

Actually, however, the whole thing is a fight over the Fresident's Civil Rights legislation. The announced reason for changing the cloture rule is for the sole purpose of clearing the track for the passage of the Civil Rights proposals. That admission was finally made on the Senate floor by Senator Lucas of Illinois, Majority Leader.

The fact is, for decades the only times the filibuster has been used in the Senate to any significant extent has been to block so-called Civil Rights measures. It follows that the sponsors of those anti-states rights are really the ones who are responsible for Senate filibusters.

### How Did They Learn?

THE TWELVE learned by doing. It is the only way you learn anything of a practical nature. Memorizing a textbook, memorizing rules, is not learning. Will It Still Work?







By having our well supply of water, the City has not been forced to have water shipped into town from Brownwood. If we had shipped the same amount of water from Brownwood that these wells have produced in fifteen months the freight alone would have been \$42,316.70 or at a rate of  $$1.56\frac{3}{4}$  per 1,000 gallons.

This freight cost plus equipment to load and unload cars would have made it necessary to charge a water rate in excess of \$2.00 per 1,000 gallons to the consumers. The total cost of our wells pipe line to the plant and lease of water rights, and right-of-way for pipe line has been \$25,486.00
