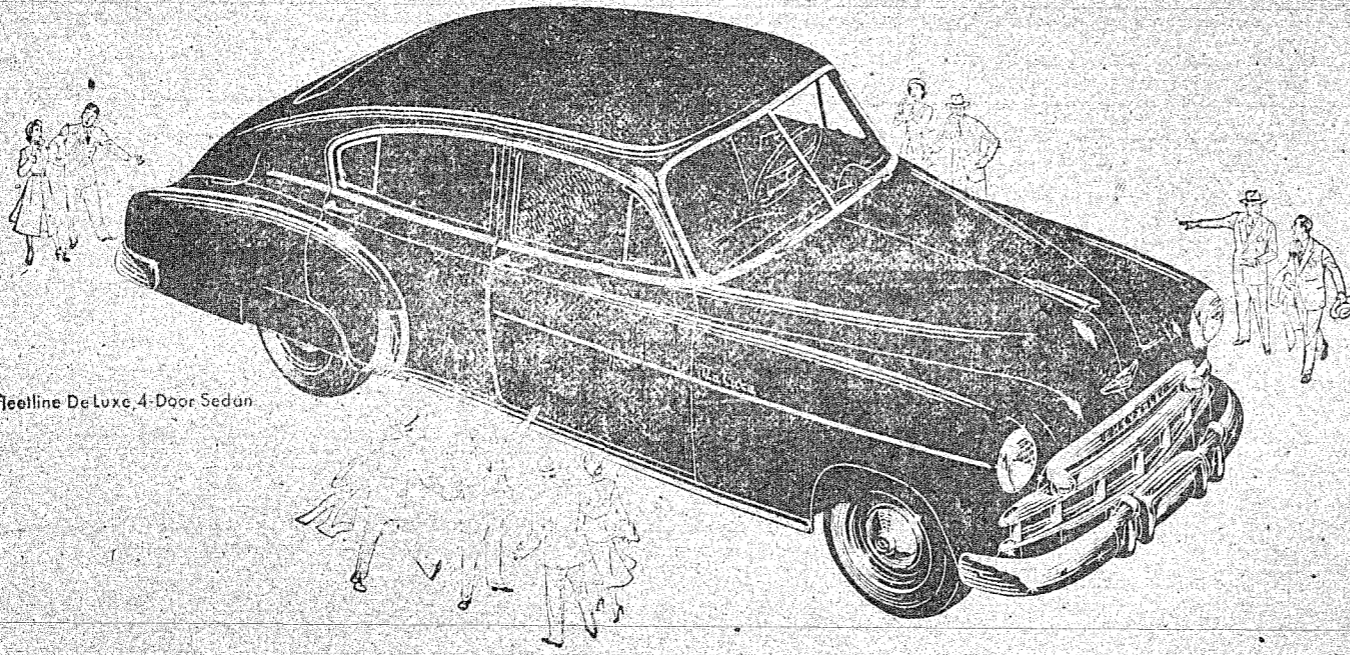

The B-36, manufactured only at Fort Worth, is a favorite of Secretary of Air Stuart Symington. It can fly well above 40,000 feet. At this altitude, because of the rarity of the atmosphere, any fighter developed to date maneuvers only with great difficulty,

and therefore becomes an excellent target for the defensive guns of any bomber.

It is significant that the B-36, equipped with heavy cannon, is by far the most heavily-armed bomber yet known.

The B-36 is capable of flying 10,000 miles with a 10,000 pound bomb load. Over a shorter distance it recently carried two 21 ton bombs—a total load of 34,000 pounds.

All of which illustrates clearly that only by making provisions now for future aircraft development can we purchase that time so priceless if any aggressor should attack the United States.

With that in mind, our Armed Services Committee, of which I am a member, is pressing for the earliest possible accomplishment of a 70-Group Air Force, along with and ever-expanding research and development. There must, of course, be a well balanced ground force and Navy. But in this jet-propelled atomic age increasing importance is being attached to our air power.

Without a doubt, the greatest deterrent to any possible future war lies in the maintenance of a military structure capable of instant and devastating retaliatory action against any possible aggressor.

Resolved, That the House of Representatives of the 51st Legislature call upon the railroad Commission to appear before the Federal Power Commission and to oppose the granting of additional certificates to the planners and promoters of interstate pipe lines, and that the Railroad Commission be requested to furnish the House of Representatives of the Fifty-first Legislature with an estimate of the known reserves and a record of the gas heretofore produced, whether used or dissipated, so that an intelligent state policy concerning the use and production of natural gas may be determined and established.
